It will be necessary for every member to ship his products through a local clearing house, at which place it will be inspected, graded and disposed of.

From the present outlook more strawberries will be shipped from this point this year than ever before and the quality will be much better. It is generally believed that the land in this section of the county produces premier strawberries; that it will be but a short time until Troutdale will be as famous for its strawberries as neighboring territories are for their apples.

Troutdale potatoes have been commanding the highest market price this year, notwithstanding the fact that the production was double that of last year.
