"LUCIA" ADMIRABLY SUNG BY LAMBERT COMPANY

Excellent soloists, a chorus that takes cues quickly and sings well, an orchestra that plays well, and a conductor that is saturated with his music; what more can be asked for successful grand opera? And that is what was given us last night at the Hotel by the Lambert Opera company in Lucia di Lammermoor, and the audience, quick to recognize worth, responded at once with spontaneous applause that expressed its appreciation. Of course there is the matter of scenery and costumes for the chorus, but what is left unsaid about these is a kindness. However, it is more important that a chorus should sing than look pretty in grand opera—that is the great dividing line between grand and comic opera.
As soon as the orchestra began to play, last night people knew that they were not to be disappointed. The orchestra is not huge—though the limited accommodations of the orchestra pit with a row or two of seats removed to extend it, could not well make room for more. But it plays with confidence

land harmony and is right there in response to every movement of the leader's baton. Aside from Lucia was the conductor last night and he was found to deserve the praise that has been accorded him along the route of this tour.
Equal to Exacting Role.
It would be hard to say which of the soloists won the palm last night. The bulk of the work, of course, falls on the soprano in "Lucia," and Signora Modesti, baritone, who sang in place of Pinazzoni. Battani has been heralded as a tenor of exceptional accomplishment, a lyric tenor who carries equally well dramatic roles. And he was no disappointment. His voice is of a beautiful, sympathetic quality, clear and ringing, and quite the tenor robusto on the high notes. He is a capable actor and his death scene was done with good finish. The Che did the aria accompanied this scene with its passionate "Bell alma innamorata" refrain was beautiful. His best work was in the climax scene of the second act, closing with the famous sextet and his wrath scene. Intensely dramatic he made it.
Modesti Scores Success.
Modesti's mellow baritone won the first real success of the evening and he was recalled immediately after his opening declaration of vengeance. He is an artist in point of action with fine stage presence. His work, too, in the sextet was excellent. This splendid climax of the second scene was enthusiastically endorsed and had to be repeated. It is perhaps the supreme moment for all of the company, soloists, chorus and orchestra, and the orchestra did itself proud.
The remaining soloists had more or less minor parts.
Playing the chaplain, had some excellent opportunity to sing the deep notes of the bass. They are vibrant and sonorous, though his singing may lack a little in life—a quality no often lacking in the deep bass. However, his voice is a short of gigantic, fitted in well with the part. Glenn, the contralto,

played a thankless part, but the few detached sentences she sang as Lucia's attendant, showed her voice to be of pleasing quality. A. Neri sang the second tenor role and sang acceptably though not wonderfully.
The orchestra brought out the varying themes of the opera well, and especially good was the tragic theme of impending disaster picked out by its strings and the drums, and running through the entire opera at intervals. The male chorus in the closing scene was excellent.

"La Boheme" Tonight.

The production was entirely satisfactory and it is safe to say that the "Standing Room Only" signs that were displayed early in the evening last night, will have a chance to work again during the short season Lambert is giving us. This evening "La Boheme" will be given; tomorrow afternoon "Il Traviatore" and in the evening "Rigoletto." The company deserves the patronage it is getting and Lambert may register in his favor a vote of thanks from Portland that he is giving us a brief but appetizing taste of grand opera.

At the meeting of the joint committee on ways and means last night the question of the looks appropriation came up for discussion and the house committee refused to consider it, holding that the bill had been passed through the house and the matter was now up to the senate for consideration.
Objections of Senators.
Senator Coffey thereupon spoke against the bill, contending that the state should not make such an appropriation.

proportion, that it was the duty of the general government to provide for the opening of the locks, Smith, of Marion, joined in the argument and held that the state at large should not be taxed for the opening of the locks. Merryman, of Wood, and Schofield, also spoke unfavorably on the appropriation.
The argument made by Schofield was that the collection of the appropriation should be made contingent on the government's taking action. He said already \$100,000 had been collected and it was intended to collect \$200,000 more without knowing when the government would do its part.
This money would be idle in the treasury. He said he was not against free locks, but that the bill should be amended.
When the matter came to a vote neither Senator Nottingham, chairman of the committee, nor Coffey, who had started the objections to the bill, cast a vote on the question, but the other members of the senate committee, Wood, Smith, Merryman and Schofield voted against it.
Jones Threatens Initiative.
Representative Jones of Lincoln and author of the bill, is much incensed at the action of the senate committee. He practically charges bad faith on the part of the senate members in order that he might register his bill carefully since it went into the senate and had been assured repeatedly by different members of the senate committee that there was no opposition to the measure in the senate and no date set for its being reported unfavorably. He was assured time and again that he would be notified when the matter came up for consideration by the committee, in order that he might appear and explain his bill, and also have other interested business organizations and residents of the Willamette valley present to aid him.
Mr. Jones promises to start his bill on the initiative route, after the session closes, at his own expense, if the senate turns it down.

13 NEW BILLS IN SENATE YESTERDAY

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 2.—Thirteen new bills made their appearance in the senate yesterday, as follows:
S. B. 165 (Albee), by request of T. P. Hackleman—Requiring a license for carrying concealed weapons.
S. B. 166 (Bowerman)—Fixing the terms of the circuit court of the eleventh circuit.
S. B. 167 (Kay)—Admitting outside mutual fire insurance companies to Oregon business.
S. B. 168 (Abraham)—Relinquishing title of state to two acres of land in Multnomah county, to correct erroneous descriptions.
S. B. 169 (J. Miller)—Giving county courts right to build or to grant others right to build temporary railroad tracks to transport material for county roads.
S. B. 170 (Sinnott)—Providing that all persons shall be considered of age on being married.
S. B. 171 (Bailey)—To authorize the formation of cooperative associations.
S. B. 172 (Kellner)—Requiring railroads on application of branch or lateral line to build sidetrack or branch road.
S. B. 173 (Nottingham)—Declaring it a misdemeanor to obtain money by false representations as to membership in religious, fraternal or charitable societies.
S. B. 174 (Kay, by request of Oregon Optometrical association)—To require all persons practicing optometry to have taken a three year course in some registered optometry office.
S. B. 175 (Bingham)—To provide for the beneficial use of the water of lakes.
S. B. 176 (Albee)—To place street railways under control of the state railroad commission.
S. B. 177 (Selling, by request of the Portland chamber of commerce)—To amend the act governing the sailors' boarding houses.
