CAUGHT IN MID-LAKE FIRE TRAP

MEN BURNED OR FROZEN HORRIBLY

Sixty or More Driven by Fire at Chicago Waterworks Crib—Many Found Frozen Fast to Cakes of Ice Floating in Lake.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—The police are advised by the rescuers that 40 bodies have been taken from the tunnel, most of them so badly mutilated that identification is impossible.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Between 20 or more men who perished in the tunnel, it is estimated that from 20 to 30 are dead, while 45 are terribly burned, as result of a fire that destroyed the water company's crib, far out on the lake, early this morning.

Thomas Green was rescued in a most pitiable condition. Both his eyes were blown away and he was frozen to a piece of ice to which he had clung for an hour.

Others who were rescued had sustained severe injuries, large pieces of flesh having been torn from their bodies by explosions, supposed to have been caused by dynamite fuming caps used in the construction work.

The men, who were asleep in the superstructure, jumped into the icy water without putting on their clothes. They clung, half frozen, to floating ice, and when they were rescued they had to be torn away from the ice by force.

One man was fastened between two cakes of ice that had frozen together, holding him fast.

Several were frozen so tightly to the ice that their flesh was torn away when they were pulled loose.

Among the worst injured who have been brought ashore are: Charles Rose, James Redmond, Henry Franklin, Homer Bosman, Robert Jeffries, Logan Miller, James Lee, William F. Nye, J. Mantle, Thomas Callahan, Ralph Johnson and Charles Johnson.

Most of these men were nude when taken out of the icy water.

The bodies of 20 of the men who were driven into the tunnel and there perished have been recovered. It is believed more will be recovered later.

The fire destroyed all means of escape, and the victims remained on the wooden structure until they were actually forced by the advancing flames to spring into the water.

The crib was used temporarily as a workshop for the men engaged in constructing the great intake tunnel from the shore, five miles out under the lake. It was made of wood, and was circular, being about 100 feet in diameter. The superstructure was about 25 feet above the surface of the lake, and was used as a sleeping place for the workmen.

The crib was connected with the tunnel, 40 feet below, by a shaft. A steam elevator carried the men and tools up and down.

LOST LILLEY FROM THE HOUSE

Congressman Tries to Retain Seat in House After His Election as Governor of Connecticut—Identified With Submarine Scandal.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, Jan. 20.—Representative-at-large George L. Lilley of Connecticut was ousted from the house of representatives by unanimous vote today. It was through charges brought by Lilley that the submarine boat scandal was aired, and Lilley was severely censured in the report of the investigating committee.

Lilley was elected governor of Connecticut last fall after a campaign in which his connection with the submarine boat investigation was the main issue.

The action against Lilley was taken today because he attempted to retain his seat in the house after his election as governor.

TWO DOLLARS ON ONE INVESTED

Wells Fargo Not Ashamed to Take the Money at This Modest Rate.

New York, Jan. 20.—In discussing the evidence brought out at the hearing of shipper's complaints against Wells Fargo & Co. which is pending before Interstate Commerce Commissioner Franklin K. Lane, Attorney J. L. Brown, representative of the shipper, said today that the earnings of the express company showed profits of 200 per cent.

Of the Wells-Fargo company's capital of \$8,000,000, only \$1,500,000 is invested in the express business. On this sum for the fiscal year 1907 the company made more than two and one half times the net earnings of the American Express company on the lesser gross earnings of \$2,334,425, as against the much greater gross earnings of \$29,000,000 of the latter.

"For the Wells-Fargo received 200 per cent on its capital devoted to the express business. The Southern Pacific gets 50 per cent of the gross earnings and also one sixth of the capital stock of Wells-Fargo. The Wells Fargo company also gets 10 per cent dividend on that."

COOPER TIED FOR CARMACK MURDER

Venire of One Hundred Talesmen Present When Court Opens.

Nashville, Jan. 20.—The trial of Colonel Cooper, his son Robin Cooper and of former Sheriff John M. Sharp, jointly indicted for the murder of Senator Edward W. Carmack began today. Feeling against the accused men is high and many spectators in the court room were mourning badges in memory of Carmack.

The defendants were photographed and then appeared in the court room.

GOV. CHAMBERLAIN FORMALLY DECLARED ELECTED SENATOR

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)

Salem, Jan. 20.—Governor George E. Chamberlain was formally declared elected by the legislature by the president of the senate in joint assembly at noon today.

Following closely the requirements of the federal statute governing the election of senators, the journals of the senate and house were read, the vote for senator was canvassed, and President Chamberlain declared Governor Chamberlain to have received the majority, and therefore to have been elected. Following this announcement Senator Miller of Linn moved the appointments of a joint committee to escort Governor Chamberlain to the hall to address the assembly. The president appointed Representative Muncy, Munkers and Farrell, and Senators Miller of Linn and Albee of Multnomah.

Governor's Address.

The governor in addressing the assembly said:

"I thank you from the bottom of my heart for the great honor that has been conferred upon me by you as the representative of the people of the state of Oregon. To those of you who voted for me from choice I feel peculiarly grateful, to those of you who voted for me because you were under an express or voluntary pledge to vote for the people's choice for senator I want to say that you have shown a magnificent example of a determination to obey the people's will without regard to party ties in that you have followed their instructions, even though there might have been others of your party for whom you preferred to vote in this emergency."

Demand of People.

"For many years the people have demanded from the congress of the United States that there be submitted to them an amendment to the constitution providing for the election of senators by the direct vote of the people. But their demands have been ignored and Oregon leads the way in legislation to secure a determination to obey the people's will. It can be said that the law under which I have been elected is either a Republican or Democratic measure. It has been adopted by the people in a state with an overwhelming Republican majority, and men of all parties gave their adherence to it. It has come to say, and it is safe to predict that in the very near future other states in the union will follow the example of Oregon, and the people will through the Oregon method exercise a controlling voice in the election of those who are to represent them in the United States senate. Those who take the position that a senator can not be chosen by the direct vote of the people until the federal constitution has been amended in that respect must remember that the initiative must be taken by the several states acting in their sovereign capacity."

Absolutely Unfettered.

"Let me say to you, gentlemen of the legislature, that I go to Washington as your representative and as the representative to this magnificent commonwealth absolutely unfettered by any pledge to any person or to any party. I go as the servant of all the people, to do as God has given me the light to see it) my whole duty is in furthering the moral, commercial and industrial interests of the state. In accomplishing this, no question of party is involved. I assume that all of you—Democrats, Republicans and Independents, alike—would vie with each other in doing what is best for the whole people. In this effort you can count upon my undivided effort and support."

Will Not Be Partisan.

"I will stand shoulder to shoulder in the senate of the United States with men of all parties for carrying out the broader policies which the president has stood for, for giving me the light to see it) my whole duty is in furthering the moral, commercial and industrial interests of the state. In accomplishing this, no question of party is involved. I assume that all of you—Democrats, Republicans and Independents, alike—would vie with each other in doing what is best for the whole people. In this effort you can count upon my undivided effort and support."

BRADY IS KIND TO WAGNER

Representative Wants Constable to Hold Office for Four Years' Term and Receive Large Increase of Salary.

Salem, Or., Jan. 20.—Constable Lou Wagner has an ardent champion in Representative Brady. Brady wants Wagner to hold office for four years. He wants him to receive \$2500 each year for his services to the people of Multnomah county. He wants him to have five deputies. He wants the chief deputy to receive \$125 a month and the other four deputies \$100 a month or \$1200 a year.

To Aid the Corner, Too.

Coincident with Brady's proposed remedial legislation for the constable's office, McDonald introduced a similar bill for the corner of the corner. It provides that the corner shall receive an annual salary of \$2500. The present salary is \$1000. It also provides for two deputies, one to receive \$1000 and the other \$500 annually.

Kind to Constable.

Mr. Brady in his bill is kind to the constable and his office. The present law provides that the constable shall be elected for two years. Mr. Brady gives him four years in office. The
