The ways and means committee of the city council yesterday recommended an appropriation of \$187,745 for the police department for 1909. The largest single item is \$35,000 for the erection of an auxiliary station on the east side.

The salary of Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin, superintendent of the women's auxiliary to the police department, was recommended to be reduced from \$150 a month to \$115. The committee took the stand that Mrs. Baldwin's salary was higher than that of the city detectives and that her salary should be no higher than theirs.

Suits Filed Up Against Waterbury's Creditors Keep Circuit Court Busy.

Suits against G. W. Waterbury threaten to keep the state circuit court busy for some time to come if they continue to pile up at the rate they have of late.

The second suit is brought against Waterbury and the American Bank & Trust company, in which he is a director, and was at the time of the transactions related in the complaint the president of the People's Market association, and is a suit for an accounting.

The complaint alleges that on June 1, 1906, the American Bank & Trust company caused to be transferred to Waterbury, to be held in trust merely, one share of the stock of the People's Market association, for the sole purpose of enabling Waterbury to be elected a director of the plaintiff corporation.

But up to the present time, according to the allegations of the complaint, he has failed and refused to make any accounting, and that is what the plaintiff asks the court to order him to do.

Waterbury in his answer put in a counter claim for \$75 which he said Wilson owed him for five days' rent for part of a building on Washington street. In deciding the case Judge Cleland allowed Waterbury credit for four days' rent, or \$60, and gave judgment for the plaintiff for \$132.10 minus the \$60.

STAMP SALES TOTAL \$1020

Returns From Anti-Tuberculosis Campaign Are Still Coming In.

The sales of holly stamps for the Visiting Nurse anti-tuberculosis campaign now total the gratifying sum of \$112.16, with returns still coming in from outside the city and a number of firms in the city still selling. The exact disposition of the money will not be decided until a conference has been called of the various workers in the cause, representatives of the state board of health, the sanitaria for consumptives and others. However, all the money raised will be expended in this state and it is probable that a free sanatorium will be erected for tubercular patients, and perhaps a free dispensary in the city.

GETS FUNDS FOR ALBANY COLLEGE

The campaign for endowment fund of Albany college, which is proceeding in this city under the personal superintendence of President Crooks of that institution, is rapidly reaching the figure which has been set. Already over three fourths of the required sum is subscribed, and it is now thought that no difficulty will be encountered in reaching the \$10,000 mark which has been set.

By the addition of other pledges which become operative if the \$10,000 mark is attained, the sum of \$15,000 will become available, and the understanding is that if this amount is secured in Oregon it will be duplicated in the eastern states. The total endowment fund of \$50,000, which will place Albany college upon a substantial and permanent footing, greatly adding to its usefulness. President Crooks will remain in the city until January 27, and the campaign will be continued until that date, as the inclemency of the weather has greatly hindered the committee in getting about, and a number of business men are still to be reached.
