Paris, Feb. 25.—British secret service agents are keeping a close watch on the Hindu colony here. They are convinced that the anti-English campaign being conducted by the Hindus from Paris, the terrorists finding it easier, as the Russian revolutionists found it, to stir up a mob than to reach the authorities they are fighting, while leaving the execution of their plans to the mob, has increased their ignorance of all details of the general conspiracy except those relating to their own part in it. The agents are also examining plots. It is pretty well known now, were hatched in London. The agents have now rendered the English metropolis so dangerous a place from which to conduct a campaign against the continent, that they recently decided to transfer their headquarters to the continent. A notice was sent to the Hindus in Paris in the middle of the time and it began to be noticed that the leading agitators were disappearing from England and turning up in the continent.

**Readers Are High Caste Men.**

Contrary to the representations of English government officials and messengers, the members of the suspected-plotters are almost all men of high caste, excellent education and apparently of considerable wealth. The indications of their movements indicate, none of the native Indian princes, the preservation of whose rule is the ostensible basis of the conspiracy, are concerned in the movement for independence.

That the class directly below them, representing most of the brains and a considerable part of the wealth of the country, is saturated with sedition, is admitted, however, by all who have closely studied the situation.

That the lower classes are concerned in the movement, signs of sympathetic disorders having manifested themselves in the past, is also admitted. The reports of the Paris secret police have been almost as vigilant as the English agents in India, and they have swept out the Indian plotters.

**In for Troublous Times.**  
The impression here, based on the French detectives' conclusions is that the British are not in any danger at this time in India. It was never the opinion of Paris observers of the situation that the British would be overthrown. The British when the agitation movement became conspicuous would have much effect. The English Government has a public opinion that was that the outrages of the past year or more were merely sporadic, the result of a few fanatics. The Government was different, but without any relation to one another. Frenchmen in close touch with the British Government were of the opinion, however, that a single organization was directing the entire campaign and that an enormous proportion of the population was in sympathy with it. It is believed now that what the conspirators want is gradually to work their way through the country by a series of political outrages until a widespread mutiny is precipitated. The judgment is that the British have more than an even chance of success.
