

BIG MILL ON PENINSULA PLANNED

Monarch Lumber Company Will Invest \$500,000 in Great Modern Plant—Also to Manufacture Boxes and Shingles.

Nearly \$500,000 will be invested in a lumber and shingle mill, dry kilns and box factory to be built on the peninsula by the Monarch Lumber company of Portland, which filed articles of incorporation for \$500,000 with the secretary of state today. The incorporators are named as S. S. Somerville, who is a lumberman of Napavine, Wash.; George P. Heuner, of Portland; J. A. MacDougal, a capitalist of Erie, Pa.; and Lester W. David of the Lester W. David Lumber company, which has plants in Portland, Seattle and Vancouver, B. C. The lumber mill, dry kilns and box factory for 10 which ground is being cleared on the peninsula just south of the North Bank railroad bridge on Oregon street, adjoining the new packing house site, will represent an investment of about \$200,000 and will be equipped to cut about 175,000 feet of lumber in 10 hours.

Equipment of Plant.
It will be thoroughly modern throughout, being fitted with an 11 foot single cutting band saw, an 8 foot double cutting band saw, one roll feed band saw and a gang saw. Corliss engines and water tube boilers will be installed. It is the intention of the company to also erect a planing mill.
For temporary purposes and for the construction of the larger plant, a small mill will be built at once at a cost of about \$50,000. When the entire plant is completed it will be converted into a mill for the cutting of cedar lumber. The shingle mill which will form a part of the smaller plant, will have a capacity of about 400,000 shingles for each day of 10 hours.
It is also planned to install a modern power plant for the operation of the planing mill and box factory. This will entail an extra expenditure of about \$50,000.

Will Employ 500 Men.
The entire plant, for the completion of which the entire year will probably be consumed, will furnish employment for about 400 men. The company will also employ a large number of men in its logging camps.

"We will have one of the best equipped and most thoroughly modern lumber and shingle mill, planing plant, box factory and dry kilns in the country," said Mr. David today. "We will be in a position to turn out almost any kind of lumber, from the common to the finest grades."

Emaciated, clothed in rags, his eyes and every line of his half bearded face showing the effect of the drugs he has been a slave to for years, Isaac Greble still clung so tightly to hope of liberty that he pleaded for one more chance with Judge Van Zante.

It was snowing merrily outside, and Greble's rage was altogether insufficient to protect him from the cold, yet he cried "Give me a chance, Judge, and I'll be out of town inside of an hour."

"Where could you go in such a storm as this?" asked the judge.

"I'll start for Tacoma right away, and I'll get there," replied Greble with tears in his glassy eyes.

"Well, I'll give you the chance, though I think you'd better stay in a warm jail for a while," said the judge, and the poor drug victim hobbled from the room and out into the snowstorm.

When Greble was picked up for begging by Detective Howell yesterday afternoon, he was showing his cunning by calling attention to the cocaine and morphine taken from his pockets. "That's my dope," he declared. His motive was plain, so plain that he failed in his purpose. He had been sentenced to the rock pile once before and knew that if he could persuade the officers to put a state charge against him he would if convicted be sent to the county jail, but that if the city charged with vagrancy was placed against him it would mean a return to the butte and its labor.

This concern was organized by J. H. Lutes, who some years ago lost a leg back in Minnesota. He made himself an artificial leg and was so successful in getting up the design and making the fit that he immediately concluded to devote himself to making artificial limbs. He started in a small way, seven years ago, as the Oregon Artificial Limb company, and since that time he has supplied over 500 men and women with good, serviceable legs and arms. No one is employed in his shop, save those who have lost an arm or leg.

The shop has become a kind of rendezvous for those who have lost a limb. English willow is the material out of which the limbs are made. While the greater part of the work of making and fitting the limbs is done by hand, some machinery, such as band saws and lathes, is employed in the work.
