**WITH THE LAWMAKERS AT OLYMPIA**

Edge Bill Proposes Elimination of Foreign Labor; Cosgrove Regime Expected to Hand Out Important Plums; Anti-Gambling Bill Will Soon Become a Law; Also Local Option and Eight Hour Female Workers' Day; New Road Law Reported on Way.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Olympia, Wash., Jan. 28.—Labor on street improvements, on bridges, on pavements and on other public contract work will have to be done by citizens of the state to the exclusion of Asiatics and Italians, if a bill introduced in the legislature by Representative Edge of Spokane becomes a law. The bill has the endorsement of union labor, of women's clubs and commercial bodies in most of the large cities of the state.
The bill provides that all public work shall be done by men who reside in the state and have homes. If possible, in cases of emergency, blood, or great damage, the labor may be done by any persons available. But the plan of cheap labor for big contracts will be stopped.
In Spokane large contracts have been taken by contractors at figures which forced them to employ Chinese and Japanese. This way the home people were deprived of work during quiet times, and the taxpayers are up in arms. The Edge law will cover scores of cities. The Edge law will cover scores of cities. It is urged that roads and bridges cost too much money, and that the portion of cost borne by the state and by the different counties is not equitable. It is likely that the roadways will be given into the hands of the county commissioners, and that state aid roads will be abolished entirely. The demand for good roads is strong all over the state, and it is likely that a separate provision will be made for the raising of large sums of money, if the people want to make permanent improvement in voting bonds in the different counties.
Olympia, Wash., Jan. 28.—With three weeks of the legislative session about over it is apparent that certain legislation will be enacted before the session closes. That Hansen's anti-gambling bill, prohibiting all kinds of games of chance on horse races, even prohibiting street sales of pools, will become a law within a few days, seems certain. In the house it was passed unanimously, while in the senate it is claimed to have enough votes pledged to insure its passage at any time.
The eight-hour day for female workers will likely pass next week. In the house it has had no serious opposition, and in the senate its friends will have enough votes ready to pass it when it comes up. This law provides that women in stores, restaurants, laundries, shops and factories can work but eight hours in twenty-four.
A local option law of rather stringent provisions will be adopted, but just what lines will be followed is not known. The temperance people favor county option, and the liquor interests are fighting for precinct option. That's all the difference, but it is all the difference in the world. County option means temperance in every county in the state, precinct option means that in the larger cities saloons will be maintained. Committees in both houses are considering the bills of difference.
San Francisco, Jan. 28.—After remaining seven days without food in a tunnel adjoining the basement of a store he is alleged to have attempted to rob, Edward Rand, reputed an experienced safe cracker, yesterday made a desperate attempt to fight his way past a police guard which had been set over the tunnel since Rand first went into hiding.
Rand, grappled with Patrolman C. A. Kerrigan and was about to escape, when Patrolman E. F. Simms joined in the fight and Rand was handcuffed. He was taken to headquarters, but no photograph resembling him. His room at the Grand hotel was searched, but failed to reveal his identity. He declared to the police that he could open any safe in the country by manipulating the combination.
The safe of a store near which Rand was captured was robbed of \$10,000 two months ago. Rand was seen in the tunnel last Tuesday and as there was no chance of his escape police and private detectives alternated on watch day and night until he was starved out.
