MURDERS THREE OF OWN BLOOD

Crazy Student at Mayence Horribly Mangles Father and Three Sisters.

Berlin Jan. 22.—A murder of the most appalling description is reported from Mayence. In an access of mania the student son of a wealthy wine dealer arose in the night and killed his father and three sisters, aged respectively 25, 20 and 15. His sexagenarian father, Nicolaus, was for many years a member of the reichstag, and had 18 children, of whom seven were gathered for a family reunion in his large house in the Saengerstrasse. Young Joseph Rothe, who is only 20 years of age, was home from his college at Bonn. On the night of the terrible crime, when the family were sleeping peacefully, he arose and prepared with strange deliberation to compass their deaths. Taking an old gun of his father's he removed the barrel and fastened in its place by means of wire a formidable blade detached from a bread cutting machine. Armed with this improvised weapon and a revolver, he entered his aged father's room and killed him with a single blow, cutting open his skull. His eldest sister was also slain in her sleep, but the two younger girls awoke when he entered their room. The elder he shot through the heart and the other was struck down with the hatchet. ALL HIS LIMBS TORN FROM BODY

Charles Gregson, Mill Hand at Ballard, Washington, Caught by a Shaft.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 22.—Caught in the low hanging shafting in the Seattle Cedar Lumber company's mill at Ballard yesterday afternoon, Charles Gregson was whirled about with terrific force and was instantly killed. When the power was shut off both arms and legs had been torn from the man's body. Gregson came here a few months ago from Indiana. DANCING PERMITTED IN CHURCH BASEMENT

Winsted, Conn., Jan. 22.—Because he permitted the young members of his flock to dance in the church, Rev. Everard W. Snow, who about a year ago came here from Beverly, Mass., and succeeded the Rev. Newell M. Calhoun, member of Yale corporation, as pastor of the Second Congregational church, has caused disapproval with threats to break the large congregation into factions. The younger element and some of the older ones, too, don't blame the pastor, but the more pious are shocked. On the night of a social, when the young folks began to dance in the basement banquet room, Miss Olive Barber, chairman of the social committee, ordered such amusement stopped. She turned out the lights to carry her point. A committee of young persons waited on Mr. Snow at the parsonage next door and he assented to their views and dancing was resumed in the edifice.

SEATTLE MAN MISSING; LEFT SUICIDE NOTE

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 22.—The police are looking for Robert W. Edwards, secretary-treasurer of the Seattle Cigar-makers union No. 128, of this city, who disappeared last Saturday from his home. His absence has been kept quiet by his friends until today when the police were asked to take a hand in locating him. A note was found in his desk at the Labor Temple, written in a rambling hand and signed by Edwards, stating that it was his intention to commit suicide.

RECALL SOUNDS FOR LOS ANGELES MAYOR

Los Angeles, Jan. 22.—After a denunciation of Mayor A. C. Harper, a mass meeting of 800 prominent citizens unanimously adopted a plan to circulate a petition among the voters and demand an election for the purpose of recalling Harper. The demand needs 8000 signatures, under the law. The principal charges of misconduct are based on his appointment of Chief of Police Kern as a member of the board of works, his alleged protection of vice and his nepotism.

Work of Solons at Olympia, Wash.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Jan. 22.—The biennial fight over the practice of osteopathy is on in the legislature. Since the new treatment of disease first came to the state there has been dissension as to its place in the medical world, and physicians have at different times tried to lay upon it burdens more or less hard to bear. In previous sessions the new system of cure has been treated as a joke, later as a serious opponent to the regular system, and now it is being taken as something worthy of serious consideration. Two bills are before the legislature, one creating an osteopathic board of examiners and providing for a license for practitioners. This is understood as meeting the demands of the osteopaths themselves. Another bill provides for the addition to the examining board of an osteopath, and giving all practitioners the same examination. This will work a hardship on the profession, and perhaps drive it from the state, in case the bill be enacted into law. Hundreds of osteopaths are practicing in the northwest, and it is understood that a concerted effort will be made to secure favorable legislation here. So far no one here represents the new cult before the legislature.

Wide Wagon Tires Bill.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Jan. 22.—Wagons with tires less than three inches wide will disappear from the state of Washington, if the good roads bill now before the legislature becomes a law. This bill provides that no wagon capable of bearing a load of more than 2000 pounds shall be allowed upon the public highways unless it have tires fully three inches wide, and for each additional ton of burden a half inch shall be added to the width of tire. In order not to work a hardship on farmers who are now using narrow tires the law assumes that in a year the necessary changes can be made, and it will not become effective until such time. The bill has the indorsement of the Good Roads association, and most of the members from the farming sections. It is expected that this legislature will make liberal appropriations for the construction of state roads, and the restriction as to width of tire to be used is almost certain to be adopted.

Eradicate Divorce Evil.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Jan. 22.—Representative Z. T. Edge of Spokane, himself a young man, takes the position that what Washington needs is not divorce laws, even stringent, but marriage laws, and for this reason he is making a new attack upon the divorce evil, which has brought the state into prominence of late. Representative Edge would make marriage more difficult, would require notice of the application for marriage licenses, and would prevent the marriage of young people with no visible means of support. His remedy for elopements is most effectual, and if put into effect would materially reduce the number of divorces asked for. The treatment of the divorce evil given by Mr. Edge is largely original, and is meeting with approval among those who give the matter study. He holds that the marriage license is the first paper connected with the divorce proceeding, and he urges that it should be given with as much care as any pleading which follows in the case.
