

LEARNED MEN IN PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Taft at University of Pennsylvania Analyzes Modern Political Elements and Pays Tribute to the Great Washington.

Philadelphia, Feb. 22.—Addressing a great audience of students, faculty and graduates of the University of Pennsylvania, President-elect William H. Taft today discussed the relations of the learned professions to government.

Taft referred to the influence of the various professions on politics and paid tribute to ministers, physicians, journalists and men of all professions in political affairs. He said that Washington as a man whose profession might be termed military and who proved himself a born leader of men and a man of high character. Taft said in part:

"The first profession is that of the minister. There was in New England, and every other part of the country, under the influence of its traditions, when the minister of the church in addition to that of his sacred office, exercised a most powerful influence, which was of a distinctly political character."

"The Minister as a Reformer."

"During the administration of Mr. Roosevelt, and under the influence of certain revelations of business immorality, the conscience of the whole country was shocked and then turned to the demand for reform. The tendency of affairs being introduced. In this movement the ministers of the various churches have recognized the duty upon them to assist, and they have been heard the country over in accents much more effective than ever before in half a century. They have been always been discreet. They have sometimes attempted to make the moral reforms by law wider than practical experience would justify. Indeed, the tendency of some ministers in taking part in politics and seeking governmental reform is to demand too close a realization of their ideals, and to manifest an unwillingness to give up the accomplishment of some far decided progress toward reform. This is a limitation upon their usefulness."

"The next profession is that of the teacher. Of course the greater number of teachers are engaged in primary and secondary instruction and industrial or vocational work. Their relation to politics and government is of the utmost importance though indirect. The next profession for consideration in its relation to governmental matters is that of medicine. Physicians have been physicians who have given up their practice and gone into politics. They have become interested in government of late years because the functions of government have widened and now embrace in a real and substantial way the preservation of the health of all the people."

"Source of Lawyers' Influence. We come finally to the profession of the law. With the exception, perhaps, of the profession of arms, the law is and always has been influential in countries most prominent in political and governmental matters. This is so because in a wide sense the profession of the law is the profession of government, or at least it is the profession of the state, in which agencies of government are used and in which the principles applied are those of the state."

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FUNDS SPENT JUDICIOUSLY

Legislative Committee Indorses Work of Oregon's A.-Y.-P. Commission.

That the Oregon commission having in charge the state exhibit at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle has expended the funds judiciously, making a fine showing and at the same time keeping within the appropriation, is the conclusion of the special legislative committee appointed to investigate the accounts of the exposition. The committee consisted of Senators Bailey and Wood and Representatives Greer, Eaton and Hawley, all of whom signed the report.

The legislature has appropriated \$25,000 additional to provide for new exhibits and extension of the scope of the Oregon exhibit. It was also voted to allow the commission to dispose of the building and furniture at the close of the exposition, instead of turning them over to the state agricultural board, as was at first thought might be done.

"We, your special committee, appointed to investigate the accounts of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, beg to report that we have gone into the matter as far as we could without visiting Seattle and that we have interviewed responsible men as to the accomplishments of the commission at Seattle, with the result that we find that all accounts are correct in detail."

"That the money disbursed has been economically and judiciously spent. That the Oregon building is a great credit to the state and the Oregon commission. The location is the best of any state building on the ground. The structure is beautiful, and admirably arranged for exhibition and entertainment purposes, and the building was constructed at a saving of several thousand dollars over the cost of other state buildings. Four carloads of exhibits are now at Seattle, and the work of securing additional exhibits is well under way."

"The commission has not miscalculated its expenditures, as authorized by the last legislative session, but, on the contrary, has made its plans conform to the money appropriated. The additional appropriation asked for is to make still better the exhibits and to place Oregon in better position as compared with our neighboring states. The plans of the committee are definite, and there is no question as to the advantages an additional appropriation would give our state at the exposition."

"However, we believe that the state's interest can be adequately served with an appropriation of \$25,000 and we therefore recommend this amount."

which either affect the relations between individuals or the relations between the government and individuals, and all of which are defined by what for want of a better term, is called municipal law. "National exigency seems to call for, as if by aid of a special Providence, the men peculiarly fitted to meet the requirements of the situation. Such were Lincoln and Grant during the great war. Such in the revolution was Washington. The anniversary of the birthday this university appropriately makes its commencement day. He was not a lawyer or a doctor or a minister. He was a survivor and a farmer. As a student of military science in the hard school of experience, his profession may be said to have been that of arms. Not brilliant, but facile, not eloquent, but those qualities which placed him far above the brilliant, facile, able and learned men who were gathered about him in the struggle for American independence. He was a leader of men. His pure distinction, his freedom from small jealousies, his marvelous common sense, his indomitable perseverance and patience and his serenity and calm under the most trying circumstances gave him the victory—a victory which could be traced not to brilliant genius or professional training, but to that which of all things is the most to be pursued and desired—to his high character as a man."

CHANGES WASHINGTON SPEECH TO LECTURE.

Chicago, Feb. 22.—Governor Fort of New Jersey, during his speech at the local celebration of the anniversary of the birth of George Washington today, commented adversely on the attempts of certain western states to pass laws in contravention of existing national treaties. He said: "The recent attempt of two western states by law to exclude certain foreign subjects or citizens from schools or from the rights to hold property, is in conflict with existing treaties or those which hereafter may be made, would be, if adopted, utterly nugatory. No one can deny that the right of international matter or to set up its own laws for the subversion of rights granted any foreigner by treaty ratified."

"As pointed out by the constitution, there is no more salutary provision in the constitution than this. But for this provision any state might embroil the republic in controversy with foreign powers at its pleasure."

Taft Orator at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 22.—Following an annual custom inaugurated in 1926, the University of Pennsylvania today observed Washington's birthday by exercises appropriate to the occasion. More than three thousand students marched from the university campus to the Academy of Music to participate in the exercises. President-elect Taft delivered the oration of the day, and was given an enthusiastic reception. The exercises concluded with the conferring of honorary degrees upon several public men, among them the president-elect. Tonight Mr. Taft is to be the guest of honor at the annual dinner of the University of Pennsylvania alumni society.

Parades at Seattle.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 22.—Washington's birthday is being observed in Seattle today with a parade of the national guard and exercises in the classrooms of the public schools of the city. Banquets and balls will be given by various organizations during the afternoon and evening. THROW PLAYMATE INTO RIVER AND STONE HIM

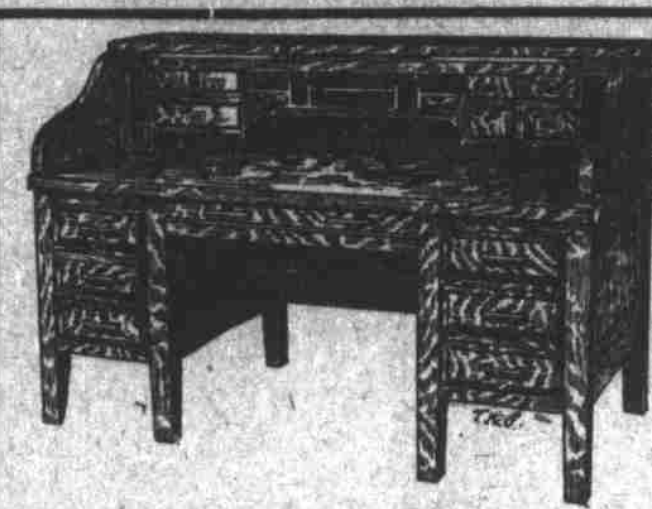
