

RUINED CITIES TO BE REBUILT

Commissioners Will Visit
San Francisco and Japan
to Get Pointers.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Rome, Jan. 8.—The chamber of deputies, which convened today, will vote in all probability for the rebuilding of Messina, the ancient Sicilian city, and Reggio, on the Calabrian mainland, destroyed nearly two weeks ago by earthquake. A strong sentiment toward rebuilding is manifested by the assembly.
The government will rigidly enforce the regulations covering the construction of buildings. Commissioners will be sent at once to San Francisco and to Japanese cities that have felt the earth shocks and that have profited by the experience in rebuilding better than before.
Word has been received that thousands of bodies are being buried daily in huge pits at Messina and Reggio. Archbishop Darrogo of Reggio is conducting the rites of burial over the dead.
Scientific measures are being used in preventing disease. It is believed that the work of clearing away the ruins will begin soon, not later than a month at the longest.

NAVAL OFFICER SEEKS DIVORCE

Constructor Evans' Wife
Only Hopes He May
Get It Quick.

Vallejo, Cal., Jan. 8.—Naval Commissioner Holden A. Evans, who has started society of San Francisco and Mare Island by filing a sensational divorce petition, is in very poor health, it is announced, and has secured a leave of absence from Mare Island navy yard to prepare for an operation for the removal of a growth from his nose.
It is understood that Mrs. Evans, who is in San Francisco, is impatient for the divorce to be granted in order that she may marry the young naval officer referred to anonymously in the petition.
The naval constructor asks for the custody of his three children, one of whom, Dolle, the 10-year-old daughter, christened the great collier Prometheus, which was launched here last month.
The petition alleges that the climax of their domestic unhappiness came on Christmas day, when Evans obtained conclusive evidence of his wife's misconduct.
Mrs. Evans went to San Francisco to visit friends December 30 and on New Year's eve she and her husband attended a fashionable party together. It was on that evening, Evans says, that he made a final appeal to his wife to return to him and agreed that for the sake of their children the past should be forgotten. It is asserted that she refused and urged him to get a divorce immediately.
The prominence of constructor Evans in the navy and the active part taken by him in society makes the case one of the most sensational in years.
The young officer involved, whose name has not been made a matter of record, has left Mare Island, his ship having been ordered on a trial cruise. He is expected to arrive in San Francisco next Monday.

SULT SEES LIFE OF RESHAD

Evidence Exists That Abdul
Sent Assassins Against
Heir to Throne.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Constantinople, Jan. 8.—Evidence of the connection of Sultan Abdul Hamid with the attempt, just before parliament convened, to break into the palace of Reshad Effendi, heir to the Turkish throne, is being sought by the agents of the reform party.
The inquiry centers mysteriously about the assassin but direct evidence, at least so far as his majesty is concerned, has revealed no conspiracy.
A Turkish Mustagan arrested on a charge of having attempted the burglary, has been repeatedly examined in prison, but is understood to have refused even to admit his own guilt, to say nothing of implicating any accomplices. He is believed to be a regular form and if convicted may prove more communicative.
The sultan's jealousy of the heir has never been any secret. He kept him practically a prisoner for years, before the revolution, and is still intensely anxious to have one of his own sons rather than Reshad succeed him on the throne.

COTTAGE GROVE PLAN MODIFIED

Proposed County Boundaries
Are Cut Down; Name
"Nesmith" Suggested.

Eugene, Or., Jan. 8.—The Cottage Grove committee appointed to draft a bill providing for the formation of a new county out of the northern end of Douglas and the southern end of Lane has made its report to the commercial club of that city. The committee has modified the boundaries of the proposed new county from the original plan and the Cottage Grove people think that the people of Lane and Douglas who have opposed the movement will be satisfied with the boundaries as they are now proposed.
The west boundary line will take in only the Lorne valley, leaving at least a 30-mile strip along the coast in both Lane and Douglas counties for the formation of a new county at some future time. If adopted, the north line barely takes in Leona, leaving Drain in Douglas county, and includes only a narrow strip of the bottom mines and Steamboat creek in northeast Douglas. The north line runs east and west a short distance north of Creswell, leaving out of Lane county all the Middle Fork country, the north boundary intersecting the east boundary line at Waldo lake.
The committee suggests the name "Nesmith" for the new county, in honor of Colonel James W. Nesmith, a soldier of Oregon in 1843, whose home was in Folk county. He was prominent in the affairs of that state, having served in the United States army as a district judge, as legislator and commander of a body of troops in the Indian wars.

WIFE MURDERER DIES ON GALLIOWS

Thomas P. Fallon Prays as
He Mounts Scaffold at
San Quentin.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 8.—"Sacred heart of Jesus have mercy on my soul." As the noose was slipped about his neck on the scaffold in the penitentiary here shortly after 10 o'clock today, Thomas P. Fallon spoke these words in a clear, firm voice. Twelve minutes later he was dead.
Fallon, the wife murderer, prayed audibly as he marched from his cell and up 12 steps of the scaffold. His step was firm and he was calm. Father Walsh, his spiritual adviser, who was with him during his last moments on earth, said the man went to his death more calmly than any condemned man he ever knew. Fallon was the first man to speak on the scaffold here in a long time.

History of the Fallon Case.
Fallon had waited nearly four years to die for the murder of his faithless wife. When he was arrested in the fall of 1904, he said to the police:
"I shot her and I killed her and I guess I'll hang for it."
The trial was not complicated. It consisted of relating the story of how Fallon, the wheelwright, lost the love of his wife; how she drifted away from him and went to live with a man named Fleming; how he charged that Fallon followed her and found her with Fleming; that he took up his residence in the same house, fully aware of the relations between his wife and Fleming and that he borrowed money from Fleming. Then followed the day when Fallon could not endure it longer. He pleaded with the woman to return to him and when she refused killed her. Fallon's constant politeness was marked by a man as a remarkable prisoner. In December, 1904, when sentenced to hang by Judge Lawlor, he said:
"Your honor, thank you for the trouble you have taken with my case, and all that you have done for me." The date for the execution was set many times and postponed for various causes through the efforts of Fallon's friends to save his life.
In the earthquake and fire of April, 1906, all the records in the case were destroyed and this caused another long delay. It was not until last evening, when the warden received a final message from Governor Gillett, that the final orders for the execution were given.

Must Answer for Conspiracy.

Los Angeles, Jan. 8.—Falling in their effort to enlist the United States supreme court in their behalf, three men in prison here today must return to Arizona and answer charges of conspiring against the Mexican government. Word was received from Washington today that the appeal of Ricardo F. Magon, Antonio Villareal, and Labrado Rivera, alleged Mexican revolutionists, had been dismissed.
The prisoners appealed to the lower courts for a writ of habeas corpus. This was denied them and they carried their case to the highest tribunal in the land. They had no money, however, and the case was thrown out of court because of the appellant's failure to file a printed record of the case.

Retirement of Major Dawes.

Washington, Jan. 8.—The first retirement among the army officers for 1909 took place today, when Major James W. Dawes of the pay department was dropped from the active list on account of age.

FAVORS PAVING BONDS

Roseburg Commercial Club Passes
Important Resolutions.

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 8.—An important step toward the improvement of Roseburg was taken by the Commercial club of this city at its meeting last night. It was in the form of a resolution, as follows:
"Be it resolved by the trustees of Roseburg Commercial club, that they will support the issuance of bonds for the paving of the business streets of this city."
Second—That we earnestly recommend to the members of the Roseburg Commercial club, and to all citizens of this city, that they use their influence for and cast their votes in the furtherance of said improvement.
Third—That it should be plainly understood by every citizen that if the development of Roseburg is to be continued we must be able to present to the home-seeker and the producer who do business with us better highways; that not only civic pride, but also our material welfare and progress demand that this important matter be no longer dilly-dallied or delayed.

MANY BUILDINGS ERECTED.

\$582,358 Was Expended at Eugene
in 1908.
(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Eugene, Or., Jan. 8.—According to a report made by Building Inspector McFarland, the cost of buildings erected in Eugene during the year 1908 was \$582,358. From April 1, the date upon which the office of inspector was created, to December 31, the cost of the buildings erected was \$458,293. For the three months before April 1 the cost was \$124,065. Principal among the buildings erected during the year are the following: Southern Pacific depot, \$21,000; Presbyterian church, of stone, \$20,000; Bible university building, of stone, \$20,000; I. O. O. F. business block, five stories, high, \$20,000; Dunn-Wilkins business block, three stories, \$20,000. There are eight or ten other business blocks on the list, all smaller buildings than those mentioned, ranging in cost from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

APPOINTMENTS MADE

Ashland Mayor Names New City
Officials.

Ashland, Or., Jan. 8.—Mayor Snell made the following appointments at the first annual meeting of the new city council of Ashland: Chief of police, E. Neider; assistant chief of police, Clarence G. Benedict; street commissioner, C. W. Fraley. The appointment of a water superintendent was deferred. Under the new amendment to the charter creating a park commission, the mayor appointed the following park commissioners, and they were confirmed without objection: Mrs. Mary Melde, Mrs. Ida M. Geisler, H. G. Enders, George A. Knoblauch and W. A. Patrick.
Both the retiring Mayor Loomis and the new mayor, Mr. Snell, delivered addresses to the council, making recommendations and outlining policies, directed principally to the matter of street improvement and the installation of the new municipal power plant.

CERTIFICATES GRANTED

Three Attorneys Are Admitted to
Oregon Bar.

TAX LEVY COMPLETED

10.9 Mills for Marion County This
Year.
(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)

Salem, Or., Jan. 7.—The tax levy for Marion county has been completed. It shows that the total official levy for 1909 will be about 10.9 mills. This is made necessary by an insufficient levy made last year that compelled the county court to obtain advances on county warrants. This deficit has called for an additional levy of 2.1 mills. The deficit amounted to almost \$60,000.
The total levy for the city of Salem is 20.9 mills. The items are estimated as follows: State tax, 2.66 mills, yield \$78,157.50; state school tax, 2.63 mills, yield \$78,792; indigent soldiers' tax, 0.3 of a mill, yield \$938; state library tax, 0.04 of a mill, yield \$1,197; county tax, 2.5 mills, yield \$74,885; 1908 deficit, 2.1 mills, yield \$62,889.77; road tax, 1 mill, yield \$21,947.80; total, state and county levy, 10.9 mills; total yield, \$318,766.67.
The levy for the city of Salem is 6 mills and the Salem school levy is 14 mills, making altogether 10 mills to be added to the county and state levy by city property owners, resulting in a levy of 20.9 mills for city taxpayers to meet.

FOREST GROVE NOMINATES

Candidates Are Named for Coming
City Election.

Coffey, for treasurer, and Peter Elliott, for marshal.
