Captain Felix Neale Dead—Captain Felix R. Neale, 71 years old, a civil war veteran and for more than 30 years a known resident of Portland, died suddenly Monday morning at his residence on East Burnside street. Captain Neale was a native of Kentucky. He enlisted in the regular army some years before the breaking out of the civil war and served in nearly all of the Pacific coast army posts. He saw service during the war in a regiment of Kentucky cavalry and was afterward first sergeant of a company in the first United States cavalry. He was in many of the great battles fought by the army of the Potomac and was desperately wounded at Gettysburg and Five Forks. At the latter place receiving a wound in the shoulder from which he never fully recovered. At the time of his death he was a member of Sumner Post, No. 1, R. and of Phalanx lodge, Knights of Pythias. His wife and the following children survive him: Charles Neale, Mrs. Mary L. Neale, Mrs. Mattie Welch and Mrs. Sadie Peterson, all of Portland. The funeral will be held at Dunning's undertaking parlors tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment at Lone Fir cemetery. Sumner Post, No. 1, G. A. R. and Phalanx lodge, K. of P., will have charge of the funeral.

Inspects National Guard—The annual inspection of the Oregon National Guard was begun last night by Major E. F. McLaughlin, fourth United States field artillery, who inspected Company B. Third infantry at Oregon City. It was the close of the inspection, Major McLaughlin complimented Captain F. A. Loomis, commanding the company, upon the splendid showing made by this organization. The company was marked excellent as a result of the inspection, and Major McLaughlin said it had reached that state of proficiency required by the war department in a general order issued in 1903, in which various state national guards were given until 1910 to equal the regular army in point of efficiency. Major McLaughlin inspected the Woodburn company today, tomorrow he goes to Salem, at Albany Thursday, after which he returns to Portland and will spend several days inspecting the guard organizations of this city.

German Aid Society Election—At the annual meeting of the Portland German Aid Society recently held, the following officers were elected: President, John Reischner; vice president, Charles J. Schnabel; secretary, H. C. Johnson; treasurer, H. Clausen; trustees for three years, Albin Jubit; school directors, John Griebel and William Isenack; social physician, Dr. Q. S. Bohlman; Dr. F. H. Dammasch; society agent, H. C. Bohlman. To the Italian earthquake sufferers \$50 was donated and a like sum to the Children's hospital. The secretary's report showed that during 1908 the society expended \$1,214.10 for the relief of sick and destitute Germans.

Charter Commission Meeting—The charter commission will meet this evening to consider several important reports, among which will be one from the committee on police and health. A vote will be taken on the proposed amendment to the charter submitted by Senator Kellaker. The amendment is submitted in competition with others of the same general character. The amendment will be satisfactory to all the paving concerns.

Dr. Henry Goodman Dead—Word has been received here of the sudden death in New York city January 17 of Dr. Henry Goodman, formerly of this city, and well known by boyhood friends. Dr. Goodman was a native Oregonian, born in this city, who made a brilliant record in his collegiate work, and won distinction in his profession. He was for some years city physician at New York, where he built up a large practice. His mother, Mrs. Hornstein, is living in New York.

Sullivan Estate Probated—County Judge Webster yesterday admitted to probate the estate of John Sullivan, who died on January 3, and appointed the widow, Stella Sullivan, executrix. The estate is valued at \$9000, and according to the terms of the will \$2000 is to be paid to the daughter, Stella, when she reaches the age of 21, and the same amount goes to the son, Chevor. The remaining \$4000 is left to the widow.

Man Is Arrested—For persistently following a woman who was Mrs. Harms of 135 Eleventh street, C. H. Holman was arrested at Park and Morrison streets last night by Officers Inskeep and Stanton. The woman told the officers Holman had accosted her and continued to follow her for several blocks, although she paid no attention to him. Holman was charged with disorderly conduct.

Charged With Short Weight—A warrant for the arrest of John Henry, proprietor of the People's market, has been issued on complaint of J. W. Bailey, state food and dairy commissioner, who charges Henry with selling rolls of butter weighing less than two pounds. Henry is out on bail. The case will be heard in the justice court.

Offers Cheap Job—The United States civil service commission announces an examination to be held on February 17 for the position of stenographer, typewriter and German translator (male) in the United States geological survey.
