DIFFERENTIALS OF NEW HAVEN

Trunk Line Committee Considers Case Important to Western Traffic.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

New York, Jan. 19.—Much interest is manifested in railroad circles in today's meeting of the executive committee of the Trunk Line Railroad association to consider the question of the differential lower freight rates made by agreement between the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad company and the Canadian Pacific. The subject has a very important bearing upon the whole question of through freight rates to western points, and may result in the end to be referred to higher authorities than the executive committees of the trunk lines. The New Haven's position is that under the arrangement established some 15 years ago, by which it was given no differential, it has been placed in a position prejudicial to its interests. It is claimed that it has practically to compete with the lower differential freight rates already established north of the Boston & Albany line, inclusive. In addition, its interests are affected, as the company is understood to claim, by lower differential rates on steamboat lines to the southward of New York and elsewhere connecting with southern trunk lines, which have thus an undue advantage, particularly to points in the southwest. In the same line of disadvantage to the New Haven company, as is claimed, are the differentials existing over the combined lake and rail

30,000 TONS OF ICE WILL BE HARVESTED BY GREAT NORTHERN

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 19.—The Great Northern is building tracks into Loon Lake, 80 miles from Spokane, preparatory to harvesting an ice crop of 30,000 tons. The ice runs from a foot to 18 inches in thickness. Enough will be cut to furnish the entire western section of the Great Northern system.

CAMINETT OPENS UPON THE ESPEE

Wants Rate Increases and Waterfront Activities Investigated.

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 19.—State Senator Anthony Caminetti has turned loose on the Southern Pacific. In two resolutions introduced in the upper house, the Democratic senator demands an investigation and report by the senate committee on federal relations, of the recent increase in freight rates by the railroad. He also calls on the state board of harbor commissioners to inquire into the conditions in San Francisco which have allowed the Southern Pacific to lay plans for immense improvements of the waterfront of what was once the old Presidio reservation, at the foot of Van Ness avenue. Both inquiries are designed to embarrass the railroad and may force a new alignment of the organization and anti-organization forces in the upper house.

HONOR MEMORY OF GENERAL LEE

New Orleans, Jan. 19.—The birthday anniversary of General Robert E. Lee was observed in New Orleans today by the closing of the schools and public offices and the holding of memorial exercises under the auspices of the Confederate veterans and other organizations.

Dallas, Texas, Jan. 19.—General Lee's birthday was appropriately observed in Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth and other cities of Texas.

Augusta, Ga., Jan. 19.—General Lee's birthday was generally observed here. The principal exercises were held in the courthouse under the auspices of the Augusta chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Mobile, Ala., Jan. 19.—Throughout Alabama today the Lee anniversary was observed with interesting exercises under the auspices of the various organizations of veterans and affiliated societies. In this city banks, public offices and business houses were closed.

MARITAL WOES OF THE GUGGENHEIMS

New York, Jan. 19.—Grace B. Guggenheim has brought suit in the supreme court for divorce from William Guggenheim, and alimony on the ground that her husband had been guilty of adultery. The length of time, previous to the action, prescribed by law, for the parties to the present action have been married in the meantime. Grace B. Guggenheim, after the supposed divorce, married a Frenchman 15 years her junior, who has instituted proceedings to annul their marriage on the ground that her divorce from Guggenheim was illegal. It is alleged that William Guggenheim lived with her only one month. His attorneys today said: "We put \$150,000 in her name

several years ago and now it is all gone. We are not accountable for her distress."

Chicago, Jan. 19.—Final disposition of the divorce action brought by Grace B. Guggenheim against William Guggenheim was entered on the records of the Cook county circuit court today, having been suppressed for eight years.

PARCELS POST LOOKS GOOD TO THESE MEN

Dallas, Texas, Jan. 19.—Every section of the state was represented today at the opening of the eleventh annual convention of the Retail Dealers' Hardware & Implement Association of Texas. The convention will be in session three days and from all indications it will be the most important as well as the largest gathering ever held by the association. The parcels post and numerous other subjects of importance to the retail trade will be discussed. The association will be taken on the proposition to extend the territory of the association so as to include Oklahoma, Kansas and Louisiana. In connection with the meeting there is a large exhibition of hardware, implements and vehicles.

Minneapolis, Minn., Jan. 19.—The annual meeting of the Northwestern Lumbermen's association, which opened here today, attracted representatives of nearly 2000 lumber yards throughout Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and the Dakotas. The convention will remain in session three days. The code of trade ethics and the parcels post are two of the most important subjects scheduled for consideration.

DRANK ACID; FOUND FROZEN STIFF IN CAR

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 19.—Frozen stiff and covered with a coat of ice and snow, the body of a well dressed man has been found in an empty Northern Pacific car. According to the coroner he had drunk acid, and the car was found in a ditch. A check on a Seattle laundry company, a Seattle newspaper and \$40 in money were found in his pockets. The man had evidently been dead several weeks.

FAMED OLD INN UNDER HAMMER

"Star and Garter" Has Sheltered England's Great, and Even Royalty.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

London, Jan. 19.—Another of England's famous old inns, "The Star and Garter," at Richmond, has recently gone under the auctioneer's hammer. Many Americans will remember this place as among the quaintest on the upper reaches of the Thames. From the high terrace on which the old inn stands you can look down upon one of the finest landscapes in England, including Twickenham ferry, reminiscent of the scene of that name. "Thousands of the sons of that name," thousands of American tourists have in recent years stopped at "The Star and Garter," for such a visit has been judged one of the indispensable experiences of the proper "seeing of England."

The main interest in the old inn is, of course, historical. In its early days it was the resort of the greatest social leaders of the time. Even kings and queens did not consider it beneath their dignity to stop there. The tavern began its career more than 270 years ago, and first won a reputation for itself by its fine wine cellar over which connoisseurs made a sacred spot again.

After enjoying an enormous prestige, the old inn deteriorated somewhat for a decade, but its ancient glories revived when Queen Victoria and the prince consort stopped there for a short while. Any public place like this in England is always endeared with renewed life when royalty deigns to notice it, and for many years after the visit of the queen and her husband, the old "Star and Garter" blossomed like the green bay tree.

The Sunday dinners given at the Richmond tavern became a famous among the gourmets of "Europe. One of the dishes for which it "distinguished" itself was "whitebait"—a tiny little fish about half the size of a sardine. Unless you had eaten whitebait at the "Star and Garter" your gastronomic education was not considered complete.

Sale of Old Furniture.
During recent years the inn has fallen on somewhat evil times, and recently its contents were "sold off" by auctioneers. Art connoisseurs and furniture experts flocked to Richmond to secure the old pieces of furniture which the inn contained, many of them dating back nearly 500 years. Many of the articles which belonged to the old inn were bought up for sentimental reasons. "The Star and Garter" had figured in so many novels, descriptions and poems, that anything which came from it possessed value as a souvenir. It was for this reason that tiny looking glasses, old pictures and even pitchers and basins brought big prices. They may have been used by kings and queens, or written about by Dickens, Thackeray and other great writers. The inn contained many of them. It was also put up for sale, but as the bidding was not sufficiently high, the plot was subsequently withdrawn.

Electrical Men Meet.

Milwaukee, Jan. 19.—The Northwest electrical association, comprising the various electrical railway, light and power companies in Wisconsin, began its annual meeting in this city today, with headquarters at the Hotel Platteau. The proceedings will extend over several days. One of the important subjects up for discussion is that of the electric power to be secured from the Southern Wisconsin Power company at Keshish, when the \$1,000,000 dam at that place is completed.

BASKETBALL TEAM IN CASTAWAY ROLE

Bellingham, Wash., Jan. 19.—Two of the professors of the Anacortes High school and the five students forming the Anacortes basketball team were wrecked in the launch Beaver on the government jetty near Laconner Saturday night, and as a result an investigation will be asked of the federal authorities to ascertain why a light was not burning on the jetty. Professors Craig and Pope, A. McRae, L. Foster, A. Radcliffe, R. Trastron and E. R. Stewart, the members of the team, left Anacortes Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock bound for Laconner to play the high school five at that place. It was about 8 o'clock in the evening when the Beaver bumped into the jetty. A great hole was blown in the bottom of the launch and with the darkness and wind against them they came near losing the fight. About midnight all managed to climb upon the jetty and after crawling almost a mile on their hands and knees they reached land. It was 10 o'clock in the morning when they reached Laconner.
