Mrs. Wilson was left homeless and penniless about a year ago by her husband in the town of Caldwell. She had a little team of ponies, an old wagon, and four children, aged three, eight, 14 and 15. She began to make a living by cutting and hauling sage brush to town to sell for firewood.
