Gooder Sound Over—Charged with the murder of Anton Moe, Herman Gooder was bound over to appear before the grand jury after a hearing in the police court yesterday. Gooder killed Moe, a logger, in his saloon Thursday evening when Moe refused to leave the place. Seneca Fouts, Gooder's attorney, showed by his questioning of the two eye witnesses that he will try to prove the shot was fired in self-defense. The eye witnesses, Neil Swanson and George Louger, and W. Benson, a friend of Moe, were also bound to appear as witnesses before the grand jury, the ball being \$250 in each case.

To Build Tabernacle—At the meeting yesterday of the Campmeeting association, which has in charge the erection of grounds and buildings for the two conferences of the United Evangelical association and the Evangelical association, it was decided to erect a large tabernacle for campmeetings, near the center of the grounds at Jennings Lodge. The tabernacle is to be constructed to proceed at once to the erection of the building and have it in readiness for the annual gathering in July.

New Viewers to Be Appointed—The council this morning refused to adopt the report of the viewers on the proposed extension of Mill street from Chapman to Lowland. Previous owners along the street objected to the assessments made, and they declared that the same were unreasonable and unjust. Mrs. P. Holland, one of these taxpayers, stated that she had been allowed less for her property than was offered 15 years ago. A new set of viewers will be appointed.

Gives \$10,000 Verdict—The jury which has been hearing the case of the city of Marshfield against the Dean Lumber company in the federal court returned a verdict this morning in favor of the defendants. The city sought to condemn two lots belonging to the lumber company, which are necessary to the proposed extension of a city street. By the decision of the jury, a price of \$10,000 was placed upon the property involved.

Phillips Case Is Dismissed—The case against Martin Phillips, which was set for trial in Judge Cleland's department of the circuit court yesterday, was dismissed. Phillips was fined \$25 in the municipal court for selling liquor on Sunday, and appealed to the circuit court. The complaint was found to lack the date of the offense, and was therefore held defective.

The Portland Public Market & Cold Storage Company report that the 208 stalls on the ground floor of their building now in course of construction on North Sixth street, are rented. In addition one half the second floor space has been let and it is expected that the space in the entire building will be rented long before the building is completed.

Have Narrow Escape—Several persons were frightened but no one was hurt yesterday when the big sand bucket, which was being lowered into the boom broke, cutting the cable on which the bucket moved, and letting the big steel carrier drop. It fell near several workmen.

Elks to Go to Albany—Several hundred Elks will attend the dedication of the new Elks club in Albany on February 18, and the Southern Pacific is preparing to run special Pullmans from Portland and Astoria to Albany. Points to accommodate the various delegations that will attend the opening of the new building.

Council of Jewish Women—The annual open meeting of the Council of Jewish Women will be held tonight in Temple Beth Israel and is open to the public. Bishop Charles Scadding is to deliver an illustrated lecture on Scotland. Mrs. M. H. Weinstein will sing and the president, Mrs. Max Hirsch, will deliver a message.

No Increase for Park Police—Park policemen will get no increase in salary, although Superintendent Mitchell says they should get \$30 a month instead of \$25. The council this morning sustained Mayor Lane's veto of the ordinance which raised the monthly stipends of the park guardians.

MULTNOMAH BUYS A \$60,000 TRACT

Members Unanimously Vote to Purchase King Tract—Athletic Board Members.

Multnomah Amateur Athletic club last night voted to purchase the \$60,000 King tract adjoining the athletic field on the south without opposition. In addition to passing favorably upon this important measure, the membership elected five men to the board of directors for the coming two years.

Reports of President McMillan and his board, based on the various committees, show the club to be in a flourishing condition financially and numerically. The unanimity with which the members of the club voted to purchase the land shows that the spirit of progress is also one of the things taught in the organization.

President McMillan in his annual address made an earnest plea for the purchase of the property. When C. F. Swiger seconded with a short talk, followed by J. E. Logan, A. B. McAllister, R. S. Morrow and Harry Montgomery, there was great applause. The five members of the board selected out of 15 repeating candidates are as follows: Edgar E. Frank, Frank E. Watkins, Martin Pratt, Charles E. McDowell and Albert E. All. All of the new members are or were athletes of great prominence and stand for the athletic development of the organization.

As a mark of appreciation for the work he has done toward furthering the club's interest, Frank was honored by the directors with an honorary life membership, the highest gift within the power of the club. Flowerdew Scott, the famous football man, was honored with a life membership, the second highest mark of distinction.

One interesting report was that of the membership committee, which shows a gain of 112 names on the membership roll over that of a year ago.

Treasurer Rasch's report shows the total receipts of the year to be \$4,337.35, while the total disbursements were \$3,398.73, leaving a balance of \$5,938.62.

There was a surplus of \$8000 from football under manager Pratt's efficient regime, while the indoor athletic committee presided over by Edgar Frank, shows net gains of \$234.08.
