Ring, Diamond,
Field and TrackSMITHSON DONE
GREAT INJUSTICEPortland's Famous Hurdler
Robbed of Credit by
Eastern Sport Critics.

Those biased Atlantic seaboard sport reviewers who can see no good in any athlete but an eastern athlete are doing Forrest Smithson, the greatest hurdler in the world, a great injustice in summing up the year just closed. In the mind of every fair and impartial critic there was no more notable performance than that of Smithson at the Olympic games in London last July.

Were Smithson an eastern boy the press could not sing his praises loud enough. He is a Pacific coast product and there is the sole reason. It is another case of "There are no noble men but Romans" with the automatic eastern press.

Outside the winning of two races in London by Melvin Sheppard in record breaking time as a possible exception, the showing of Smithson was the greatest in the games. Instead of giving the Portlander credit for the most remarkable hurdle record ever produced, the easterners practically ignore him and confer the praise on A. B. Shaw, a Dartmouth college boy, whom Smithson decisively defeated every time they met.

Shaw Tied Krasznai.
Under the most favorable conditions Shaw ran the 120 yard hurdles in 15.5 seconds, a feat that Smithson has accomplished half a dozen times in practice with reliable timers. Shaw never did it but once when the hurdles covered the 110 meter distance in London. Shaw finished a good third.

Johnny Garreille, the university of Michigan star, while Garreille was 2 1/2 yards behind Smithson at the tape.

One hundred and ten meters are the equivalent of 120.3 yards. In the Olympic games Smithson covered 120.3 yards in 15 seconds flat. Here is the rub: How much better is a record of 120.3 yards in 15 seconds than 120 yards in 15.5 seconds?

Any reader with primary horse sense will see the injustice done the local hurdler. There never was nor perhaps ever will be a time when the much proclaimed Shaw can beat Smithson. Were Smithson a member of the Irish-American or the New York Athletic club the papers would praise him to the high heavens. Because he comes from that country which produces the best athletes on earth they pass him by.

The great athlete Krasznai of the University of Pennsylvania hung up a record of 15.2 for the 110 meter hurdle and it was freely predicted that that would never be a man to equal it. That was in Paris in 1900. In the following games of 1904 Krasznai of America covered the sticks in 15.2 seconds, and in 1906 at Athens Leavitt of America topped him with 15.1.5. The first renewal of the classic games at Athens in 1906 saw the American Curtis go the 110 meters in 17.3.5 seconds.

When Alvin Did the Trick.
At the 120 yard event the greatest feat before Shaw's accepted record was 15.5 seconds, made by Alvin C. Krasznai at Brooklyn, N. Y., March 12, 1906. That record stood for over a year without a man getting within one fifth of a second of it. Smithson's mark at London last July, Smithson is entitled to all credit and the writer wishes to laud Thomas S. Andrews, the sporting editor of the Evening Wisconsin of Milwaukee, who has the integrity to pronounce the greatest ever made in the annals of athletics. Andrews is one of the few sporting writers who knows a record when he sees it.

Gilbert Is Another.
But the slighting of Smithson is not all. Somewhere in a remote village of New England, Walter Dray, who has even given credit for being a hurdler, another Portland boy, who captured first place in the London Olympic games, has been completely overlooked. How many eastern critics took the trouble to inquire how many times Gilbert defeated Dray for the medal in the jump-off or intercollegiate meets?

In the dual or intercollegiate meets Dray and Gilbert might tie. The jump-off of the two would be prolonged with-out result throughout the afternoon and finally the pair would agree to vault off the following afternoon. By who got the medal for winning? By actual count Gilbert won nearly twice as many medals as Dray. Is it more than fair to say that Gilbert is more of a hurdler than Dray, who is more of a jumper? FITZPATRICK IS
NOT COMING HEREFamous Rowing Coach Is
Slated for New Berth—
Loomis Likes Murphy.

There is no truth in the rumor that John Fitzpatrick, the famous rowing coach, will be the mentor of the local oarsmen next spring, according to Captain B. E. Loomis of the Portland Rowing club. Loomis is banking on Dan Murphy, the present Stanford coach, provided his health will permit him to take up the work again this season. Of course Murphy's showing with the Cardinals eight weeks ago has much to do with his retention by the local club.

Fitzpatrick had had a couple of offers to coach teams this season, one being from St. Louis and the other from a coast club, presumably Portland. Back in the early rowing days Fitzpatrick coached a Portland crew and made a success of it. He is the ex-champion sculler of England.

Fitzpatrick, who is 44 years of age, has been rowing since he was 16 years old, when he won the German high school regatta prize from nine competitors. Before he came to this country he also won the French international sculling sweepstakes by again defeating Ten Eyck, Ross, Langan and also Al Hamm, James Bell, Kennedy, Adams and others.

He has trained and handled crews all over the country since 1887, and has met with exceptional success. Among his winning crews were the Varina, 1888; Philth, 1889; Alameda, Cal., 1890; Portland, Ore., 1891; the Bohemian, Fallsdale, Union, New York Naval academy, Neptune, Baltimore, Potomac, Washington, Southside, Quincy, Ill., Nautilus, Bay Ridge, Atlanta, Hoboken and the Staten Island.

Des Moines, Iowa, Jan. 11.—The Iowa legislature organized today for what promises to be a busy session. Governor Warren Garst will read the governor's biennial message tomorrow and B. F. Carroll, the new governor, will be installed in office Thursday. Tuesday week is fixed for the date of election of Governor Cummins to be United States senator.

A bill compelling corporations to make reports of their earnings and expenditures and to permit officials of municipalities to examine their books when the reports are not forthcoming is expected to attract much attention and discussion at this session. Other bills to be introduced will deal with woman suffrage, the establishment of a state insurance commission and a public utility commission. The organization of the jury system, the abolition of capital punishment, the reorganization of the state judiciary, the prohibition of Sunday baseball and Sunday theatrical performances.
