COMMON STOCK
PAYS NOTHING

Streetcar Company's Officials Deny Charge Made in the Council.

The city council spent most of yesterday afternoon's session in passing upon the many clauses of the proposed franchises of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, which has applied for extensions on 45 streets. The session was adjourned at 8:30 to convene again this morning at 9:30 and the council is still at work this afternoon. The indications are that the franchise ordinance will not be checked over and brought up for passage before the next regular session, two weeks hence.

On the one hand the company, through its attorney, F. V. Holman, and Vice President Fuller, is insisting on the utmost freedom of action and the minimum of regulation by the council under the new franchises and on the other City Attorney Kavanaugh and Mayor Lane are using their best efforts to secure the insertion of provisions for the city's protection. A majority of the council complacently follows the suggestions of the company. The people whom they represent, they say, want the new lines and the corporation has said that unless it is satisfied with the franchise there will be no new lines.

The common stock has never paid a single dollar in dividends. When asked by the mayor if this were not true both Mr. Fuller and Mr. Holman emphatically denied it. What the company is capitalizing at, said Attorney Holman, "but I think the preferred stock amounts to \$5,000,000 and the common stock to \$10,000,000. However, there is no reason why the exact amounts should be kept secret. The common stock has never paid a single dollar in dividends."

WATER BOARD
RAISES WAGES

The city water board unanimously voted yesterday afternoon to increase salaries of employees in the water office. The advance is from 12 to 100 per cent. The board selected a site on Mount Tabor for the new reservoir and the selection was recommended to the city council, which is asked to purchase the property at a cost not to exceed \$77,463, that sum being the total of estimates on four different tracts which comprise the reservoir location. The property is owned by Mrs. Field, Mrs. Hartman, Mrs. A. G. Grou, Mrs. E. W. Peterson, Mrs. Eppie Horford, Mrs. V. M. Horford and Fred Vail.

TRAIN ROBBER
LEADER CAUGHT

"Dutch Pete" Stroff Arrested by Portland Officers in San Francisco.

Sheriff Stevens received a telegram last night announcing the capture of "Dutch Pete" Stroff, who is suspected of being the ringleader of the gang of three who held up an O. R. & N. train near Portland on the night of December 15. Stroff was arrested by Deputies Archie Leonard and J. J. Fitzgerald in San Francisco and will be brought to Portland for trial at once. Stroff is the other member of the gang of hold-up men and by the confessions of the other two, Jack Hayes and William Burkes, who pleaded guilty and were sent to the penitentiary, he believes he will be able to prove that Stroff was the leader. Stroff is regarded as one of the most desperate criminals that ever operated in the Pacific northwest. He has served a term in the penitentiary at Deer Lodge, Mont. and it was while there that he met Hayes who helped him in the O. R. & N. holdup. The sheriff's deputies had been looking for Stroff ever since the robbery.

MUCH PROGRESS
AT BROWNSVILLE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Brownsville, Feb. 11.—At a meeting of the city council an ordinance was passed providing for the grading of portions of Main street and Spaulding avenue. These are the two principal business streets, and are in poor condition. Work will begin early in the spring, at

which time the old wooden sidewalks will be replaced by cement. Through the efforts of the Commercial club of this city, Brownsville is to have a Sunday mail service, and a carrier is to be secured who will bring the mail over from Halsey every Sunday afternoon arriving here at 2:15. In this way the citizens will get the Sunday papers the same day they are published, instead of Monday.

GIVES LECTURE

George Wharton James, the eminent writer and lecturer, whose personal knowledge of the Indians of the southwest, of out-of-door life and of wild animals in their natural environment is second to none, lectured last night at Centenary Methodist church, corner East Ninth and Pine streets on "The Power of Love." In this lecture Mr. James told of personal experience in the matter of taming wild animals by the more active spirit of kindness and understanding of them which he possesses. Next week Tuesday and Wednesday, Mr. James is to give two more lectures. On Tuesday night the topic is "Living the Indian Life," a lecture which is as well known as the famous "Simple Life" lectures of Jacob Rlie. Wednesday evening's subject is "The Wonders of the Grand Canyon." This lecture will be illustrated with pictures taken by Mr. James during his many years in that wonderful region. Major Powell has said of Mr. James that he knows the Grand Canyon better than any other living man, a statement which is not perhaps an exaggeration, as Mr. James has lived in it for a large part of the last 20 years. Mr. James is an author of wide experience. He has written "In and Around the Grand Canyon of the Colorado River in Arizona," "The Indians of the Painted Desert Region," "In and Out of the Old Missions of California," "The Wonders of the Colorado Desert," "The Story of Scraggle" and other works. Not less interesting than Mr. James' utterances from the lecture platform is the purpose which he has in mind of collecting material while here for an article in "The Arena" dealing with Portland's municipal affairs.
