

COUNCIL MUST AID, MAYOR INSISTS

Sends Special Message Telling Solons They Should Assist Police by Revoking Licenses of Saloons Where Gambling Is Allowed.

That the police are powerless to prevent gambling, unless the council revokes the licenses of saloons where gambling is permitted, is the substance of a message sent by Mayor Lane to the council this morning. The mayor submitted with his communication the report of Chief of Police Grimschauer on the recent saloon raids which were made at the request of Councilman Willis.

In this report the chief says that the law permits and playing for amusement and that it is impossible for his subordinates to prove that games are played for money or alcoholic drinks, even when they see the players openly violating the law. The mayor recommends that the council revoke the licenses of saloons and Martin's saloons.

Council Must Help.

Both of these were raided recently and 35 convictions for gambling in the former place were secured in the municipal court yesterday. The mayor asserts that the council can put a stop to the law breaking if it will act on the recommendation and use its revoking power and that the police will thus be relieved of further responsibility.

Mayor Lane's letter, in which reference is made to the chief's report, follows:

"Gentlemen—Enclosed I submit herewith the copy of a report from the chief of police in relation to the matter of gambling which has been proven to exist in one of the downtown saloons in this city.

"I am informed by the chief of police that card playing is practiced in many saloons and elsewhere in this city, and that the practice is not contrary to law, if done for amusement only, but is contrary to law if done for money, or for alcoholic or other drinks, cigars, etc.

Arrests are useless.

"I am also informed by him that it is difficult to ascertain whether or not the saloons are being used for amusement or for gambling purposes, where every precaution is used to conceal the facts in the case, both by the proprietors of the saloons and the players themselves, and that it is useless to make arrests in such cases unless it can actually be proven that gambling was being carried on, as all such cases are lost when they are placed on trial in court.

"Whenever a case is proven in court, however, that proprietors of saloons make deliberate use of deception with the intention of evading and defeating the law and allow gambling in their places of business as was done in the Blavier place last Saturday night and in Martin's saloon a few days prior to that time, their license to conduct a saloon should be revoked and the places permanently closed. Action of this sort upon your part would speedily settle the question, free the police department from much useless work and spare the members of your body from the unpleasant task of having to personally investigate the inevitable results of their legislative conduct in this respect.

Demand Revocation.

"I have called attention to this method of procedure before and I again urge it and ask in this instance that you revoke the licenses of the Blavier and Martin saloons, and that the license be not transferred to some one else to carry on the same lines of work, both places having been found guilty of harboring gambling games and using efforts to conceal the facts from the officers of the law.

"In this connection I wish to say that it can be shown to a reasonable degree of certainty that any member of the police department is in any way protecting or acting in collusion with saloonkeepers or any others who break the laws, I will do all in my power to secure their removal from the force. ON SUNDAY STORMS AT SN BEFORE IMMENSE CROWD

Sunday's Opinion of Christian Science.

Portland went mad over William A. Sunday, former baseball player and most eccentric evangelist in America, last night. More than 10,000 persons attempted to gain admittance to the White Temple and filled that edifice and two nearby churches to the doors.

Though the speaking was not scheduled to begin until after 8 o'clock, shortly before 7 o'clock orders were given to allow no others admittance to the temple. A reserve squad of police was necessary to keep the crowd which filled the street and sidewalks before the structure for blocks, from breaking in the doors.

Inside the temple more than a thousand persons were standing and half as many were seated upon the stairways and in the aisles. Many sat for hours in the corridors and halls, well out of sight of the speaker but within range of the strident tones of his harsh voice.

The nearby churches which housed the two overflow meetings were packed to the doors, and the crowd in the corridors was not much less than that at the principal meeting. Many more were turned away.

Amazed, Disgusted, Pleased.

Sunday amazed, disgusted and pleased Portland. Though a convert for about 22 years, he has never achieved meekness and has his own indelible stamp of vulgarity and every tradition of church procedure was slapped in the face with a viciousness that in anyone but Sunday would not be tolerated. Shirt-sleeve oratory, vituperation, vehemence, vulgarity, street slang and bar-room expressions clattered one after another in a pandemonium of exhortation or of the devil.

Bitterly denouncing society women, he drove off on a tangent, of oral bluster that astounded his auditors.

"These women of wealth," he shrieked, "selfish, pigish, players of the game of bridge, auto riding, who have a maid to do their errands, manicure their finger and toenails, who wear four-karat diamonds in their ears, go to the opera, and hang on to their money, and who, with their stomachs of gold, sweep in, with an attendant holding up their train, and four or five domestics watching to see that no one dashes up and jerks the four-karat diamonds out of their ears; and who, when they wish to visit the most fashionable restaurants and order welsch

Throw Out Tables.

"When men are allowed to congregate about tables and play cards it is a very easy matter to play for money. If there is no one present whom the dealer is afraid of," said the chief. "I'd like to see all card tables thrown out of the saloons."

J. J. Russell, one of the proprietors of Erickson's establishment, which is longer controlled by Benjamin Erickson, and 16 players were arrested shortly after midnight by officers led by Sergeant Kienlin, who says the drinks only were being played for with a definite understanding that the loser was to buy 10 cent drinks.

Kienlin says that he is standing orders to raid all games whether money is being put up as an ante or not, and that when he is called to visit the fact that a card game was running at Erickson's he could do nothing more than make the arrests.

The cases will be heard tomorrow morning in the police court.

Chinese Game Raided.

Four of the policemen who went on duty Saturday night by Sergeant Kay raided a game of fan-tan at 834 North Fourth last night and arrested six Chinese. The new officers, Reed, Burton, Thatcher and Owen are being used wherever the older officers might be recognized, and are thus first employed in a lodging house and then swung into Chinatown.

WILL SELL LINCOLN BADGES ON FRIDAY

Through the courtesy of the city council, Postmaster Minto, railroad officials and others, Central Woman's Christian Temperance Union will sell Lincoln memorial badges for souvenirs on February 12. The badges are made of white ribbon of good quality, with the celebrated Brady picture of Mr. Lincoln, which at one time graced bank notes and postage stamps, printed on the badge with the date of his birth and this anniversary upon it. Representatives will also appear upon the streets at various places with this token of a good man's memory for sale.

COUNCIL DECIDES AGAINST MAYOR

The city Council by a decisive vote of 13 to 1 this morning overrode Mayor Lane's veto of the improvement ordinances passed at the last session. The mayor disapproved these ordinances on the ground that the maintenance clauses attached to them forced the city to bear an ever increasing burden of useless taxation. He declared that hard surface streets that are put down right in the first place need no repairs for the lapse of two years. He asked the council to pass street improvement ordinances for the future without fixing the time for which maintenance must be provided. Heretofore the time stipulated has been 10 years.

Councilmen Vaughn, Cellars, Minner and Cotel, in explaining their votes pointed out the fact that the city executive board is not obliged to let any maintenance contract at all, but that the board may take steps toward the acquisition of a municipal repair plant, if it so desires. Councilman Vaughn, in particular, insisted that the executive board has this power and he asserted that the sooner the board recognized this fact the shorter would be the duration of the maintenance grab. Mayor Lane replied that according to the present methods employed by the council the executive board is required to let a contract for maintenance. Councilman Cellars said the board had never let any contracts for the maintenance of stone block pavements and the mayor admitted this, but said he thought the board had simply made an oversight.

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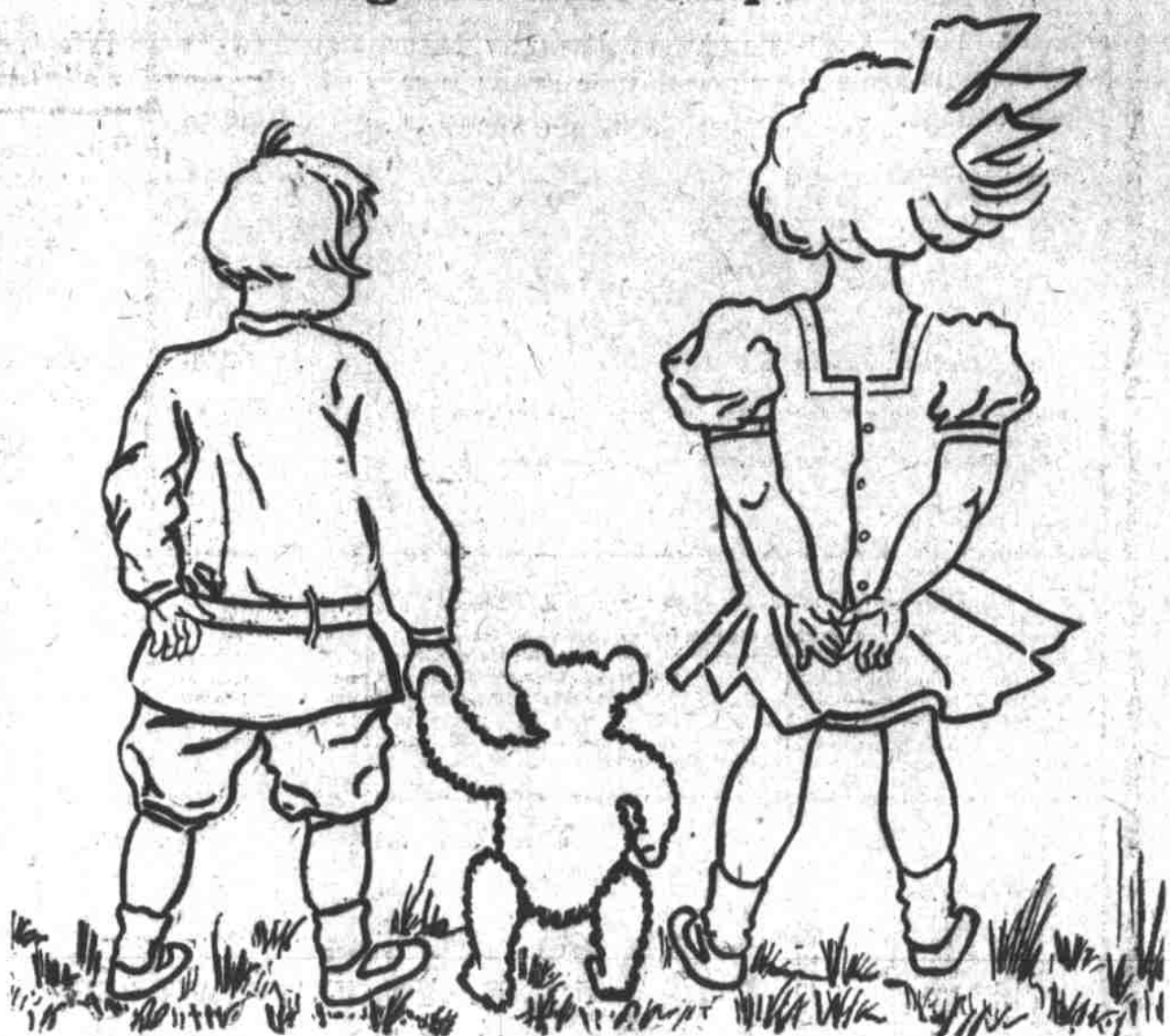
