Raise \$1000 for Church.—Members of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarenes pledged \$1000 to aid in the purchase of new church grounds at a service held at their present location, 428 Burnside street, yesterday. Their new property at East Eighth and Couch streets, which is already occupied by a church building, is to cost \$5000. Of that sum, \$4000 had already been subscribed. When W. Ruth, the evangelist who is conducting the services at the church this week, called for \$1000 the members set to work immediately to ascertain what they could raise among themselves. The sum was pledged at the same service. Since last June the church members have given \$1200 to mission work and at present maintain a religious school in India.

Career of Adventure Nipped.—Tiring of the peaceful life of St. Mary's school near Beaverton, two boys, aged 11 and 9 years, left there at 9 o'clock yesterday morning and walked into Portland, finding themselves on the streets of the city by 2 o'clock. They were picked up at 12th and Johnson by a policeman soon after and as it was Sunday they were kept in the city jail until this morning. The youngsters, who gave their names as Charles Croghan and Richard James, admitted to having novelty of being in jail and passed by nothing whatever of the meager jail breakfast. This morning they were turned over to the juvenile court without delay.

Too Soft for Paving.—Work will be commenced on the repaving of East Morrison street between East Water street and Union avenue next month. It was hoped by many of the property owners along the thoroughfare that a hard surface pavement could be laid at this time, but owing to the fact that the fill has not yet settled sufficiently, City Engineer Taylor refused to allow anything but board paving. Accordingly the work will be started soon. East Alder street, which was recently improved, will be repaved by Morrison street during the time the improvement is being completed.

Curtail Milwaukee Service.—Sellwood cars now run only to the golf links from Grand avenue and Hawthorne avenue, the Milwaukee passengers transferring to the Oregon City cars. The change was made, the company officials claim, because the traffic on the Sellwood line did not justify running cars through to Milwaukee on a 15 minute schedule. The change will be made on Monday and should not cause any trouble as the company now on the line is unable to accommodate the travel additional cars will be put into service.

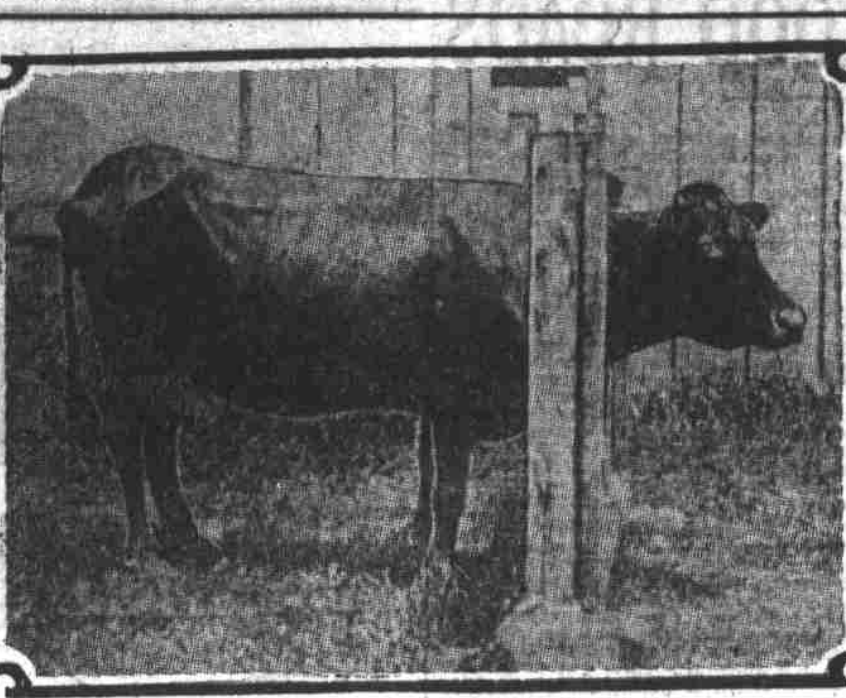

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Tuberculosis Germs Thrive in Her Body



This cow, though her appearance gives no hint that she is diseased, is constantly expelling tuberculous germs. She is under surveillance at the experiment station conducted by the bureau of animal industry at Washington, D. C. She was taken from a herd from which milk was supplied to the city of Washington. Guinea pigs inoculated

with germs from her milk became affected with generalized tuberculosis, showing the danger a tuberculous cow is to the human family. Of 24 cows in one lot and six in another examined at the Washington station, 10 in the first lot and all in the other were found to be expelling tuberculous germs. Have Oregon people any protection against tuberculous cows, and if so, how much?

MODIFY DRAFT OF SUNDAY LAW

When the petition of the Northwest Sabbath association, asking legislation "in protection of the Lord's day" goes before the legislature of Oregon it will not contain, as originally proposed, a clause for the prohibition of public excursions. Furthermore, it will state specifically that prohibition of public games and tournaments of the Sabbath extends only to those where administration is charged. These changes in the petition have been made in the last few days.

However, it will ask, as before, the prohibition of "stage plays" or shows of any description, or dancing on that day, the transaction of commercial business and work for gain, "works or acts of necessity or mercy excepted," and the holding of public games or tournaments, with the above qualification. "All this the petitioners may have their weekly rest and worshipers be undisturbed in their devotions," concludes the petition, which is signed by R. Steele, president; E. Quackenbush, first vice-president; James E. Ewing, second vice-president; W. H. Heppa, third vice-president; S. T. Lundy, treasurer, and J. Harper Leiper, field secretary.

Official endorsement of the petition by the highest ecclesiastical authority within the state will accompany it to Salem for perusal by the legislators. Among those named as most emphatically favoring the measure are: The Presbyterian synod of Oregon; Oregon State Baptist convention; Methodist Episcopal church, south; Columbia conference; United Presbyterian church, synod of the Columbia; Oregon Evangelical association; United Evangelical church conference; Evangelical Lutheran church, Pacific synod; Methodist Episcopal church, Oregon conference; Society of Friends of Oregon; Congregational ministers' club, Portland and vicinity; Portland General Ministers' association.

The conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, endorsed the petition "in the interest of the fact that in observance of the Sabbath is an essential part of good citizenship; and also in recognition of the obligation laid upon the church by her divine head, viz.: to teach all nations."

"We rejoice in the awakening interest throughout the United States for the preservation of the Sunday rest day. Nowhere is there greater need for the protection of the Sabbath than in the Pacific coast states. This formative period in our western civilization is a most opportune time. We should urge upon our congregations that they put forth the required effort to secure better Sunday legislation for Oregon."

And again: "The desecration of our Sabbath means the disintegration of the Sabbath school, the lessening of public congregations and the blighting of Christian influence. Brethren, we must restore our Christian Sabbath, and we can greatly augment our working force."

CASTAWAY COYOTE IS CAPTURED IN RIVER

A young coyote, wild and full of fight, was captured yesterday as it floated by the city on a chunk of driftwood. Captain Fitzgerald of the barge Oak, lying at the foot of Madison street, saw the animal clinging to a log as it sailed down the river on the swift current.

With another man from the barge Fitzgerald put out a small boat and started in pursuit. They came up with the log and the coyote below the Madison street bridge. The coyote did not seem to like the idea of being rescued, and snapped and snarled as a rope was thrown about his neck and he was dragged from the log into the boat.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company is a public-service corporation, and we realize that the most valuable asset a public-service corporation can have is the good will of the public. We are trying to be candid and sincere in all our dealings with the public and with the city, and we frankly admit that we shall consistently strive to secure and maintain the good will of the people of Portland.

It is an important part of our business to run a street railway and to run it efficiently. We feel that we can do more, ordinarily, by attending to our business than by entering into discussions or explanations.

The secret of getting along with the other fellow in this world is to have a better understanding of his troubles. The man who is the sharpest critic is often the best friend when he understands the other fellow's job.

Comparatively few people realize the difficulties of modern street railway operation. When anything goes wrong, everybody notices it; whenever everything goes right, nobody notices it.

We want to have everything go right and everybody to notice it. We feel that we are making friends with the people of Portland, and that our efforts to give the best service possible are being appreciated. This is not the accomplishment of a day, but the result of grinding work and large expenditures for some years past, and we desire to show the public what we have done and are doing for the improvement of the service; what problems we meet with daily, and some of the methods which would be mutually helpful and beneficial to the railway company and the public.

You make take this fact as assured, that it will not be possible to remove all sources of complaint. There is the amiable gentleman who kicks at home and growls all day at his office.

We cannot expect to escape him between time. He will probably kick at the publication of these articles. But, leaving him out of the question, it is still plain, from the nature of the business, that there will frequently be unavoidable troubles and inconveniences.

We carry a large portion of the population of Portland twice a day. Counting the transfers, people step up and down from the cars 320,000 times a day. The streetscars of Portland pass backward and forward through crowded streets, covering about 29,000 miles, or one and one quarter times the circumference of the globe, in a single day. There will always be accidents under these circumstances. Then, too, the conductor's lot is not a happy one. He has to collect money from people of all sorts and dispositions. He alone is expected to keep his temper, and it is his duty to do so. If he does not, upon proper complaint, he is disciplined, and perhaps discharged. We endeavor to secure the highest class of employees. We are proud of the character and courtesy of our men, and we believe that, as a body, they have not their superiors in the country. Still they are only human, and they make mistakes. Many a reasonable kick will necessarily be registered against us. The unreasonable kicks come hard. We feel that we can do away with many of them if the public understands the streetcar business a little better. We want to present to you a series of articles discussing some of the problems, together with a statement of how we are meeting them.

As for the reasonable kicks, we want to hear them. They help us. We realize that we can best serve ourselves by serving you. An outsider can sometimes suggest remedies for existing conditions which have escaped the men engaged in the detail of the work. Suggestions are solicited.

If, by telling you our story, you will understand us better, and the spirit of mutual helpfulness will be advanced, we shall feel that our work has been well done. We welcome honest criticism, particularly if it is good-natured.
