PLAN GREAT EXHIBITION

Architectural Club's Second Annual Show Will Open March 22.

The Portland Architectural club has sent out announcements for its second annual exhibition, to be held from March 22 to April 10, inclusive. On the evening of March 22 will be held a preliminary and private view, at which time will be entertained representatives from nearly all of the architectural organizations along the coast and the plans for the formation of a Pacific coast league of architecture will be discussed. On Tuesday night, March 23, will be held a reception to the friends of the architectural club. The exhibition will then be open to the public from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. on week days and 12 m. to 5 p. m. on Sundays. The usual free afternoon, Thursday and Saturday, will be held according to the rules of the Museum of Fine Arts, where the exhibition is to be held.

Correspondence from all the leading architects west of the Rockies, indicates that the exhibition will be far superior to that of last year, especially in works of sculpture and of domestic architecture and decoration. Special arrangement is being made for a representative of the club in the east to forward examples of the best work in Boston, New York, Chicago, and the middle western cities. It is hoped that the Massachusetts Institute of Technology will send a good sized exhibit and the club has the work of Jules Guerin to include in the New York exhibit, some of his famous Egyptian series of illustrations that have been so popular in the country for many years. A large illustrated catalogue is being planned and it is expected that it will far exceed last year's attempt.

An interesting feature of the exhibition will be the first public view of the scholarship work as set by the junior members of the Portland Architectural club, under the direction of the scholarship committee. Monthly problems have been held for the purpose and much interest is shown in the prize scholarship offered for the most meritorious work.

COMMISSION ON FISHERIES LAW

Washington Senate Provides for Cooperation With Oregon.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 16.—To confer with a like committee from the Oregon legislature the senate yesterday provided a committee of eight to make recommendations on laws for the government of fisheries on the Columbia river. The committee is to leave next week on a tour of the river, it is hoped to have offered for passage a law covering the question fully and in case the committee does this it will undoubtedly pass without serious opposition.

In the house a resolution was passed asking congress to pass the rivers and harbors bills now offered in the house, insuring on liberal appropriations for the Snake and Columbia rivers.

WILL IRRIGATE BY ELECTRICITY

Luzon Land Company to Improve Tract on North Bank Road.

Luzon, a new town on the Columbia river 170 miles east of Portland, will have the distinction of being the first town in the country to have electric lights before a town lot is even offered for sale. It is located on the North Bank road, and is surrounded by one of the finest irrigated orchard tracts in the Columbia river valley.

The Luzon Land company has just completed arrangements for the installation of an immense light and power station, electricity from which will be used for pumping water from the Columbia river for irrigation; also for general lighting and power purposes. The plan of this new project is unique. The company has laid out a large tract of land surrounding the town in five and ten acre tracts and they propose to put water and electric lights on each and every five acre tract.

There is no doubt but that in the near future there will be a large amount of rich land along the Columbia river put under irrigation in this way and it will make it worth from \$200 to \$500 per acre, where it is now really good for nothing.

W. H. Moore, president of the Moore Investment company, is manager of the Luzon Land company in Portland. Mr. Moore said there was probably 8000 to 10,000 acres of land in the vicinity of Luzon worth practically nothing without irrigation, but could be made richly productive. Mr. Moore estimates that five acres well irrigated along the Columbia river is more valuable to the man of small means than a section of wheat land in any of the ordinary wheat districts of Washington or Oregon.

CONTRACT LET FOR \$30,000 RESIDENCE

Contracts have been awarded for the residence and garage for Harry McCormick to be erected on East Salmon street, between East 27th and East 28th streets, which will cost aside from lawn improvements the sum of \$30,000. The residence will be solid brick with pressed brick facing and tenno sandstone relief, and the garage will be pressed brick veneering and stone relief. The residence will be large with spacious verandas flanked with red quarry tiles. The main living room will be 20 by 42 feet, dining room 17 by 22 feet, with large library and den, lower and upper reception halls, five bedrooms on the second floor and four bedrooms in the attic. There will be three bath rooms in the residence, and one in the garage with keepers apartments, repair shop and other accommodations. The residence will be finished in mahogany, quarter sawed eastern oak, and flat grain Oregon fir with real tile floors and walls to bath rooms.

One feature of the plumbing system that is undoubtedly an original idea with the owner and architect in this state, is a system of independent control to each and every fixture installed in the buildings from a switch board in the basement with sight feed on the bleaders at the switch board so that the keeper may have full control of each and every fixture throughout.

The foundations are in place, and it will require about seven months to render the buildings ready for occupancy.

ELECTRICAL MARVELS SHOWN AT CHICAGO

Chicago, Jan. 16.—The fourth annual electrical show opened in the Coliseum today and will continue for two weeks. After visiting the mammoth exhibition one is almost inclined to discredit the words of the famous Edison that the electrical industry is still in its infancy.

The elaborate and varied displays not only illustrate the progress made by electric light, heat and power during the past 25 years, but also show many wonderful devices and inventions of recent date with which the general public is little acquainted.

Electrical cooking devices form one of the unique features of the exhibition. Practical demonstrations show how the housewife can get up in the morning and by the mere pushing of a button have breakfast ready within eight minutes. Other interesting exhibits are of electrical heating apparatus, of laundry machinery, sanitary devices and cleaners and numerous other household necessities.

The show, however, is not all novelties. The big new practical things in electricity prevail to a large extent. Much more working machinery is displayed than at the previous shows, illustrating the countless uses of the electric motor in the home, the factory, the store and for transportation on land and sea.

QUESTIONS BEFORE HEBREW COUNCIL

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 16.—Several hundred delegates representing nearly all parts of the country, have arrived in Philadelphia to attend the twenty-first annual convention of the American Hebrew Congress. The gathering will be formally opened tomorrow and will continue in session until Friday.

The discussion of educational matters will have a prominent place on the program. Other problems to be considered include the following: What can be done to prevent the enactment of Sunday laws in so far as such laws are detrimental to those who observe the seventh day of the week as their Sabbath? What can be done to prevent sectarian teaching and practices in the public schools? How may Hebrew congregations in small communities be assisted in maintaining their organization? What shall be done toward affiliating congregations outside the limits of the United States with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations?

BRANCH Y. M. C. A. IN SELLWOOD

Portland Association Buys Site for Building for Suburban Members.

Sellwood is to have a branch of the Portland Y. M. C. A. lot on Unadilla avenue has already been purchased. The site is a 50-foot lot between East Thirtieth and East Fourteenth streets, for which \$400 was paid.

At a meeting of the Sellwood Ministerial association held last Monday, the following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, That it is the desire of the ministers of the Sellwood Ministerial association that work should be begun on the branch Y. M. C. A. in Sellwood not later than next autumn."

The ministers resolved to push the matter of the new building with a view to securing its erection within the next few months. It has not been determined just what character of building will be erected, but that it will be large enough to meet the needs of the community has already been assured.

PAVING QUESTION CAUSES DEBATE

Charter Revision Committee Gives Both Sides a Hearing—Decision Reserved.

Shall the city allow the laying of patented paving stones? This is the question which agitated the charter revision committee, yesterday afternoon. Dan Kellaher introduced an amendment which would shut out every kind of paving laid under a patented process unless bids are first received on the pavement answering the same general purpose as the patented article.

After a presentation of data by Senator Kellaher, who is fighting patents, and by R. W. Montague, representing the Warren Construction company, which is in the paving concern chiefly interested in Portland, the commission decided to postpone voting on the amendment until the next regular meeting, Tuesday night.

Walter B. Warren, of the Warren Construction company, came out from Boston to tell the members of the charter commission that the abolition of the patented processes will really deprive the city of competition, though seemingly a blow at the monopoly. He told Mr. Montague before the meeting that the date of the hearing has not been decided. He produced a letter from Chicago, which city has put the ban on the patented paving. The reading of this letter, telling of this move, made a visible impression on the commission.

THAW HAS CHANCE TO SHOW SANITY

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, N. Y., Jan. 16.—Harry Kendall Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, the architect, will be given another opportunity to prove that he is sound mentally, according to a decision made today by Justice Tompkins of the supreme court.

The hearing will take place in New York county. Ever since Thaw was sent to Matteawan asylum after his second trial for killing White he has been awaiting the opportunity that Justice Tompkins, ruling gives.

The date of the hearing has not been set. Justice Tompkins will decide whether he will act alone in the case or will leave the decision as to Thaw's mental condition to a referee or commission. Justice Tompkins declared Thaw, in his opinion, was entitled to another examination.

PROFIT SHARING IN CLOTHING BUSINESS

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 16.—That the capital and labor problem can be solved is the belief of George Mosbacher, proprietor of the Palace Clook and Suit company of this city, who, besides paying his employees a weekly salary, shares the profits of the year with them. The first dividends were declared when he presented the clerks of five and two years service with checks giving the former sum amounting to as much as many clerks earn in a year. Mosbacher announced that the same mutual sharing would be in vogue during the coming year.

BUILD HOTEL ON EAST SIDE

Sewall & Stevens Buy Site Near New Southern Pacific Depot.

Two enterprising owners of property on East Morrison street seeing the demand for a hotel in the vicinity of the new east side depot of the Southern Pacific railroad have let the contract for the foundation of such a structure to cover a quarter block at East Third and East Morrison streets. The new hotel will be erected for Sewall & Stevens by the Hurley-Mason company. Concrete piles will be driven to support the superstructure.

The owners have not determined upon the height of the structure, but it is probable that it will be four or five stories. East side business men believe that a fine hotel on East Morrison street will not only prove a paying investment, but that it will be particularly beneficial to the entire east side business district.
