

ALL LAND IN CHAIRS BUT NORTON

Spirit of Make Everybody Happy Spreads to Senate—Norton Not Slighted; Only Overlooked—Committee List in Full.

Salem, Or., Jan. 18.—Every member of the senate except one, Democrats included, gets a chairmanship. Apparently there was no idea of discrimination against Senator Norton, and there appeared to be satisfaction, although all the members did not get the plums they wanted.

Norton of Josephine, classed as an independent, was the one man who missed a chairmanship.
The judiciary chairmanship went to Hart of Baker, as expected, and Nottingham of Multnomah landed the headship of ways and means. Senator J. N. Smith of Marion was given two good chairmanships, banking and medicine, pharmacy and dentistry.

Schofield of Clatsop goes to the head of fishing industries and Wood of Washington takes the chairmanship of game. Chase of Coos and Curry is at the head of commerce and navigation. Roads and highways is again headed by Johnson of Benton and Polk.

Democrats Do Well.
The Democratic senators landed well. Miller of Linn, the minority floor leader, leads the committee on federal relations. Mutt of Jackson, on the committee on claims. Abraham, on counties, Albee, on elections and privileges; Kay, on resolutions; Kellner, on public buildings and navigation—Chase, on revision of laws.

Senator Norton, the sole senator without a chairmanship, expressed himself as satisfied and said he did not ask for any.
It is understood President Bowerman picked him and did not intend to slight the member from Josephine, so there will be no hard feelings over it.

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LEGISLATURE OF WASHINGTON PUTS TOGA UPON JONES
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CONVENTION FOR NAMING SENATOR

Salem, Jan. 18.—Senator Coffey's resolution petitioning congress for the calling of a constitutional convention to propose an amendment for election of senators by the people was adopted in the senate this morning. There were two or three votes in opposition, but as there was no roll call the negative did not go on record.

By a vote of 14 to 13 the senate adopted a resolution memorializing congress for an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for a road from Valdez to Nome in Alaska.
Senator M. A. Miller presented a memorial from the people who adopted the signatures of 100 citizens asking for the better protection of game and for bounties on destructive animals.

Hart introduced a resolution for the appointment for the general senate meeting of a committee on the matter of the judiciary committee, of which Hart is chairman.
Eight new bills were introduced at the morning session, but none of these was of an important character.

The annual meeting of the State Association of Oregon Optometrists was held last Friday evening in the offices of Vice-President E. M. Dallas in the Pulling building. The principal business of the meeting was the election of officers and the selection of six names to be presented to the governor for use in case he wishes to make any changes in the state board of optometry.

Officers were elected as follows: President, E. O. Mattern; vice-president, E. M. Dallas; secretary, Dr. Christensen; treasurer, Dr. Koller; and Dr. Keiser, Potter, Kollie and Hoyt as a board of directors.
The following recommendations were made to the governor: Dr. Dallas, Dr. Christensen and Dr. Kollie of Portland; Dr. Hoyt of Hillsboro; Dr. Watts of Eugene, and Dr. Potter of Newberg.

Members of the present state board of optometry, all of whom were informed by the people who adopted the terms of Portland, Dr. H. W. Barr of Salem, and Dr. C. W. Lowe of Portland.
It was voted to hold a meeting of the society in this city at an early date at which the papers by opticians and oculists will be read, subjects discussed pertaining to the human eye and mechanical problems having to do with lenses and their manufacture presented. An effort will be made to bring about a closer union of the optometrists of the state.
