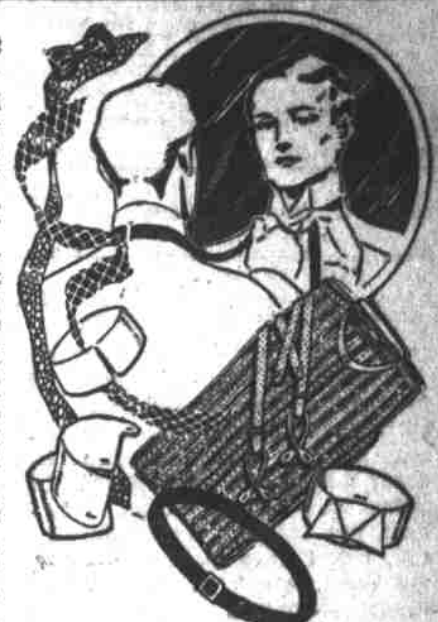

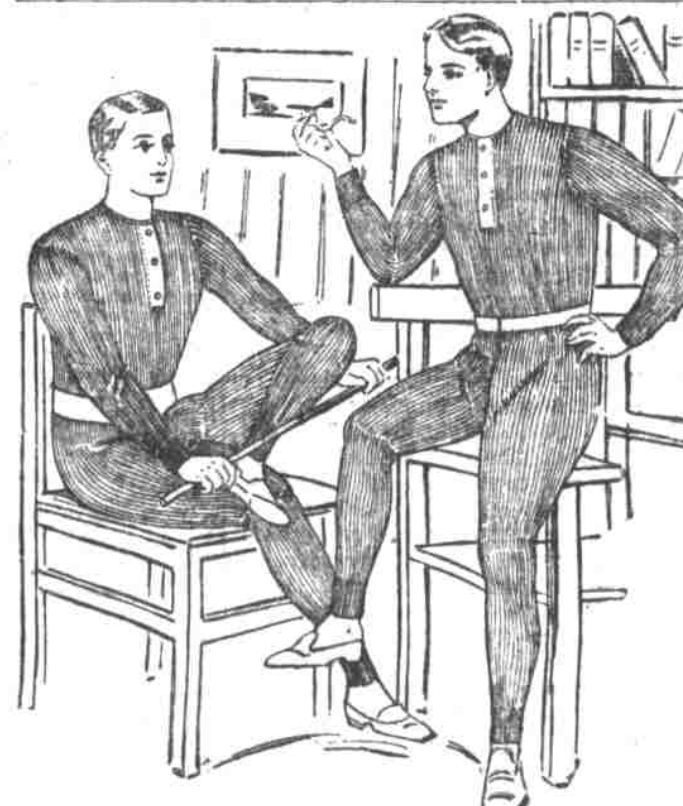

NO UNION LABEL
FOR HATMAKERS

Manufacturers Vote to Cut
 It Out and Employes
 Are Walking Out.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 New York, Jan. 15.—Seventy-five hat factories employing approximately 25,000 persons, will be affected by a decision of the associated hat manufacturers promulgated today, discontinuing the use of the union label at all factories represented in the association.
 Following the announcement of this decision, strikes were ordered in the factories at Orange, New Jersey, employing 4000 hatters, and also in

Brooklyn, N. Y., where 500 hatters are employed.
 Samuel Mundheim, president of the Associated Hat Manufacturers, stated that the vote for the abrogation of all union contracts was unanimous. He declared that the union label was thrown out of the factories at an account of the employees of the Grier Hat company at Philadelphia failing to keep their working agreement.

Arnold Turner, treasurer of the national organization of hat manufacturers, at Danbury, Conn., this afternoon said:

"Every concern connected with the association was represented either personally or by proxy. There is a clause in our agreement with the union which provides there shall be no strike while the settlement of any question involving employees is pending."

"The association will not withdraw the label from any factory which has not given us written notice that it wants to abolish it."

"We will fight to the finish."

South Norwalk, Conn., Jan. 15.—Seven hundred hatters are out on strike here today as the result of the discontinuance of the union label by the Associated Hat Manufacturers. Four hundred are out at New Milford, Conn. At Danbury, Conn., the hatters have taken no action yet.

COARSE GOLD RUNS
\$2 TO THE PAN

Greenhorn Strikes It Rich on Baker Creek and Starts Big Stampede.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Seattle, Jan. 15.—A Dawson special says: Two dollars to the pan in coarse gold are vouchered for by some of the late arrivals from Barker creek, as having been found there, and there are others in who have seen as high as 75 cents to the pan.

The applications for claims keep pouring in at the gold office, and the excitement over the strike is increasing. Joseph Butler, the discoverer, was in town for a short time arranging details at the gold office regarding his claim, and told an interesting story of how he, as a cheechaco, made the rich find, and demonstrating therein how it is possible by persistence and hope to unearth rich gold places in the Yukon today.

Greenhorn's Luck.
 Butler came into this country only last summer. Before coming he had been enamored of the north from what he had read, and was so desirous of learning how to prospect and to recover gold that he read everything on which he could lay his hands which touched on the subject. Among other things he read that gold is where you find it, and that greenhorns often get it where old timers would not dream of it. Butler also read that often gold is found in the benches overlooking any stream known to carry gold. It

was this last point in particular which stuck with Butler, and caused him to hit the right spot. He happened to go to Barker creek, and traveling along that stream got into conversation with Charley Graham, the veteran hydraulic man of that creek. Butler asked Graham about getting a good place to prospect, and Graham told him to take his choice of all outdoors.

Joe Finds His Fortune.
 Having a pair of field glasses with him, Butler began throwing his search lights over the valley, and his eyes struck on a high bench which looked good to him. It was heavily covered with trees and shrubbery, but he determined to go there and try his luck. He did so and sank a deep shaft through the refractory gravels and frozen muck.

It was a hard, sweet, bringing job, but it brought results. At the bottom of the shaft the colored man dropped into a bed of the yellow, left there by the channels of ages, which would rouse the blindest psychopondia.

It was Joe's supreme moment, the happiest point in his life, when he washed the first pan and saw the coarse yellow there before his very eyes glaring him full in the face and beckoning him on to fortune and success.

Robert Dempsey.

 Eugene, Or., Jan. 15.—The remains of Lyman Sylvester, a well known veteran of the civil war, were buried in

the L. O. O. F. cemetery here today. He died at his home in this city Tuesday, at the age of 80 years. He was born in New York state and served in the Twelfth Michigan Infantry during the war, being taken as a prisoner by the Confederates and incarcerated in both the Libby and Andersonville prisons. He was a member of the M. E. church and of the local G. A. R. post. He leaves a wife and two children.

George Dement.
 Roseburg, Or., Jan. 15.—George Dement, 70 years of age, a pioneer hotel keeper of Myrtle Creek, died at that place Tuesday. He was a highly respected citizen.
