VAUGHN FAVORS TWO GARBAGE CREMATORIES

Councilman Thinks an Appropriation of \$60,000 Sufficient for Present Needs—Believes City Should Own Collection System.

"I certainly am in favor of a new garbage crematory—two of them, in fact," said Councilman Vaughn, this morning, when asked his attitude on the question of the disposal of the city's refuse.

"Something must be done, and I will vote for new crematories, one on each side of the river, one on the east side and the other on the west side. That is the only way to get rid of the garbage on the east side have garbage, they ought to be willing to have a crematory over there to dispose of it. There is no reason why all their refuse should be hauled over to this side.

"I think the city should have its own garbage collecting plant, for that is where the trouble lies. Those wagons are offensive to a great number of people than the crematory itself. The crematory bothers only the people living in its vicinity, but the wagons offend and their health endangered by the scavengers' wagons. What we need is a central collection plant in which the garbage can be hauled in air tight receptacles of some kind, closely sealed, and dumped directly into the crematory. In that way there should be no bad smell. It is done in other cities and I can't see any reason why it should not be done in Portland.

"But I am not in favor of letting the contract for the burning of the garbage to any private individual firm. The city should own its own crematories. In fact, I am a good deal of a believer in municipal ownership of public utilities. I think the city should own the telephone system. I am not sure but that it would be a pretty good idea if we owned these," touching an electric light burning above his desk.

"Corrections should be made exactly the same consideration from the council that you or I receive. But they don't, and never will. A private individual that the board probably will not be ready to announce the rate until tomorrow. The commissioners are looking at all sides of the question and trying to get the best possible deal possible, consistent with the improvements that have been planned. Including the levy for the new courthouse, it is probable that the total levy inside the city will be 19 1/2 or 20 mills on the \$1.
