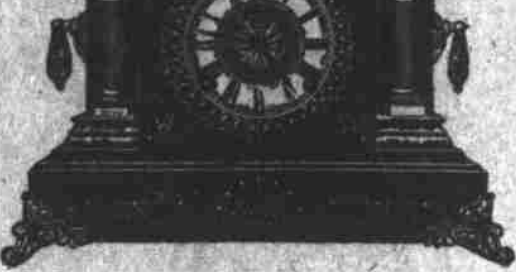

THIRD VETERAN OF MEXICAN WAR IS READY FOR PARADE

James A. Crabtree of St. Johns, 83 Years Old, Enters Lists.

When the management of the Rose Carnival announced plans to hold a parade of Mexican war veterans during the summer season, Washington Lafayette Campbell, 84 years young, who went through the war, gathered himself together and went out looking for some one with whom to march. He found but one. It was evident then that the file would be short.

James Walworth Mack, spy and embezzler at 80 years, heard of Mr. Campbell's quest and at once announced his intention of taking active part in the big celebration.

And now comes James A. Crabtree, who lives at St. Johns, and who in the winter of 1913-14, was not only a veteran of the Mexican war, but also a member of the 3rd Veteran of Mexican War. He is only 83 years old, and was born in Kentucky. Mr. Crabtree is now visiting in eastern Oregon, but will return soon. His daughter, Mrs. Belle Dewey, 904 Fillmore street, St. Johns, supplies the following:

"My father has been a resident of Oregon for 60 or more years and is still hale and hearty—another of the frisky boys. I am sure he will join the veterans in parade when he hears the call for the best men in Oregon. "When he arrives home I am sure we will hear more of those merry old fellows of the Mexican war, for I am going to arrange a meeting of them all."

LOOPHOLE IN LAW COVERED

Bill Pending in Legislature Deals With Damages in Railroad Cases.

A bill covering an alleged loophole in the Oregon law in the recovery of damages from a railroad in case of direct or consequential death by fire in a wreck is before the state senate. It provides that damages may be allowed by a jury up to \$15,000, lighten the degree of proof that is necessary, and directs that the trial judge shall not interfere with the case on the ground of contributory negligence, the snag on which so many personal injury cases are lost.

The bill is authored by Johnson of Benton and Polk, and is likely to create much discussion, in connection with other bills that are intended to make it easier for persons injured in hazardous occupations to recover damages from their employers. Just now the bill is resting with the senate committee on railroads.

This is the clause of the bill that may cause railroad lawyers to look upon it with unfriendly eyes:

"In any action under the provisions of this act, slight negligence on the part of the person injured or killed shall not be a defense. In all cases the question of contributory negligence shall be a question solely of fact, and not of law, and it shall be considered by the jury along with the other questions of fact, and the court and trial judge shall in no case determine or interfere with the jury on this question, nor set aside the verdict of a jury in such case."
