Novel Railroad Tickets—Some of the most remarkable railroad tickets ever issued have been printed in Portland for the Spokane-Portland Empire excursion that the Southern Pacific is to run to California next month. They are bound in book form and each ticket consists of a separate page in the book, with a perforated end in order that when it is used it may be torn from the binding. Each ticket taken en route and each side trip, including automobile, streetcar and other rides has its own ticket which will be torn from the book when used. The ticket books are bound in green pasteboard and are the size of an ordinary notebook. The passenger department of the road expects about 200 excursionists from both Seattle and Spokane when the train comes through Portland. They will be entertained here in much the same fashion as were the Walla Walla excursionists last week.

Merseman, witness timberman, sued by Miss Helga Parrett, for \$50,000 damages. Miss Parrett, a native of Sweden, alleged seduction and many other sensational charges in the complaint. Merseman, answering the complaint, alleged that the proceedings brought against him were a branch of agreement, and made demand for judgment on the pleadings. Miss Parrett is now in New York.

Karo Wants Divorce—Jacob Karo, after what he claims to have been little less than a reign of terror for nine years, has asked the superior court to divorce him from his wife, Pauny, to whom he was married in 1899 in San Francisco. He also asks the custody of the two children. Among other allegations, Karo claims that his wife tried to poison him and once hit him over the head with a bottle and laid him out cold. He also alleges that she threw dishes at him.

Scare From Blazing Chimney—When the firemen of this company reached 398 Tillamook street late yesterday afternoon in response to an alarm they found that although the fire was nothing more than a blazing chimney, practically the entire contents of the house had been moved into the street from the burning chimney. The firemen, knowing the ways of blazing chimneys, soon had the fire extinguished and the damage done by the chimney had to be carried back into the house again.

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GOOD PACK OF ALASKA SALMON

President Fortmann's Report Shows Profits for the Past Year.

The Alaska Packers' association, which has its headquarters at San Francisco, made gross profits of \$880,682 and net profits of \$663,108 in 1908, according to the sixteenth annual statement, just submitted by President Henry F. Fortmann.

He states that the demand for salmon has kept up and prices have been satisfactory except for the cheaper grades, sold principally in the southern states and South America. There was an unusually large carry over by the canners of cheap fish of the 1907 pack, and the markets where it is sold were stagnated, a condition that still obtains in large extent.

The association operated 15 canneries in Alaska and one on Puget sound. Continuing its policy of upbuilding the territory, large disbursements for material have been made in Alaska, the expenditures in 1908 being over \$250,000. The steel barks Star, Scotlan and Star of Iceland have been purchased for \$110,000.

The launches Petrel, Teal and Brant were built at a cost of \$37,372. The steamer Thistle and the launch Northern Light have been purchased for \$60,765, and the small launch Raven condemned.

There has been expended for repairs to the fleet the amount of \$128,357. New improvements have been added to the fleet at a cost of \$15,166. There has been written off from fleet values for depreciation the sum of \$91,309, leaving the present appraised value of the fleet \$1,277,550.

The association now owns nine ships, seven barks, one barkentine, two schooners, and 57 launches and launches, a total of 78 vessels. The association's pack of salmon for the season was about 30 per cent of the entire coast pack, as follows: Rockeye, 42,974 cases; red, 878,411 cases; king, 13,058 cases; coho, 20,225 cases; pink, 183,847 cases; hump, 21,961 cases; total 1,150,477 cases; salt salmon, 5,335 barrels.
