List of House Measures Fa-

ure Is Disposed of by a Down for Additional J. K. Vansant. vorably Acted Upon
Vote of 31 to 21. Testimony. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Today.

Salem, Or., Feb. 16.—The Multnomah county courthouse location bill was snowed under in the house last night. The bill came up late and it was explained that the measure simply gave the people of Portland a right to say where they desired their building to be located. The measure was defeated. Davis wanted the bill to pass. McArthur and Abbott fought it, contending that the larger number of people would be on the east side and yet have had no business to transact at the courthouse, would locate on the east side, away from the center of the business district. They contended the building should be on the west side, where it would be easy of access to the bus and street cars.

H. B. 71.—Hawley—Providing for six months salary of assessor of Columbia county.

H. B. 62.—Conyers—To prevent swindling from running at large in Columbia and Lane counties.

H. B. 27.—Barrett—To prevent stock running at large in Multnomah county west of Sandy river.
