PORTER BILL THREATENS HOOD RIVER APPLE MEN

Protesting against the provisions of the Porter bill, which is now before congress, the directors of the Hood River Apple Growers' union have passed a set of resolutions, which will be submitted to Oregon senators and representatives in Washington, D. C. The Porter bill lays down stringent rules in regard to the standardizing of packages and the grading and marketing of apples.

method of packing the apples grown in this vicinity; that the present box used by the growers in packing and shipping said apples has been found through experience to be the one best adapted for this purpose, and enables the grower to maintain a uniformity and beauty in the arranging and packing of the fruit that can not possibly be had in any other sized box or package; that the adoption of a box of different dimensions from that now used by the fruit growers of Hood River valley would entirely destroy the system of packing now in general use by said growers, and that it would result in that two years to rearrange and perfect, if possible, a pack adapted to the box proposed in said bill.

there is no way out of the situation for the present levy. In his opinion it is also up to the legislature to enact some equalizing provisions, as a state board of equalization, empowered to smooth down the high places and fill up the hollows of the tax of the state.

Mr. Corrigan's Plan. Mr. Corrigan argues that should this plan be adopted, it would mean the cheapest and at the same time the most effective board of equalization possible. Each assessor would act as a check on the other, working each for the interest of his own county. The western Oregon men, coming from a section where the conditions are practically the same, would note that there was no inequality from that part of the state. The eastern Oregon men, coming under the same conditions, would do the same thing, and the number from the east and west of the state being about evenly balanced, would serve as a check from one portion of the state to the other. Multnomah county on account of the recent decision of the supreme court holding that the 1907 system of apportionment of taxes is unconstitutional. I am going to fight it as hard as I can.

It is simply imposing a penalty on Multnomah county for making a decent assessment and we are not going to stand it. It is not right that we should have to. The legislature simply must do something to relieve us of the burden.
"What, in my opinion, the legislature ought to do is to pass an act, if we have to give up this \$100,000, guaranteeing the amount to the county and let the state bear the loss. The state can let its warrants stand unpaid or anything else, so we don't lose that money. Then the state's deficit could be added onto the taxes for next year.
"Whatever I think will have to be done and what certainly ought to be done after that, is for the legislature to provide for a tax commission to equalize taxes and make a new apportionment.
"If we do have to stand the loss of that money, I really don't know what we are going to do. It is going to put us in bad shape. Of course, we shall have the money for the proposed new courthouse—but—
"But I am not going to stand for it. Something must be done. It is not right that we should be punished for making a decent tax levy when other counties did not make a proper assessment."
