

# MIKADO FEELS GRAVE CONCERN

Pressure Passed On by the President Delays Action in California.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, Jan. 21.—It is learned on high authority that expressions of the gravest concern over the revival of the Japanese trouble in California have been given by the Japanese government. Several exchanges of messages took place yesterday between President Roosevelt and Governor Gillett. The president is prepared to send a special message to congress and to take such steps as are possible within the federal power if the developments, in his opinion, seem to require him to do so.

Sacramento, Jan. 21.—All action on pending proposed anti-Japanese legislation has been deferred one week by the lower house of the legislature, following fiery war talk and sarcastic allusions to the interference of President Roosevelt in the premises by Assemblymen Grove L. Johnson of Sacramento and A. M. Drew of Fresno. Johnson was itching to make a personal attack on President Roosevelt but he was prevented from doing so by Speaker Stanton, who thrice called him to account for caustic references to the "big stick."

In this state was ready for final consideration. Drew moved that all action on the bill be put over for one week. Johnson readily assented. Assemblyman Johnson took the floor. He said he had the highest regard for the governor of the state, but believed that official had desired a postponement of action on the anti-Japanese measures he should have sent a message to the house embodying his wishes. "If for one," he shouted, "I have no fear of the big stick nor—"

"Pardon me," interrupted Speaker Stanton, "vigorous" using his gavel, "you are discussing the merits of the measure involved is not permissible." Johnson gave in, but continued with his talk. Continuing he said: "The telegram of the president intimates that war with Japan will ensue if we pass these bills. While I deprecate war, I am willing to face whatever consequences result from the passage of anti-Japanese measures."

Drew says, "Let War Come." Assemblyman Drew said: "I favor these bills. I have told my people that I would work for their passage, and I have never heard a good reason advanced why they should not be made laws. 'If a conflict between America and Japan has got to come, it may just as well come now as ever. We are better prepared for it now than we will be in 10 years. While I think we should comply with the governor's request for a postponement, I want to say that I think the terms of the president's letter are insulting to the legislature, and I, for one, am not going to be threatened into submission or compelled to cease fighting for the measure.'"

Drew introduced in the assembly yesterday a resolution calling for an investigation of Japanese conditions in California. The resolution provides for the appointment of a committee of three assemblymen to make the inquiry and appropriate money to defray all expenses that may be incurred by the investigators.

# CONGDON NAMED M. P. FOR YUKON

Former Governor Who Suffered Defeat Four Years Ago Has Big Lead.

Dawson, Jan. 21.—Frederick Tennyson Congdon, former governor of this territory and at the present time following Congdon, former parliament today on the Liberal ticket by a tremendous lead, so far as the precincts heard from are concerned, and it is not likely that all the rest of the territory can change the vote. Congdon seemed to be the one man on whom all the other candidates centered their attacks, and he faced what seemed to be, even among the men who bet, sure defeat.

In that election the Liberal were split, and Dr. Thompson, who discarded his pronounced Conservative declaration to accept a compromise platform, was enabled to win. Congdon is the most brilliant orator ever heard in the north and the fact that he faced three candidates in open debate all through the campaign, besides many bitter personal enemies, makes his victory all the more pronounced, and is due to his ability to thrash all who oppose him in debate.

# LONGEST SINGLE TRAIN SERVICE

Hill Will Haul From Galveston to Sound Without a Break.

Tacoma, Jan. 21.—The longest single train service in the United States is to be inaugurated by the Great Northern railroad, which on June 1 will begin operating through trains between Galveston, Texas, and Seattle, according to advices just received here. Trains will run via the Colorado Southern and other Hill controlled lines from the gulf to Denver over the Burlington system to Billings and Great Falls, and thence over the main line of the Great Northern to the sound city.

The projected new train service is the result of a struggle between Hill and Harriman for railroad supremacy in the west and southwest. Through control recently acquired of lines operating to the gulf, Hill will be able to enter the heart of the rich territory formerly dominated by Harriman. Through this arrangement Hill will be able to haul all the cotton and other products of the south directly to tidewater for shipment to the orient.
