## McCREE ALGRO AT COLE TAYLOR

### Portland Manager Threatens to See National Commission About Boston.

Unless President Taylor of the Boston Americans comes through with four players or \$2000 in cash in exchange for catcher Tom Madden and first baseman Hal Danzig, Cole Taylor, manager of the Portland Beavers, will lay the matter before the national commission. This was the statement made by Manager McCree and he means every word he says, Taylor said.

Mac's temper might be revealed when he discussed the matter yesterday. He bit his tongue clean in two when he expressed his opinion of Taylor's methods.

## PORTLAND PARTY AFTER GAME LAW

### A. L. Mills Heads Delegation That Goes to State Legislature.

A. L. Mills, president of the First National bank, and a prominent sportsman, will head the Portland delegation to the revision of the game laws, Mr. Mills and E. A. Parson, another well known sportsman, who are candidates for the position of state game warden, have sent out letters asking delegates from other interested cities meet the Portland party at the capitol.

Mr. Parsons has taken up a number of phases of the proposed revision and points out his own stand on a number of them.

Mr. Parsons' suggestive changes for senate bill No. 25 are as follows: Ducks—Section 12, page 9: I believe the open season on ducks should be arranged to give satisfaction to all parties, and at the same time not have any longer open season than the open season on upland birds. The season to open September 1 and close February 1. My reason for this is to satisfy the valley people who are insisting on February shooting. The conditions governing each locality are different. In the Columbia river holds the ducks here, and thereby gives the valley people shooting later in the valley. I conceded that there are no ducks until late. Therefore, if the season opens on October 15, the valley people will be disappointed. This gives each section what they want in a far better than an open season all over the state from September 1 to March 1.

Chinese Pheasants—Section 20, page 12: As only about 10 per cent of the people in the state take out hunting licenses shoot ducks, a closed season on upland birds will result in insufficient money in the fish and game fund to properly protect the birds and game. Therefore, our law, as in the past, will be a farce. The pheasant is a game bird and no hunter will hunt it with a limit of five per day or over several days. The law will continue to provide for a closed season on the hen bird, there will be an abundance of male birds that the limit on the male bird can be restored to 10 per day. I believe the open season on the male bird for the next year should be from October 15 to November 30. It will be said that an open season on the male bird will give an opportunity to shoot hen birds. This is no more true than the open season on ducks. The open season on the male bird will do far more for the game than laws not enforced.

Quail, Bob White—Section 27, page 16: The open season in this case I would suggest from October 15 to November 30.

Grouse, Native Pheasants or Ruffed Grouse and Partridge—Section 22: Should be changed so that the open season will be from October 15 to November 30.

Game for Hungarian Partridge (not provided for in bill)—Should have a closed season until December 1, 1938. This is done if personally know that these birds will be brought here, and I would suggest a fine of not less than \$50 for each violation. The law should be changed so that the open season on the male bird will be from October 15 to November 30. Trespass—Section 32, page 18: Provides that it shall be unlawful to enter any land without the permission of the owner. This, I believe, should read "without written permission." This gives the farmer the right to belong to that which he should do before going on any man's land.
