at \$1200, and an assistant deputy at \$950.

The Brady bill leaves the salaries of the justices the same. It provides a chief clerk at \$1800, a first assistant at \$1320, a second assistant at \$1100, a third assistant at \$900, a deputy constable at \$1000. This increases the budget in the justice court \$3160.

The coroner receives \$1000 and has no deputy. The McDonald bill provides the officials with a salary of \$8000, gives \$1000 to a first deputy and \$900 to a second deputy. This adds \$3900 to the salary list of the office.

Constable's Office.

The Multnomah county constable's office receives \$2500. The Brady bill fixes the salary of the constable at \$1500, as much as his whole office expenses is now. It provides for a chief deputy at a salary of \$1200 and for four deputy constables at \$1100 each. Heretofore there has been one deputy at a salary of \$1000. This bill increases the salary list in the constable's office just \$3500.

Feature of Situation.

One of the peculiar features of the situation is the fact that the Mahone bill, increasing the salaries in the justice office, provides for a deputy constable at a salary of \$1000, the same as the present.

The Brady bill provides for five deputies. The effect of the two bills would evidently be to give the constable's office a total of six deputies, ranging in salary from \$1000 to \$1500.

In addition to these bills is one introduced by Means of Umatilla and Morrow providing that all circuit judges receive annual salaries of \$4000. This would add \$4000 to the other sums.

SUPERNUMERARY SENATE CLERKS

Warm Debate Ends in Vote That Puts Them on the Payroll.

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)

Salem, Or., Jan. 22.—Somebody—general report says it was Senator Beach of Multnomah—had four extra clerks when the clerk was not authorized, and when the committee did not want the assistance. The avalanche of extra clerks impelled Senator Albee to fight the addition of more clerks yesterday afternoon and although it was a losing battle, he threw the spotlight on the situation and received firm support.

As Beach had left for Portland early in the afternoon, he did not take part in the discussion and it could not be learned whether the report that ascribed the unauthorized clerks to him was correct. Three of the extras were told to report to the committee on enrolled bills, but were told by Chairman Hodges that they were not needed. One of this trio and one other were told to report to Chairman Kay of the resolutions committee, but he too declined their help.

Selling Calls It Shameful.

Senator Selling said that outside of

the desk clerks and three or four of the committee clerks he did not think any were very hard worked. He referred to the extra clerks not authorized by the senate and exclaimed: "This is disgraceful. Let us be honest, gentlemen. These extra clerks are not needed, and it is nothing less than shameful."

The fight came over a resolution empowering the committee on state and county officers, headed by Senator Parrish, to employ an expert stenographer at \$5 per day.

Senator F. J. Miller, a member of the committee, said he saw no need for the extra help and renewed his offer to let his own stenographer do the work of the committee. He said he had plenty of time and it would cost nothing.

Albee Wouldn't Waste Money.

Albee presented statistics he obtained from the secretary of state showing 45 clerks had already been authorized by the senate. It was after he got this statement that the four unauthorized appointments were withdrawn. He said that clerk hire, outside the desk position, cost over \$10,000 a year. An extra clerk for Parrish's committee would cost only \$400 but in his own business, said Albee, he would not throw away \$400. If the help were needed he would willingly vote for it, but here a clerk was offered without extra cost.

Plans for the Expense.

Hart thought the senate should not be "penny wise and pound foolish." Because the clerks were not busy all the time was not a sign they were not working and earning their money, he said.

Albee thought Parrish ought to be allowed to make the necessary expenditures for his own committee. Bingham said the senators were waiting \$500 an hour talking about it. There would be plenty of chance for economy on the big appropriation bills, he said, and he wanted the committees to have all the help they needed. He did not think there would want to waste the state's money.

The Vote on the Clerks.

Albee demanded a roll call and Parrish got the clerks, 14 to 10, Parrish voting.

ONE BANK IS WANTED AS THE FISCAL AGENCY

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS AND ACTION THEREON

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S.S.S. RIDES THE SYSTEM OF CATARRH

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)

Salem, Or., Jan. 22.—A bill introduced by Representative Dimick of Clackamas county passed the house yesterday without a dissenting vote providing a life penalty for highway robbery. The bill includes assault with intent to kill or wound, being armed with a dangerous weapon. A minimum penalty of 10 years was provided but with the proviso that the judge is to observe discretion in imposing the minimum penalty and is to use it only in cases where the clemency of the court is clearly to be shown.

Assault, not being armed with a dan-

gerous weapon, is punishable under the Dimick bill by from five to 15 years in the penitentiary. The former penalty was from three to 15 years.

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
