

MAIL BOAT GETS QUICK DISPATCH

Steamer Tymeric Clears for Australia After Brief Stay.

WILL BE FOLLOWED BY THE LINER YEDDO

Sailing Schooner William Bowden Completes Cargo of Lumber for Callao, Peru—Steamers Selja, Elsa and Boveric Loading.

Two lumber cargoes will be started for the sea from Portland today. One consists of 1,001,488 feet of lumber and 753,000 lath, and the other of 800,000 feet of lumber. The former is valued at \$15,000 and the smaller shipment is worth about \$12,000.

The lumber and lath shipments go to Sydney, Australia, on the British steamer Tymeric which cleared yesterday afternoon. She loaded at the mills of the Portland Lumber company and was in the harbor less than a week. The Tymeric could have carried nearly 3,000,000 feet but being one of the Australian mail liners it was necessary to send her to sea quickly and the remainder of the cargo will be forwarded on the liner Yeddo which is booked to arrive here in a few days. From here the Tymeric will proceed to San Francisco to pick up general freight and mail.

PREPARE TO GO NORTH

Salmon Fleet Will Soon Be Taking on Supplies and Stages.

Preparations to send the salmon fleet to Bristol Bay next spring will soon begin along the coast. The larger number of these vessels have been wintering at San Francisco, but some have been in quarters on the Columbia river and Puget sound.

The vessels will begin to spread canvas at about the same time and the usual race will be on, if being considered a distinction among the skippers to reach the fishing grounds first. The fleet consists of from fifteen to twenty vessels. They will return with the season's catch.

ANCAIOS REACHES LIVERPOOL

Lumber Laden Square Rigger Makes Slow Run From Portland.

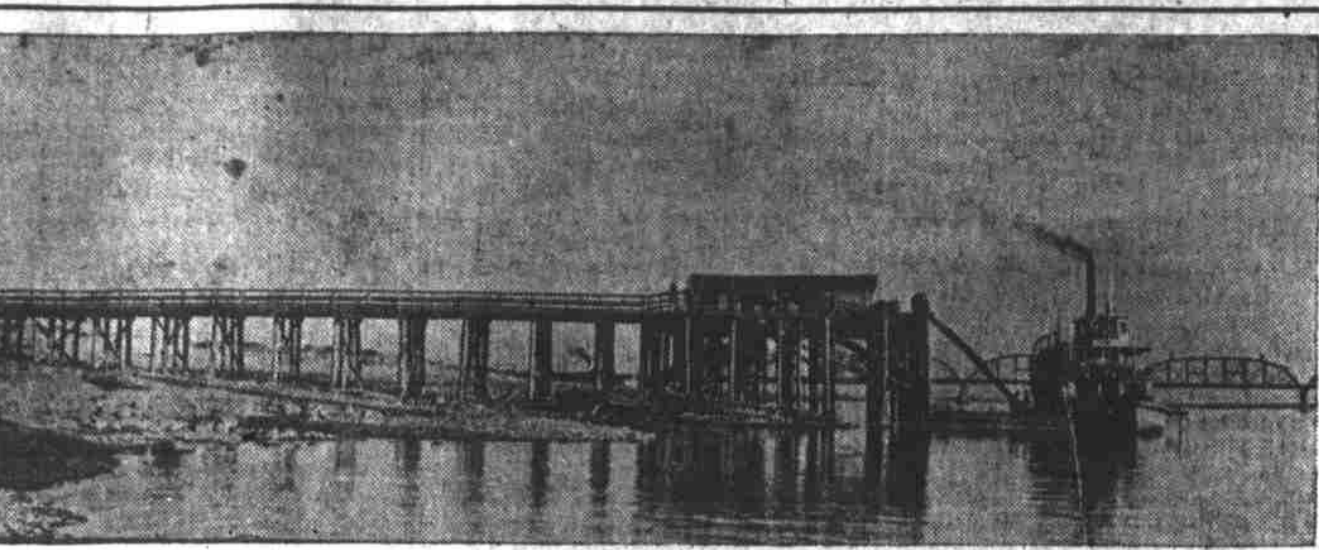

NEW DOCK AND WAREHOUSE AT PASCO ON THE UPPER COLUMBIA RIVER



On March 1 the Open River Transportation company will place its new steamers Inland Empire and Twin Cities in regular service between Celilo and Pasco and Kennewick.

It is announced that about March 1 the Open River Transportation company will be ready to place the two new steamers Inland Empire and Twin Cities in commission on the upper Columbia river between Celilo and Kennewick and Pasco. The boats will alternate on a daily schedule connecting at Celilo with steamers from Portland by means of the portage road until the completion of the Celilo canal.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

The steamer Argo is due to arrive here today from Tillamook.

The steamer George W. Elder will leave at midnight for San Pedro and way ports.

The steamer Breakwater is due to arrive here this afternoon from Coos Bay. The steamer Alliance sailed for Coos Bay last night with several hundred tons of freight and about seventy-five passengers.

The steamer Niocomedia is scheduled to sail from here for Manila and Hongkong on February 11. The ship is due to arrive here February 25. She is expected to bring considerable freight for local importers.

The American-Hawaiian steamer Riverside is expected to be ready to leave for San Francisco tomorrow afternoon. She brought 300 tons of freight shipped from New York by way of the Tehuantepec railroad across the isthmus. The Riverside is under charter to the American-Hawaiian line for a year to ply between Portland and San Francisco.
