

# EMERGENCY MEASURE IS PASSED

## DOWN COMES OLD GLORY IN CUBA

Americans Go and Cuba's Second-Chance at Self-Rule Comes—President Gomez and the Problems He Must Solve.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Havana, Jan. 28.—The lone star of the Cuban republic on a field of blue with red and white bars fluttered today from the Palace del Presidente as the flag of a free nation when Governor Magon formally surrendered American control of the island to President Gomez, whose inauguration followed Magon's withdrawal.

The ceremonies attending the transfer of the governing power took place in the red room of the palace before a hundred guests representing a dozen countries.

Although five military parades were held during the day and fireworks set off at night, the inauguration lacked the enthusiasm and the spectacular features that marked the inauguration of President T. Estrada Palma.

The ceremony also marked the birthday anniversary of Jose Marti, the instigator of the last revolution against Spain. The celebration will last until Sunday night.

American troops did not parade, because of a desire on the part of the American officials to avoid any suggestion of American control. Governor Magon during the day prepared to leave the island when the Maine and the Mississippi depart.

The inauguration of President Gomez was scheduled to occur exactly at noon, but those invited to witness the ceremony were required to be at the palace at 11:30 a. m. They included, besides the American officials and the members of President-elect Gomez's cabinet, the judges of the courts, the governors of the provinces, the officers of the visiting warships, the foreign consuls, visiting Americans of note, and a few other specially invited guests.

**Brief and Simple Ceremony.**  
Shortly before 11:30 a. m., those who were to witness the ceremony began to arrive at the palace in carriages. All the naval officers were arrayed in full uniform, resplendent in gold braid and plumed chapeaux. The Cubans, dressed in black frock coats and silk hats, formed a distinguished looking assemblage as they gathered in the audience chamber.

The inauguration ceremony itself was brief and simple. After the exchange of greetings, Governor Magon read the order relieving him of his office and at the same time presented a message of congratulation and good wishes to the new president. President Gomez took the oath of office and was followed by Vice President Zayas.

Immediately after the ceremony President Gomez ascended to the roof of the palace. He was recognized at once by the crowd below and met with an immense demonstration of welcome. The American colors were lowered from the flagstaff and as they fluttered down the troops below saluted, and at the same instant came the distant boom of guns from the harbor fortresses.

**Gomez' Character Gives Hope.**  
Jose Miguel Gomez is a man of active patriotism and austere virtue. He is described by American officials who have come in contact with him as a vigorous and intelligent man of affairs. He left his fields to fight for the independence of his country.

## FRANKHAUSER TO PRISON FOR LIFE

Convicted Train Robber to Serve His Sentence at Fort Leavenworth.

Helena, Mont., Jan. 28.—Judge Hunt in the federal court today sentenced George Frankhauser, convicted train robber, to the military prison at Fort Leavenworth for the balance of his natural life.  
Frankhauser was named as principal in the sensational robbery of the Great Northern train a year ago in which \$40,000 was stolen from the registered mails. On this charge and that of placing the life of the custodian of the mails in jeopardy he was indicted, hence the severe sentence.  
It is stated that Frankhauser has made a confession to his counsel of the robbery and the sensational jail delivery by which his "pal" escaped. It is said the confession will involve several persons.

## Attorneys in Cooper Trial

## CARMACK JUROR DISQUALIFIED

State Not Satisfied and Puts Him Into Hands of Grand Jury.

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 28.—Juror K. Leigh, who was passed aside subsequently challenged for drunkenness by the prosecution in the trial of Colonel Duncan Cooper, Robin Cooper, and John D. Sharpe, charged with the murder of Senator B. W. Carmack, was disqualified from jury duty by Judge Hart today.

The court heard an allegation of perjury made by attorneys for the state. He declined to pass on the charge made by them, but Leigh was drunk when chosen for jury service, holding that Leigh had an opinion on the case which of itself was sufficient to disqualify him.

Attorney General McCann, not satisfied with the ruling of the court, had Leigh arrested and his case was brought before the grand jury, which was in session during the day. Leigh was released on bonds pending the result of the grand jury's investigation.

Attorneys for the defense declared there were others who merited the same treatment accorded Leigh and should be discharged. The court took the argument of the defense under consideration.

The state opposed the release of Juror Whitworth on account of illness. Physicians will be in court tomorrow to testify regarding his condition.

Judge Hart directed that another venire of 500 persons be made returnable tomorrow morning.

## SCIENCE AIDS COUNTERFEITER

Robert Bradley Caught at San Francisco After a Long Search and Savage Fight—Expert Metallurgist—Woman in Case.

San Francisco, Jan. 28.—Robert Bradley, a man of superior education and refinement, who, after a close study of metallurgy, in which he learned what a counterfeit half and quarter dollars of base metal in wonderful counterfeit of government coin, is in the city prison after a desperate battle with three secret service agents who had been trailing him for several months.  
Joseph Livingston, a slender, fair-haired girl, his companion, endeavored to aid Bradley in his fight with the government, but she was placed under arrest after a struggle in which she bit and scratched Detective Sergeant McMahon.  
Bradley and Miss Livingston, who posed as his wife, first rented a bungalow in a sparsely inhabited section of the city, and then moved to a small flat in a tenement house. They followed Bradley to the public library, where they watched him studying works on metallurgy. They trailed him to where he bought his supplies of silver and alloy. They followed him to the foundry, where plates and castings for his molds were constructed.  
It was Secret Service Agent Nye who aided Bradley and a teamster to lift the mold in a wagon which contained material for their counterfeiters.  
Bradley and his companion suddenly moved to the heart of the city and the secret service men decided to make their raid.  
They were aided by Detective McMahon and the three entered Bradley's room. As they broke in from Miss Livingston ceased struggling with McMahon and began to weep.  
Both Bradley and his companion will be arraigned before a United States commissioner tomorrow on a charge of counterfeiting. The evidence against them is contained in two sacks of half dollars and quarters, of almost faultless workmanship, together with the best coin moulds the government officers have ever seen.

## TRAIN WRECK; FORTY ARE INJURED

Southern Railroad Passenger Is Smashed as It Emerges From Tunnel Near New Albany, Ind., Across Ohio River.

Louisville, Ky., Jan. 28.—Forty persons were injured, some probably fatally, when the eastbound Evansville accommodation passenger train on the Southern railway was wrecked at noon today as it emerged from a tunnel near New Albany, Ind., just across the Ohio river from this city. The train was bound for Louisville.

## TRIAL MARRIAGE NOT SUCCESSFUL

A. W. Robins Will Celebrate Wooden Wedding, Then Agree to Separate.

San Francisco, Jan. 28.—A. W. Robins, a local restaurateur, and his wife next Saturday will celebrate their wooden wedding, having been married five years, and will then separate. The couple five years ago signed an agreement for a trial marriage, and in the agreement was inserted a clause that if the trial was successful, the mutual lease could be renewed. According to Robins it will not be renewed, although neither feels aggrieved at the other.  
Robins and his wife made what is termed an ideal couple. Both, however, came to regard their marriage as a restriction of personal rights and although neither has a complaint to make against the other, each feels that the marriage has not been a success. They have, therefore, agreed to part, but will remain good friends.

## TAKES OFF HAT TO "GRAFTLESS"

Harriman Had Nothing to Say Until Georgia's State Miracle Was Reached.

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 28.—That E. H. Harriman, the railroad colossus, is a "grafting" enigma, is the opinion of Mayor Maddox of this city. The mayor describes his recent trip through Atlanta with Harriman and said the railroad man answered all of his questions by saying "like in Indiana." Only once or twice during the day did Harriman evince a sense of humor, declared his critic.  
When Harriman was shown the state capital and was told it had been built for less than the \$1,000,000 appropriated, Maddox declared the magnate removed his hat with mock solemnity and bowed to the state building, saying, "I take off my hat to a graftless capital."

## HOUSE TAKES ACTION ON EMERGENCY MEASURE

Senate Will Undoubtedly Pass Bill This Afternoon, Although Some Members Raise Objections—Provides for Equalizing.

Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—Without a dissenting vote cast against it the emergency tax measure passed the house this morning and was sent to the senate for action. It was taken up there and under the whip of Senator Bingham, chairman of the committee on assessment and taxation, went through the first and second readings under suspension of the rules.

Bingham then moved that the measure be put on its final reading and passage when Nottingham of Multnomah and Smith of Marion, interposed objections, contending that they had not had an opportunity to read the bill thoroughly; that they did not intend to take any one's opinion of the matter as a guide for their votes and that a delay of one day would not hurt.

They wanted to make a special order of the bill for tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Bingham explained that the bill had been framed after four or five joint meetings of the assessment committee; that it had been passed upon and approved by Justice Beas; that it had been submitted to the state board and approved; that the judiciary committee had considered it and had passed upon it favorably; that the house had passed it without a dissenting vote, and that the assessment and taxation committee would stand sponsor for it. Smith and Nottingham then moved to adjourn and the senate dissolved until 2 o'clock.

There is no doubt that the measure will pass the senate this afternoon as easily as it did the house this morning for the two senators who had not read the bill promised they would spend the night making up their minds.

It is probable that the bill will be a law by tomorrow noon, inasmuch as there is practically no doubt but that the governor will sign it as soon as it is presented to him after enrollment and signature by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house.

When it is passed by the senate this afternoon it will be sent down to be enrolled and will then be sent to the president of the state for his signature.

This work will perhaps take until tomorrow morning and the bill will not be a law until the afternoon of the 29th. It is the opinion of all those who have read the bill that it will meet the emergency and do away with any further langle in the tax situation for the present year, avoiding any questions of constitutionality in the present assessment and giving remedy until the legislature at the present session will have an opportunity to enact a law that will put the tax assessment and collection of this state on a fair and uniform basis as is provided for by the state constitution.

**Army's Work at San Francisco.**  
Washington, Jan. 28.—A resolution offered by Senator Perkins of California has been adopted, calling on Secretary of War Wright for such reports as he may have relating to the work of the army during the earthquake and fire at San Francisco.

## BOMBTHROWN AT PARTY OF JAPS

Pro-Japanese Korean Court Causes Demonstration—Prince Ito Ill and Affairs on Peninsula Are in Troubled State.

Tokio, Jan. 28.—Dispatches were received here today from Fienyang, Korea, saying that a bomb was thrown at a party of government officials during the imperial tour on Tuesday. It is supposed to have been a demonstration against the pro-Japanese Korean court.

The same dispatches bring news of an attack upon Minister of the Interior Sung, who was stabbed by a would-be assassin while he was on board the royal train.

Prince Ito, the resident general of Korea, is ill and in general the affairs of the peninsula are in a troubled state.

## PU YI'S DEATH IS RUMORED

Infant Emperor of China Said to Have Died of Smallpox.

Tokio, Jan. 28.—Reports received here through private sources from Peking say the Chinese boy emperor, Pu Yi, is dead.

It is known he has been ill and it has been reported that he was suffering from confluent smallpox.

The rumor has gained wide circulation and is given much credence here. It is impossible to obtain a confirmation or a convincing denial of the report from the Chinese officials at Peking.

It is customary for the Chinese to keep secret the death of the emperor until those about him have arranged their plans, and for this reason it is not surprising that the rumor cannot be confirmed.

Pu Yi was but 6 years old when he became emperor last fall. He was a frail child all his life and it is said that after the death of the dowager and the emperor Kwang Su, in spite of his extreme youth, he was worried by the incidents and seemed to realize the burden that had fallen to him.

It is feared that other members of the royal household may be affected with the smallpox and for this reason the most extraordinary measures of secrecy are being maintained.

## NIGHT RIDER JURY UNABLE TO AGREE

Union City, Tenn., Jan. 28.—The jurors in the case of Ed Marshall, one of the night riders charged with the murder of Captain Quin Rankin at Reel Foot lake, reported this morning that they were unable to agree, and were discharged. It is understood they stood 10 to two for acquittal.

Atlas Telford, Law Student, Kills One White Boy Outright and Fatally Wounds Two—Court Credits His Self-Defense Plea.

Cincinnati, Jan. 28.—Despite the fact that one white boy is dead and two are dying, as the result of being shot by him last night, Atlas Telford, an 18-year-old negro, made such an eloquent plea when presented in court today that no charge was placed against him.

Telford declared that he was studying law, but that race prejudice threatened to check his ambition. He said he was set upon by a crowd of white boys as he was leaving school last night, and that he shot in self-defense.

William Weubold is dead and William Brill and Charles Ruff are dying as the victims of the negro's revolver.

The police are inclined to accept the assertion of Telford. They say they found stones in the pockets of one of his victims. The friends of Weubold and the two dying boys are infuriated at the result of the preliminary hearing. It is feared that the bitter race feeling responsible for the trouble last night may break out anew.

Telford is employed as a house boy at the residence of Judge Albert Thompson, of the United States district court.

## HOLTZHEIMER IS MISSING

Idaho Legislator Thought to Have Fled Westward—Forgery Charge.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 28.—The police are unable to find Edward L. Holtzheimer, a member of the house of representatives from Blaine county, for whose arrest on a charge of forgery a warrant was issued at Pocatello late yesterday. Holtzheimer is charged with numerous forgeries by means of which it is alleged he secured several thousand dollars.

Holtzheimer attended the session of the house yesterday morning, but did not appear at the afternoon session. It is learned he was told he was to be arrested and it is believed he took an interior car to Caldwell and there boarded a westbound train.

Holtzheimer is a prominent resident of Pocatello.

## MEN IN WRECK ACTED LIKE BEASTS

Swinish New Yorker Who Thought His Life Worth That of Hundred Women—Scenes on Republic to Make America Blush.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 28.—Declaring that she believes the death list in the Republic disaster last Saturday was greater than announced by the officers of the wrecked liner, Mrs. C. A. Severance of St. Paul, who is here today with her husband, also said that stories of bravery told by some of the men who were on the ship were purely imaginary. Severance is an attorney for the Interstate Commerce commission and is well known on the Pacific coast.

"Two men died in my arms when I was assisting as a nurse after the accident," said Mrs. Severance, who was a passenger on the Republic, "and I am sure a great many more were killed than the officials admit. I saw not a few lying dead under blankets."

"While it has been generally reported that everybody on the ship behaved bravely, I must say that the reports have been misleading. Some of the men were craven cowards. One of these whom I understand to be a prominent New York financier and clubman, said he thought he ought to be taken off first. He was heard to say: 'My life is worth more than that of 100 women.'"

"A young man named Phelps, a mere boy who had been made a special officer by our captain, held this man back at the point of a pistol. 'My maid found one man crying as if his heart would break and almost begging women for a life preserver. The women gave it to him.'"

"Two other men, both of them prominent, had to be knocked down to keep them from rushing into the boats before the women and children."

"Another man, who almost jumped into the boats on the heads of women and children, is now having himself written up as a hero."

"I wish I could meet that man face to face for a few minutes."

## TO CLEAR TAFT AND CROMWELL

This the Undertaking of Engineer Ward, Who Shoulders Canal Burden.

New York, Jan. 28.—A new turn to the controversy between the president and certain eastern newspapers over the alleged libeling of the Roosevelt administration in connection with the purchase of the Panama canal, was given today when Randolph G. Ward, a consulting engineer, assumed full responsibility for the engineering operations in the canal zone.

Ward is a statement to the press today, exonerated William Nelson Cromwell, the rich attorney who represented the French Panama Canal company during the purchase negotiations, and Charles P. Taft, brother of the president-elect, from complicity in the Panama canal project.

Ward declared that he alone was responsible for the enterprise. He challenged Representative Henry T. Rainey of Illinois to submit to him a fairer or more effective way for developing the canal territory.

Rainey recently attacked the administration and Senator Lodge on the floor of the house in connection with the pending controversy.

## 6 CARS SMASHED IN C. & E. WRECK

Albany-Detroit Train Jumps Track; Passengers and Crew Escape.

Albany, Or., Jan. 28.—The Corvallis & Eastern mixed train which runs between Albany and Detroit, the eastern terminus of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, was wrecked at Shubert, a small station about 16 miles from this city, at 4 o'clock last evening.
