Business Agent of Union Calls Council's Attention to Dangerous Wiring.

"Gentlemen, I hope you will not pass this ordinance. In the name of humanity and in justice to the people, I ask you not to. There are unprotected electric light poles in this city that would bring certain death to any living thing which might happen to come into contact with them. If an adventurous child should climb one of these poles it would be killed."

G. Frank Garrey, business agent of the local electrical wiring union, made the statement here quoted before the council yesterday. Mr. Garrey referred to the extension of time which the council is asked to give the Portland Railway, Light & Power company in which to make certain changes in its overhead wiring. These changes were ordered a year ago and were to have been completed last month.

The company, as submitted through Oskar Huber, has made no effort to comply with the ordinance. The street committee of the council, despite protest recommended that the corporation be allowed an extension of time until next October. Huber appeared before the committee and frankly admitted that his company had no excuse to offer for not observing the ordinance.

"The word of the Portland fire, light & power company officials can not be depended upon," said Mr. Garrey. "You know that they agreed to put on fenders and they promised to heat their cars. You know how well they have kept these and other promises.
