

EX-CONVICTS IN JAIL AS FOOTPADS

Harry Richmond and William Dean, Burglars Only Two Days Out of Salem Penitentiary, Held on Suspicion of Holdup.

Released from the state penitentiary last Monday, Harry Richmond, aged 24, and William Dean, an older man, will probably be inside the prison walls again before the end of the week. They held up a man 74 years old last night, and when arrested on suspicion an hour later had a stolen revolver in their possession.

F. Tiltonson, a mining broker, who has an office in the Goodnough building, was held up at 9 o'clock last night in the shadow of the White Temple. Tiltonson and Taylor, by two men who answered the description of Dean and Richmond, but his unusual nerve made the holdup a failure.

Mr. Tiltonson, who is 74 years old, but still hale and hearty, was walking north on Twelfth when he saw two men cross the street toward him. The action looked suspicious, so he crossed to the other side. The men followed. It was Dean who had the revolver in his possession when arrested, who leveled the gun at the mining man and told him to throw up his hands, according to Mr. Tiltonson.

"Hands up," said the footpad. "Not much," replied the mining broker, and he yelled lustily. The two highwaymen hesitated a moment, then turned and ran.

Less than an hour later Sergeant Goltz saw two men at Fourth and Clay streets whose actions attracted his attention. He hid behind a tree until they were within a few feet of his hiding place, then stepped out. The taller man pulled something from his face as the officer's star flashed before his eyes, and this something was later found to be a large blue dotted handkerchief which would serve as a mask very acceptably.

The revolver in Dean's pocket was identified this morning as the stolen from the second hand store of Max Levin, 223 Front street, Sunday night. Apparently the ex-convicts, partners in crime before they were sent to the penitentiary, agreed to take chances together as soon as they were free once more, and to arm themselves before or

borrowed from another criminal the gun taken from Levin's store. Dean, an Englishman by birth, who shows in his face many traces of prison life, was sent to the Salem pen in March, 1904, together with Richmond, who was then but 20 years old. They were arrested by Detectives Day, Weber and Vaughn for burglary. Detectives are now trying to learn who robbed Levin's store.

W. C. BROWN ELECTED PRESIDENT OF ERIE

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Jan. 6.—The board of directors of the New York Central today elected Senior Vice President W. C. Brown as the successor of President William H. Newman, who retires. Brown will assume charge of the affairs of the system February 1. Newman has been intending to retire for some time. He began his railroad career as station agent for the Texas & Pacific railway at Shreveport, Iowa, in 1869 and advanced rapidly through the various phases of railway work until he became president of the New York Central in 1901.

New York, Jan. 6.—After several years of separation and ill feeling, Mrs. James Brown Potter, the actress, and her daughter Fifi, now Mrs. James Stillman wife of the Standard Oil banker, have become fast friends again. The reconciliation was effected by Miss Mary Tillinghast, an artist, who is a friend of both women. The mother and daughter met by arrangement on the part of Miss Tillinghast. Last night Mrs. Stillman attended the Lincoln square theatre, where her mother is appearing, and applauded her heartily.

MUTINEERS AT MUKDEN CLASH WITH TROOPS

Amoy, Jan. 6.—An official report was received here today of a clash near Mukden, Manchuria, last Sunday between 1000 mutinous soldiers and the regular Chinese troops. A column of government troops was sent against the mutineers with Gatling guns. The troops were repulsed with a loss of 60 men. The cause of the outbreak was not made public by the government. The insurgents are said to be busily recruiting volunteers and a more serious conflict is expected.

PROTESTS S P RATES

J. H. Mitchell Files Complaint With Commission.

Salem, Or., Jan. 6.—Attorneys for J. H. Mitchell have filed a complaint with the railroad commission protesting against an alleged excessive rate exacted by the Southern Pacific company on a consignment of freight shipped from Starbuck, Wash., to Roseburg. The freight was billed to S. M. Prineas, owner of the consignment, at the rate of \$112 but when the car had arrived at its destination the Southern Pacific compelled the payment of \$194.50 before it would allow the owner to take possession of his goods.

PENINSULA PACKING PLANT TO BE IN OPERATION BY JULY 1

Actual construction on the superstructure of the big buildings of the Union Meat company's packing plant on the lower peninsula will begin this week. The concrete foundations of the seven buildings were completed last week and the contractor will start the walls as soon as a sufficient supply of brick is on the ground. Most of the brick are to come from the east side yards and from Vancouver, Wash. Grading for the grounds is in progress. C. C. Colt, general manager of the company, says that work on the extensive stockyards which the company will build will begin within the next two weeks, and that they will be completed by July 1.

The packing plant will be completed and in operation not later than July 1," said Mr. Holt, "and we are going to make a hard try to be in operation by June 1."

MANY REALTY SALES

Good Demand for White Salmon Valley Land.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Husum, Wash., Jan. 6.—Several real estate sales have been made recently in Harland district, this county. Robert Struthers disposed of 200 acres for \$5500; John Boston sold 180 acres at \$17.50 per acre; W. Leide made a sale of 160 acres for about \$10,000, and Mr. McReynolds sold a half section at a good figure.

Twenty thousand acres of land in Klickitat county have been sold and relinquished to the government and are now being held for transfer to the Union Pacific Railroad company as lieu land. The land lies between the Klickitat river and Rock creek.

E. H. Morris of Mocksville, N. C., has been engaged by the White Salmon Development league as corresponding secretary. Mr. Morris has all the prerequisites of a hustler, being an attorney, ex-editor and ex-postmaster in one of the busiest cities of North Carolina. He will make his home in this valley and develop an orchard.

The Development league reports that 40 families from the rural districts of New York will move to Klickitat county this spring, and also 20 families from Antelope county, Nebraska, will settle here.

MILLERS' FIGHT ENDS

Walla Walla Valley Towns Are on Friendly Terms.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Walla Walla, Jan. 6.—At the meeting of the Walla Walla Manufacturers' association last night it was decided to change the name of the organization to the Walla Walla Valley Manufacturers' association, and increase the scope of its activity accordingly.

This action follows a protracted and bitter fight made by the flour millers of this city against the admission of the mills of the valley. A movement to encourage the use of home made flour was started by the millers and thought that by excluding outside mills the market at home would be practically cornered. Many thought this unfair to the neighboring towns, on the patronage of which Walla Walla depends for her position as a wholesale center.

These small towns set up a cry and began attacking the local mills. The fight has been waged for months and the matter of admission deferred from time to time. When it came to a climax last night the flour millers manifested and the outsiders were almost unanimously admitted.

APPEAL IS SECURED

Jancijag Will Not Hang Till Appeal Is Heard From.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Jan. 6.—Attorneys for Mathias Jancijag, sentenced to be hung Friday, January 8, for the murder of his sweetheart at Oregon City, have secured an appeal. This means that the execution of the murderer is postponed. He was one of three sentenced to be hung in January. The others are Harry Daly, sentenced to pay the death penalty January 29, and Walter Johnson, sentenced to be hung January 22.

OAKLAND IS BOOMING

Increased Activity Noted in All Lines of Business.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Oakland, Or., Jan. 6.—Indications point to increased activities along all lines of industry in this locality for 1909. During the past two months 21 families have located in and adjacent to Oakland. It is expected that at least 25 additional families will locate in this section during the next month. This morning a party of 23 prospectors are looking at land adjacent to Oakland, with a view to locating.

Contractor Davis has a force of men at work on construction of the new waterworks system, which is to supply Oakland with water. Work will be rushed as the system is to be in operation by May.

The owners of the local wood working establishment, which turns out oak plow beams, wagon tongues, spokes, etc., are arranging to increase the capacity of their plant to take care of the increasing demands. The manufacturing of oak into the various commodities to which this wood is adapted will eventually become a large industry in this locality, there being a plentiful supply of the finest black and white oak timber located nearby and within short hauling distance of the mill.

EDUCATE FARMERS

North Yakima May Have Agricultural School.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) North Yakima, Wash., Jan. 6.—North Yakima may secure a school of agriculture and horticulture. Professors Thorner, Melander, Snyder and MacDonald of the state college at Pullman, who have been giving a series of farmers' institutes in central Washington, will strongly recommend such a project to President Bryan of the state college at Pullman. The college authorities are anxious to secure an experimental tract in this valley for experimental purposes and if the people here will get together they will be able to secure the project.

ALBANY SHOWS GROWTH

Heavy Increase Shown in Postoffice Receipts.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Jan. 6.—The business of the Albany postoffice in 1907 was \$15,188.10, as against \$12,480.13 in 1907. By quarters the business was as follows: First, \$3848.75; second, \$4498; third, \$3846.13; fourth, \$4273.24. There was heavy money order business, approximately 12,000 orders at over 3000 registered packages. Since July 1 there have been 1850 registered packages. The stamp sale in December was \$1088.36. The receipts for the year 1907 were \$12,480.13, showing that Albany has taken a new lease on life.
