

BRANDS JOHN C. YOUNG AS MORMON

Rev. H. N. Smith, District Superintendent of Congregational Church, Stirs Up Baptist Ministers by Attacking Postmaster.

"I do not believe in taking up a petty Republican scrap," said Rev. E. A. Smith of Arleta, "but this man Young seems to me to be only a trimmer, or a man sucking a political teat. Whether he is a Mormon man or a Bourne man is of no importance to us, but whether or not he is a fit man to hold the position to which he aspires does concern us." In this way John C. Young, who has been appointed postmaster for Portland, was hailed at the Baptist ministers' meeting today. Rev. H. N. Smith, district superintendent for the Congregational church brought up the matter of Young's fitness and said that on the ground of Young's Mormonism the ministry of Portland should protest against his appointment as postmaster. Mr. Smith is presenting this matter to the various ministerial bodies in the hope that they will take concerted action against Young.

Last week, however, he approached the Methodists but he said, "they indulged in a political row over the matter and to my regret made no excuse for a heated political discussion."

Branded as Mormon. Mr. Smith insisted that he wished to stir up no political feeling on the matter, but merely wished to arouse public opinion against the man. He branded Young as a Mormon and said that he secured for Bourne the entire Mormon vote of eastern Oregon which their strong numbers there make a considerable factor in the election. He said that Young expected the appointment from Bourne; that Young also had recently moved to Portland in view of such an appointment and that this city is not his home. He said that he was not a bona fide home.

Rev. E. A. Smith of Arleta took up the discussion. "I do not believe in mixing in a petty Republican scrap," he said, "and whether this man is a Mormon or a Bourne man is of no importance. If the only objection to him is that he is a Bourne man he is all right. I am a Mormon and a political hanger on I am averse to him. If his character is such as is stated it should be investigated. On motion a committee consisting of Mr. Smith of Arleta and Rev. Thurston of Sellwood was appointed to look up Young's past record and character that the association might determine what action to take."

Was on Hoodlums. Mr. Smith of Arleta then introduced the subject of the hoodlums that frequent Kern Park and Arleta, and said that their vulgar language which can be heard for a long distance is an insult to the community. He said that the police had been appealed to without result, for they seemed afraid to handle the boys and men. Consequently Mr. Smith and some eight or ten strong helpers of the church faction have agreed to go on some night with wide awakes to teach these young toughs a lesson, and Mr. Smith asserted, if the police interfere they will get a paddling, too.

Councilman Rushlight was to have addressed the meeting this morning on municipal questions. But his business as a plumber made it impossible for him to get away. He said he had so many other pipes to clear out and get in order that he could not clear out his own to give a speech.

Rev. Hecock spoke in his place and told how he was converted to the Baptist church after being raised a Presbyterian by a Methodist mother and a Quaker father.

Indian Makes Horrifying Discovery on Shore of Vashon Island.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Jan. 18.—The badly decomposed and horribly mutilated body of an unknown man, crushed into a wooden box and thrown high and dry by the tides on the shores of Vashon Island, was discovered Saturday afternoon by an Indian fisherman, who, on making the discovery made his way to Tacoma as fast as possible in his canoe. The body was found in the matter to the Pierce county coroner.

Coroner Snyder of King county was immediately notified of the case and early this morning Deputy Coroner Hill and Deputy Sheriff Leighton left for the scene of the discovery.

That the man was murdered is evident and that he had been dead for some time is shown by the fact that his body is badly decomposed, so badly that it is impossible to identify him. In fact, the Indian making the discovery could not give any description of it, where he found it, or of the case. The body will be brought here tonight.

BLACK HAND IN AMBUSCADE Squad Decoyed and Officers Kill Two and Wound Nine.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Pa., Jan. 18.—In a battle between state police and a Black Hand band early today two of the Black Hand men were fatally shot and nine captured. Bloodhounds are tracking those who succeeded in escaping the officers.

She notified the authorities, who laid a trap for the Black Handers. STORE FLOODED

Damage estimated at \$20,000 was caused the stock of Shanahan's big store last night through a flood that came through the roof when the evening thaw was well under way.

The Shanahan store has a 50 foot front that is but a single store's height, and when this great bank of snow started to melt it had no outlet because the escape pipes were frozen. The result was that the load centered on the weak spot in the roof and then came through on the goods in the front of the store, the most valuable goods in stock.

The front wall of the store is some three feet above the level of the roof and this served as a dam that backed up the water from the melting snow. Not only did the water spoil the goods on the top floor, but the backing floods went on through to the basement and, finding no way of escape there, formed a lake as big as the basement and constantly deepening.

Even yet the damage is increasing, because there is still no way of escape from the roof waters, and until the snow entirely melts the streams will keep coming through the roof, filtering down to the basement and there adding inch by inch to the cellar pool.—Daily News.

CHINOOK CAUSES FLOOD

\$50,000 Worth of Dry Goods Damaged in Shanahan's Big Third Street Store.

The sudden thaw that came on yesterday morning played havoc with Lawrence Shanahan's big stock of dry goods on Third street. The severe frost froze all the water pipes and gave trouble, and when the chinook wind came the pipes could not thaw out fast enough, as they were covered with a thick coat of ice. The consequence was that the water came down in torrents through the second and first floors and into the basement, where the immense stock is kept. About \$50,000 worth of cloaks, suits, ladies' underwear, hosiery, gloves, sheeting, blankets, comforters, men's furnishings, notions, ribbons, laces, men's underwear, calicoes, gingham, percales, lawns and other goods were damaged, more or less, and the staff of clerks had an exciting time removing the stock as best they could to places of safety.—Journal.

SHANAHAN'S FLOODED

Big Stock of Dry Goods Damaged by Snow Water.

The eaves troughs of the building on Third street, occupied by L. Shanahan, the dry goods merchant, were frozen during the late cold spell and when the thaw set in the water was unable to run off through the gutters, with the result that it soaked through the roof and damaged a large portion of the stock on both floors and basement. Mr. Shanahan stated that about \$50,000 worth of all kinds of goods were more or less damaged.—Oregonian and Telegram.
