Dr. Brougher Coming Home—Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher is expected to return this week and will occupy his pulpit next Sunday at the White Temple. Yesterday he spoke in Cleveland, Ohio, in the great church known as the Rockefeller church because it is attended by the oil king and was built largely from his money. The Sunday preceding he spoke twice in the Tremont church in Boston, probably the most important Baptist church in the country. He has become interested in the "Live as Jesus would live" movement which has enlisted so many young people throughout the country. It was started by Rev. Charles Sheldon, author of "In His Steps" and has found many followers. Dr. Brougher announces his intention of introducing the movement into his church here.

The suit of the Hof Brau and other liquor selling restaurants and cafes for an injunction against the city's interfering with the sale of liquor in the places interested will be tried in the circuit court this afternoon. Attorney Dan J. Maloney will present the arguments for the plaintiffs and Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson will represent the city. The licensees were refused to pay the tax by the council more than a month ago and they have been operating ever since in defiance of the law. In the injunction restraining the city of police from arresting the proprietors of the restaurants tendered money in payment for licenses to sell liquor and that the city refused to give the licenses therefor.
