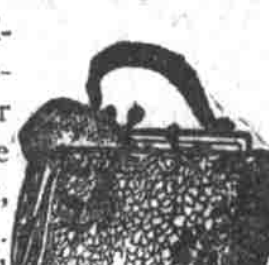

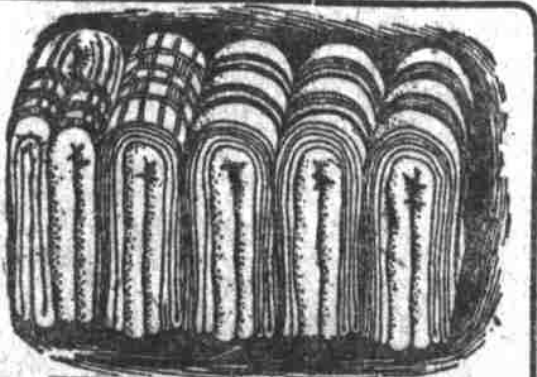

WORK STARTS ON WATER PROJECT

Mayor Kinney Throws First Shovel of Dirt on Irrigation Canal.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Grants Pass, Or., Feb. 18.—With much enthusiasm, and much enthusiasm, ground for the first irrigation canal for the Grants Pass Project was broken this afternoon. The ceremony was held at the Golden Grift Dam, three miles from city. A special train carried several hundred. Stores were closed and people attended en masse. Train left here at 1 and remained an hour at the dam, where teams and a crew were placed at work. Construction will be pushed

that water may be conveyed to the lands this summer. Address was made by E. E. Blanchard, secretary of the Commercial club; H. L. Gilkey, president of the Josephine County Power & Irrigation company. The first shovel of dirt was thrown by H. C. Kinney, mayor of Grants Pass. Ground was broken for the gravity canal on the north bank of Rogue river. Surviving crews are now at work on the high line ditches, six of which will be constructed. The company is composed entirely of local people. The expense of the canal and ditch construction will be borne by prospective water users.

TAFT TO BE MADE A MASON TODAY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Cincinnati, Feb. 18.—President-elect Taft arrived here early today from Washington on a regular train. There was no demonstration, and he was greeted only by a crowd of friends. He will remain here until Saturday night, when he will go to Philadelphia and remain there until the inauguration. The acceptance of Taft as a Mason

at sight is scheduled to take place at 5 o'clock this afternoon. Over 500 invitations have been issued and accepted. The Masons officiating will be Grand Master Hoshkinson of the grand lodge of Ohio, and W. R. Melish, who will act as master of ceremonies. After his initiation, the president-elect will be a guest at the Knights Templar banquet to be held tonight.

RUSSIAN SPY AT ALCATRAZ

Suspect Who Came From Nagasaki on the Buford Is a Prisoner.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Feb. 18.—Suspected of being a Russian spy, Paul Uttikin, a young man of education and refinement, is a prisoner in the United States military prison at Alcatraz Island. Uttikin arrived on the transport Buford, which he boarded in Nagasaki harbor in the uniform of a United States marine. He was discovered aboard ship at roll call and consigned to the fire-room, where he performed the most menial duties assigned to stowaways. When the transport arrived here im-

migration officers, acting under orders from Washington, took the Russian in charge, and he was transferred to Alcatraz.

JAP BATTLESHIPS ON ROCKS TUESDAY

KILLS HIS WIFE THEN HIMSELF

Dick Bennett Shoots Woman Who Deserted Him and Takes His Own Life.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Feb. 18.—Murder and suicide as a result of what appears to be the unfaithfulness of a wife occurred at 131 Second avenue at 6 o'clock this morning, when Dick Bennett shot and killed his wife and then fired a bullet through his brain. Bennett came to Seattle five days ago from his home at Los Angeles. He told a story of his wife, Mrs. Minnie

Bennett, having deserted him months ago and of his having traced her to Seattle. Four days ago he put in an appearance at the house on Second avenue and there found his wife living with another man.

The man disappeared on that day and Bennett, returned to his lodgings. Whether or not he had any other meetings with Mrs. Bennett between that time and this morning is not known, but early this morning he arrived at the house and entered the kitchen where Mrs. Bennett was preparing breakfast. Drawing a revolver from his pocket he shot his wife four times, and then placed the muzzle of the gun to his forehead and fired.
