WASHINGTON HAS CONTRACT GAME

PULLMAN DOES NOT FEAR CESSATION OF FOOTBALL RELATIONS DURING 1939.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Washington State College, Pullman, Jan. 23.—An article which appeared recently in the Sunday Seattle P. I. has been the cause of considerable surprise and comment at the state college. The Seattle paper stated that the manager of student affairs at the University of Washington had been instructed to sever all athletic relations with the state college, and was especially restricted from arranging a date for the annual football contest. Students at the state college seem to be optimistic in regard to the matter, and ex-manager McCoskey of the 1938 football team states:

"No credence is given to the report in Sunday's P. I. as received here, that the University of Washington intends to sever athletic relations with the state college, particularly so far as football is concerned. In the first place, because no communication has been received here by either the faculty committee or the student body relative to the subject, and in the second place because there is a written contract between the University of Washington and the Washington state college, made by Manager Rasmussen of the university and myself, for games in both the last and the coming season, and it is not believed for an instant that the University of Washington is in a position to or desirous of repudiating its contract."

"It is true that there were more or less newspaper comments both pro and con in regard to the eligibility ruling during the past season of football, but as rulings in regard to the eligibility of players in the U. of W.-W. S. C. game were identical in principle, by both faculty committees, it is hard to see where any permanent difference of opinion could exist."

Pullman Feels Friendly.
"The feeling in Pullman is that friendly relations in athletics and all other contests between the university and the state college is to the best interests of all concerned and tends toward the advancement of sport. That the teams of the two institutions have been well matched in skill and knowledge has been demonstrated repeatedly and it is believed that the same arrangements for all contests would be better for both institutions."

"At the recent conference in Seattle in which members of the athletic committees of the University of Washington and W. S. C. met, the friendly relations seemed to be held in no way to indicate a declaration of war on the part of the university. Let any question of the association be terminated by the event of well fought contests on the athletic field, rather than by newspaper headlines. Doubtless the delay in arranging a football date is due to the fact that the state college is arranging for graduate managers, who have not hitherto had. The athletic association here has already taken action on the matter and things now point to an early date when the graduate manager system will be part of the athletic organizations of both institutions. Much to establish and maintain amicable relations with athletic rivals."

Manager Laid Off.
Manager Laid Off in receipt of a communication from Manager Zerkow of the university in regard to the matter of the association was held here last year of the college year, and his letter seems to indicate that there will be no difficulty between the two institutions."

Middle West Bowling Tourney.

St. Joseph, Mo., Jan. 23.—With a large and representative entry list, the second annual tournament of the Middle West Bowling Association opened here tonight, and will continue for 10 days. Not only has the entry list of last year's tournament been exceeded, but the prize money offered in the various events is considerably larger, amounting in all to \$10,000. The contestants will include some of the best individual and team bowlers from Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Denver, Omaha, Sioux City, Des Moines and other cities of the middle west.

The middle west tournament is an auxiliary to the American Bowling Congress. The association was organized in 1907 from the Iowa and Northwestern Bowling associations. The first tournament of the association was held here last March and proved eminently successful.

ASSOCIATION FIVE BEATS M'INNIVILLE

PULLMAN DOES NOT FEAR CESSATION OF FOOTBALL RELATIONS DURING 1939.

The McMinnville college basketball five was vanquished by the Y. M. C. A. quintet last night, 42 to 29. From the first few moments of play the result was a thoroughly foregone conclusion and had the Y. M. C. A. thrown any spirit into the latter half of the game, the score could have been much augmented.

The collegians played a good game but none of them came up to the weight of the lightest man on the association in the game. The second half was barely under way before Gordon, being the best player on the team, began to rough in a way that attracted the referee's attention. Yet Gordon was far from being the only offender. Sweeney for Portland and E. F. McKee for the visitors played a far from clean game, both endeavoring to tug and trip when the referee's attention was elsewhere.

Hartman and Sheets were both noticeable, the former for the number of baskets he threw and the latter for the steady, dogged way in which he guarded R. S. McKee. For McMinnville McCabe and Sheets were the stars, while the McKee brothers were noticeable.

While the Y. M. C. A. ascendancy was never contested in the game, the one bit of play that drew applause was made by E. F. McKee, putting a long basket shot right into the net. This shot was made from beyond the center line and was shortly followed by another at but little, if any, shorter distance. McKee evidently showed at these open shots while showing miserably at taking foul throws and at near-basket work. All through his work was of a too happy-go-lucky nature and he neglected to give the balance of the team any available support.

In the latter part of the game was devoid of any kind of science and was merely "rough and tumble," interrupted by the referee calling single and double fouls for "unnecessary roughness."

The first half, which ended 25 to 13, the Y. M. C. A. players made some attempt to give in form but the scrambling play of the visitors speedily reduced the home team to playing on similar lines.

Professor Van Orsdel handled the whistle in a most capable manner and though a McMinnville man absolutely failed to show any partiality to the collegians. As his work brought down condemnation from both captains it may be deemed eminently satisfactory.

FRANK DEFEATS CHICAGO CHAMP

Wonderful Work of Multnomah Wrestler Makes Him Western Title Holder.

Portland has a new champion, Edgar E. Frank, king of the featherweight wrestling ring, and unambiguously the peer of any man, professional or amateur, of his weight. Frank won his title last night at the Multnomah club gymnasium, when he decisively defeated Johnny Haley, pride of the Illinois Athletic club and amateur champion of the midwest, in straight falls.

Frank took the first fall in 5 1/2 minutes on a head scissors and the second in a few seconds over 17 minutes with a new combination of leg and far half Nelson hold.

Just before the little grapplers entered the ring, announcer Danway informed the spectators that the committee appointed to weigh them, had found Frank to weigh 135 1/2 pounds, while Haley weighed 134 1/2 pounds.

The weighing in was done at 12:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon and Haley probably won the title, as he weighed 135 1/2 pounds when he left Chicago, and the four days' traveling probably put on weight that he could not work off. When they faced each other Frank looked to be the 12 pounds lighter, but he was not.

There was a slight pause to talk over the rules, which barred full Nelson, strangle holds and hammerlocks. When the referee called "begin," each of the two looked like a couple of tigers. Frank's work looked more like that of the finished professional than the amateur. He was lightning fast on the mat and soon got behind the Chicagoan. Haley was not lacking in clear, but his splendid whipping action was unusually clever for a youngster and has a good head.

Frank Aggressive.
Frank immediately began an aggressive campaign, which bewildered the visitor. He dragged him this way and that across the mat, never giving Haley a chance to get his feet under him. He used his proficiency in finding Haley's head with his legs, worried the easterner. He tried a variety of holds and when the time was ripe at the end of 5 1/2 minutes of struggling, slid lightning-like into a head scissors, which he held for 17 minutes.

When the crowd came to a realization of what had happened it went wild over Frank's victory in the first fall. The second fall was a mere formality, and Haley was as vigorously applauded as he left the mat for the 10 minutes rest. He was when he entered the arena.

Frank was more confident and Haley more cautious when they faced each other for the second fall. When they went down Haley was on top and remained there for several minutes. Frank, however, was not to be defeated. He wriggled out of it before it became a cruciating one. Then he rolled over and Frank was on top. Finally Frank worked Haley over into one corner, where he placed a half Nelson and then caught the leg hold. It is one of Instructor O'Connell's vital holds and it worked nicely for his pupil.

The second bout was a hummer. The overweight did not seem to bother Frank, who showed the possession of much strength. With Frank's strength, speed, and present knowledge of the wrestling game it is doubtful if there is an amateur or professional in the country who could defeat him. The form displayed last night should return him a victor against any of them.

Frank's improvement has been phenomenal. To those acquainted with the style of both wrestlers, O'Connell stood up in almost heroic movement of the champion. He is a real contender and there are many amateurs in the country outwrestling him 10 pounds who can defeat him.

Frank won the 145 pound preliminary from Otto Ott. Each took a fall and Frank was given a 10 minute rest. Before the principal bout of the evening it was announced that Frank would not claim the medal under the forfeit agreement because of his opponent's overweight. He selected to win the medal on its merits, a bit of sportsmanship that was approved by the crowd, whose feminine portion of the crowd was immensely pleased with the matches.

Dorando Beats Corry.

Dorando covered the full course in 2:56 2-5 seconds, winning by 7 minutes. Corry suffered from a number of times during the race, losing many laps which he could never hope to regain.

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TWO SECTIONS COLLIDE IN FOG

Three Killed, Six Injured, in Wreck on the Pennsylvania Line.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Summer Hill, Pa., Jan. 23.—Three persons are dead and six injured, one probably fatally, as a result of a rear end collision between two sections of the Pennsylvania railroad near here shortly after midnight. The point at which the wreck occurred in some distance from a telegraph office and it was several hours before any definite information could be obtained.

A dense fog was the direct cause of the collision. The first section of the fast train had been flagged by a freight, which was proceeding slowly ahead of it. The fog was so heavy that the engineer of the second train could not see the danger signals and crashed into the first section at full speed.

The dead are: S. L. Taylor, Brooklyn, N. Y.; M. J. Kelly, Pullman car conductor, Jersey City; Charles Coleman, colored porter, Philadelphia. The injured: W. J. Johnson, Cincinnati; Mrs. Adam Rankin, Anderson, Ky.; W. D. Kissell, Bremen, Pittsburg; four mail clerks, not seriously hurt.

Johnson and Mrs. Rankin were able to continue their journey, but Kissell, whose injuries may prove fatal, was removed to a hospital at Altoona. Those killed were asleep in their berths in the rear sleeping car of the first section.

The impact of the heavy trains put out the lights and a scene of great confusion followed the crash. Passengers rushed from the cars in a frenzy of terror, crying for assistance. As quickly as possible a flagman hurried to the nearest telegraph office and notified officials of the railroad of the wreck. Special trains were made up at Altoona and Johnstown and all
