The snow in the mountains is melting, causing the Willamette river and tributaries to rise rapidly.

Rainier, Or., Jan. 7.—Fourteen inches of snow has fallen here. The thermometer today stands at 22 degrees above zero. The snow is the deepest in over 10 years. Train service is bad.

Rock Creek, Or., Jan. 7.—This severe storm in years. A driving wind from the east created a blizzard of sand and dust that night, the thermometer standing below the freezing point today. A blinding snow began falling today.

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MILWAUKEE FILES ITS
