

CENTRAL OF
FAMOUS CHURCHCelebration to Be Held in a
Cradle of Liberty at
Boston.

Boston, Mass., Feb. 20.—The famous old Park Street church is to celebrate its centennial next week and the event promises to be one of the most notable of the year in religious circles. Some of the best known speakers among the clergy will take part in the celebration, which will extend over a period of several days. The Rev. Dr. A. Z. Conrad, the present pastor, will direct the observances and will be assisted by Dr. Chauncey Brewster and the Rev. Dr. Charles Parkhurst.

The Park Street church is one of the most famous in Boston. It dates back to 1829, and the stately structure at the junction of Tremont and Park streets is the best example remaining in the city of the early nineteenth century ecclesiastical architecture.

The history of the church is notable. It is marked as the edifice in which "America" was first publicly sung on July 4, 1822. It was in this church that on July 4, 1829, William Lloyd Garrison, then a young man, delivered his great address on "The War System of Nations," at the annual convention of the American Peace society, which that year began to hold its sessions in the Park Street church. The church remained the Peace society's regular meeting place for many years. The Park Street church was the first Unitarian church established after the invasion of Unitarianism in the Puritan churches, and the fervor with which the unadulterated orthodox doctrine was preached by its earlier ministers made its pulpit famous and led to the bestowment upon the site the church occupies of the title of "Brimstone corner."

WONDERFUL CATFISH

GOES TO A-Y-Y-P.

Vancouver, Wash., Feb. 20.—Several months ago a mammoth catfish was caught in a slough below Vancouver, and since that time has been kept in a pan of fresh water in the window of a fish and oyster house on Washington street. During all this time the fish has refused to eat anything and has not as yet shown any ill effects from its extended fast of four months. When the cold spell of weather struck Vancouver a month or more ago, the catfish was frozen up in the pan of ice and was picked out by the proprietor of the store with an ice pick, but he survived the shock.

Yesterday Bernard Ballert, assistant collector of specimens for the fisheries department of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition of Seattle, was in the city and secured the fish, which, on account of its size and wonderful tenacity to life, will occupy a prominent position at the exhibit at the great fair. It was placed in a solution of formaldehyde.

MILLIONS FOR
CHURCH WORKMethodists Plan Incorpora-
tion to Increase Church
Funds.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Utica, N. Y., Feb. 20.—The Methodist Episcopal Foundation fund is considering plans today for incorporating a \$2,000,000 company to operate for the benefit of the Methodist churches throughout the country. It is proposed to organize a trust company, with capital invested for the purpose of devoting the income to the use of needy churches. To provide against shrinkage one-tenth of the income will be reinvested annually.

Among the branches to be benefited will be foreign and home missions, the boards of Sunday schools, education, freedmen's aid, church extension and women's home and foreign missions.

DECLARED SANE. THEN
QUEERS THE FINDING

Seattle, Feb. 20.—After escaping from the St. Helens hospital for the insane near Tacoma a week ago, submitting to arrest in Seattle at the hands of the city police on suspicion of insanity, and being declared entirely sane yesterday by a lunacy commission, Henry Bachman, through his attorney, reclaimed two spoons and a dog, which he said he had left at the jail, is again behind the bars and is being held awaiting the arrival of an attendant to return him to the asylum.

Bachman is now in the peculiar position of having been declared sane after escaping from an asylum, where he was committed on the verdict of a King county lunacy commission that he was insane.

MT. RAINIER REGION
TO HAVE THE PHONE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, Feb. 20.—For the first time the Mount Rainier region will be connected with the outside world by telephone. John M. Bell of Tacoma has secured a franchise from the county commissioners to run a line from Tacoma to the boundary of the Rainier forest reserve, and a permit from the government to operate the line through the reserve.

The line will follow the main county road from Tacoma to the Nisqually river and follow the stage road leading up the river to Longmire Springs and into Paradise. Farmers along the route will be given a service for \$2 monthly. Keys will be rented to automobile men who wish to use a phone, and there will be regular automobile stations at frequent points along the line. The line will be completed in three months.
