

CANTON WEARS THE CARNATION

Honors Thus the Memory of the Martyred President McKinley.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Canton, Ohio, Jan. 29.—The old home of President McKinley paid the customary tributes to his memory today on the occasion of the anniversary of his birth. Many handsome wreaths, some of them sent from Washington, Cleveland and other distant cities, were deposited at the magnificent tomb of the martyred president. The city schools held exercises appropriate to the day, papers being read by pupils on the life and public services of McKinley. Teachers and pupils wore the carnation and the same flower was freely used in decorations.

The habit of the late president of wearing a red carnation was so pronounced that during his lifetime his neighbors and friends in Canton would have been surprised had he failed to have his favorite flower as a boutonniere. His long residence in Canton accustomed every one here to see him wearing this flower, and since his death the custom has been adhered to by those who were honored with his acquaintance or friendship.

DESCHUTES MAN IS FIGHTING WATER CODE

GREAT STORM GRIPS THE EAST

a combination of blizzard and sandstorm at Grand Island, Neb., where there is a junction of railroads and a plexus of telegraph lines. The blizzard and sandstorm wrought havoc to communication by rail and wire in that vicinity.

A second storm was reported this morning between Kansas City and Chicago.

Blizzard in Nebraska.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—One of the worst blizzards of recent years is sweeping Nebraska and is extending northward into Minnesota where the mercury dropped below zero. Telephone and telegraph communication with Nebraska and Minnesota is almost entirely cut off. A message from Lincoln, Neb., reports that all wires are down and that the blizzard is the worst known in 20 years.

A sleet storm here last night caused much damage. There is much suffering among the poor.

St. Louis, Jan. 29.—The wind storm that has been sweeping Oklahoma and parts of Missouri reached here today in the form of a 40 mile per hour gale. Little damage was done in this city but reports from the southwest indicate a heavy loss of property. Nearly all telegraph wires are out of commission.

Six Trains Stalled.

Denver, Jan. 29.—Half a dozen trains, including 700 passengers, are stalled today on the South Park division of the Colorado and Southern railroad in the vicinity of Como at the top of the Continental divide as the result of the blizzard. The passengers are suffering severely from cold and hunger and reports from the southwest indicate a heavy loss of property. Nearly all telegraph wires are out of commission.

MERGER OF SIXTY MINES IN MEXICO

City of Mexico, Jan. 29.—Plans are being prepared for the incorporation of 60 mining properties throughout Mexico. Announcement of the plan was made by Pedro Alvarado, a multimillionaire mineowner in the district of Chihuahua. His mines lie in the districts of Chihuahua, Durango, Guerrero and Coahuila.

The company will be known as the Alvarado Mining company and will be incorporated under the laws of the state of New York.

Several prominent American mining men will be interested in the merger.

PITY THE SORROWS OF A POOR OLD NOBILITY

Tokio, Jan. 29.—Count Tanaka, minister of the imperial household, has submitted to the demands of the press and the nobility and agreed to break off his engagement to marry Miss Kobayashi, a plebeian.

The newspapers arraigned Tanaka both on account of the difference in rank between him and the girl and because of the great difference in their ages, he being 67 and she 20 years old. There is bitter feeling against marriages of nobles and plebeians, which have been very frequent of late. The old count appears heartbroken because of the loss of his bride and the young woman threatens to demand reparation.
