

DEADLY VOTING MACHINE WE MADE DEAD

House Indefinitely Postpones This Vetted Measure—Number of District Fair Bills Over Veto—Other Resurrections.

Salem, Or., Jan. 29.—There will be no voting machine graft in Oregon. The Beach voting machine bill, drafted in the interest of one particular company, passed by the legislature of 1907 and vetoed by the governor because it was a pernicious measure, was indefinitely postponed by the house this morning with hardly a dissenting vote. The bill was passed over the veto by the senate a few days ago, when the senators did not fully realize the import of the measure and discovered the error only after the bill had been passed. Before it came to the consideration of the house, the members had discovered the intent of the bill, and when it was put before them they promptly sent it to the graveyard.

Agricultural Bills Passed.

The veto of the governor on agricultural society bills carrying appropriations met with hard sledding in the house this morning. The bill providing for Third Eastern Oregon District fair was passed over the veto by a vote of 48 to 8. The Seventh Oregon District bill also had a vote of 48 for and 8 against. The John-

son bill providing for the establishment of eastern Oregon agricultural districts, carrying 43 affirmative and 12 negative votes. The first Eastern Oregon District fair bill received 29 affirmative and 12 negative votes.

Official Garnishment Bill.

The house also passed the state official garnishment bill, providing that the wages of state officials and employees could be garnished for debt. There was a good deal of opposition to the bill but it was finally passed by an affirmative vote of 42 and 10 negative.

List of Vetted Bills Passed.

The bills passed over the veto were as follows:
S. B. 62 (Smith of Emattila)—A bill for an act to amend an act to provide for Third Eastern Oregon District Agricultural Society, carrying an appropriation of \$2000 annually.
S. B. 126 (Johnson)—(Substitute bill for S. B. No. 42).—A bill for an act to provide for the establishment of eastern Oregon District Agricultural Society, carrying an appropriation of \$2000 annually.
S. B. 128 (McDonald)—A bill for an act to provide for the establishment of the First Eastern Oregon District Agricultural Society, carrying an appropriation of \$2000 annually.
S. B. 159 (By Judiciary Committee)—(Substitute for S. B. No. 22). A bill for an act to authorize salaries and wages of public officers and employees be subject to attachment.

BEATEN BY HIS ZEALOUS WIFE

The plaintiff asks the custody of the children, a son 5 years old and a daughter 6, and also the same as to the property of the same.

Details Are Lacking.

Details are still lacking regarding what occurred during the period elapsing between December 29 and January 1, when Sawyer wired his wife from Nampa, Idaho, that he was returning home. He did not return, however, mental and physical wreck. He was deposed as principal of the Oakland schools because of his strange actions and the secrecy he observed regarding his trip. On January 19 he was taken to a private sanitarium at Astoria, in the southern part of Douglas county, Oregon. It is now believed that Sawyer had told his wife he was going on a holiday hunting trip.

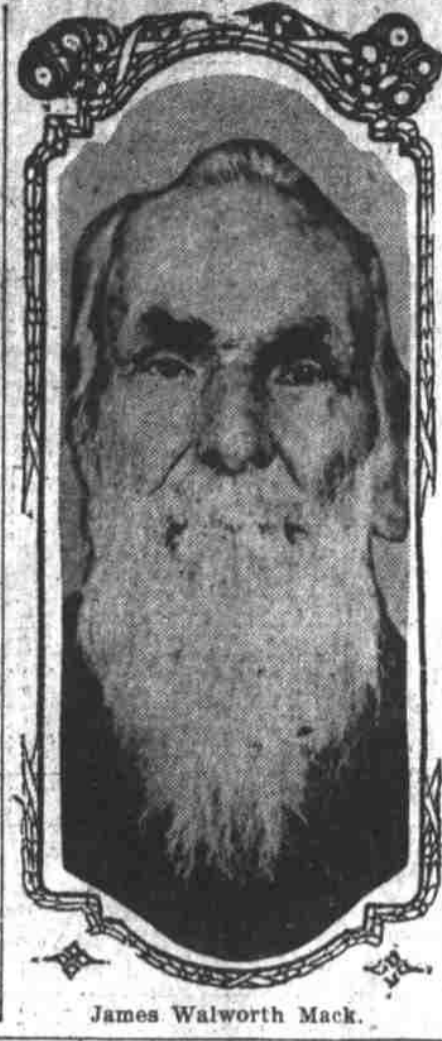
GOVERNOR WILL SEND HIS CREDENTIALS

HOUSE AGREES TO JUDGE

Jaeger Bill Affecting Multnomah County Passed at Morning Session.

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)
Salem, Or., Jan. 29.—The fourth judicial district can have one more judicial judge as far as the house is concerned for it passed the Jaeger bill this morning providing for an increase in the Multnomah county bench from four to five judges.

The amended bill, providing for one judge instead of two as was originally asked, carried an emergency clause and making an argument to the house. Mr. Jaeger made the somewhat unusual argument that the clause was attached to the bill in order that the people of the district and state could not have an opportunity to invoke the referendum.

"I do not think it a usual thing that the people should be dispossessed of the right to express their opinion on measures by the referendum. But in this case the bar of the county contends that there is need for additional judges. The courts are now crowded and the dockets congested. If the emergency clause were to be left off the bill I am afraid that the referendum would be invoked. Therefore I think that in this case the emergency clause should be retained in order that there should be no opportunity to invoke the referendum."

Representative Lelienweber of Clatsop county in his remarks in answer to Jaeger.

"I always understood that Mr. Jaeger believed in the doctrine that the people should be heard, and now he comes on the floor of the house and contends that they should not be allowed to rule or to have an opportunity to express their opinions."

The bill passed the house with a vote of 18 to 13. Mr. Jaeger, in explaining his remarks to the house, said that what he meant by the emergency clause argument was the opponents of the bill would put it to the referendum and that the people would not get an opportunity until this day in the enactment of the bill until that time.
