## ENJOINS PAYMENT OF SALARY TO GATENS

Carrying the fight from the legislature to the courts, Henry E. McGinn still has hopes of putting Multnomah county's new circuit judgeship out of existence. Alleging that the emergency clause attached to the Jaeger bill is insufficient, he has brought suit in his own name to restrain the payment of salary by the county to Judge W. N. Gatens, recently appointed by Governor Chamberlain, and also the payment of the clerk and bailiff of the new department.

The question rests upon the failure of the new law to include the word "im-

mediate" in declaring the existence of an emergency. McGinn holds that it is necessary for the legislature to say that the necessity is immediate to protect the public health, peace or safety.

Judge Gatens this morning said that there is no question in his mind that the emergency clause is sufficient as it stands. Further than this, he did not care to discuss the situation created by the attack upon his authority. He is proceeding with his work as usual, confident that it will not be necessary to try over the case that have been assigned to him, as would be necessary

if McGinn's contention were sustained. U'Ren joins in fight.

W. S. U'Ren and Christian Schuebel of Oregon City, are the attorneys of record for McGinn, and the case may be sent to Oregon City for trial, as Presiding Judge Gutenberg has stated that any possible time of local interest he will transfer the case to another county.

The appearance of U'Ren and Schuebel also invests the case with added interest, indicating that McGinn has an emergency clause wherever they can be attacked.

Three thousand dollars of the salary of the circuit judges in this county is paid by the state and an additional thousand by the county. The latter portion of the salary was made the point of attack because the first monthly installment will be due March 1. County Judge Webster and the commissioners are required to appear in the circuit court next Wednesday morning to show cause why the injunction should not issue.

The emergency clause attached to the Jaeger bill was as follows:

"Section 6. Whereas, the circuit court of the Fourth judicial district, as now held, is overcrowded with work and the trial of civil and criminal causes, and the administration of justice is delayed thereby, endangering the preservation of public peace and safety and delaying the prompt trial of parties charged with crime, an emergency is hereby declared, and this act shall take effect and be in full force from and after its approval by the governor."

Had the lawmakers been thoughtful enough to insert the word "immediately" somewhere in this clause the steam would have been taken out of the fight that McGinn is making. As it stands there appears to be a close question in the minds of many lawyers.

Power is unquestioned.

There is no question about the power of the legislature to judge of the necessity, without review by the courts, and the point is whether or not the legislative declaration is sufficient without using the word "immediate."

If the lack of that nine letter word in the case for McGinn, the law would not be in effect for 60 days from its passage and would be subject to the referendum threatened by McGinn.

Then, in turn, if the referendum were invoked, the law would be held up until after the election in November, 1910.

The change in sentiment would have to grind along with four judges.

## JAP BOYCOTT ON A-Y-P. REMOVED

(United Press Special Wire.)

Tokio, Feb. 25.—Reconsidering their recent action in presenting a resolution against participation in the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, the Asahi and Kiri newspapers have cancelled the resolution and have taken steps to send a large representation and a great exhibit.

The change in sentiment was further shown by a request by the government to the diet asking a large expenditure for the Anglo-Japanese exhibition next year in which good will toward America was expressed.

Butler, a stenographer 45 years old, rooming at 1317 Belmont street, went into the grocer at 430 Third street, and East Stark street, on the Ladd tract, yesterday and drained a small vial of carbolic acid. His roommate, Harry Duxator, found the vial of carbolic acid in his room, and he was well when he returned to his room in the evening, and accompanied by a policeman searched the woods last night until the suicide's body was found.

Butler was depressed on account of continued illness and his inability to get superior work, and the cause of his work. He came from Grand Rapids, Mich., and was a member of the Odd Fellows. No inquest will be held. The body is at the funeral home.

The farewell note left by Butler in his room reads as follows:

"Discouraged, Good-bye, Dock, and all of my friends. I've stood this as long as I can. Such awful feelings! You will find me in the big wood on Stark street. Send my best wishes to J. W. Butler, Cedar Springs, Mich. Keep the rest of the things yourself."

"P. S.—I ain't any good and never will be, and I know it. H. E. B."

## YALE FORESTRY STUDENTS TO TEXAS

New Haven, Conn., Feb. 25.—The members of the senior class of the Yale forestry school, departed today for Texas, where they are to spend the spring term in gaining, under special supervision, practical knowledge of the forests of that region. The destination is the town of Dulcote, 60 miles north of Austin, where the students will study on a piece of timber land owned by the Thompson Lumber company and extending over about 40,000 acres. The instruction in the Texas camp will be directed by Professor H. H. Chapman and R. C. Bryant, instructors in the forestry school. The class will be assisted by members of the lumber company and also by G. K. Smith, secretary of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, who will explain to the students the grading of lumber.

## DR. SHAHAN IS UNIVERSITY HEAD

Installed as Provisional Rector of Great Catholic Institution.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The formal installation of Rev. Dr. Thomas J. Shahan as provisional rector of the Catholic university took place in McMahon hall today and was marked by interesting ceremonies. Cardinal Gibbons presided and among those in attendance were Mgr. Diomedes Falconio, the apostolic delegate, and other members of the delegation. The student body and the faculty of the university and the local clergy also were present. The ceremonies were followed by a reception in honor of Bishop O'Connell, the retiring rector, and the incoming executive.

The new rector is one of the best known educators in the American Catholic church and has been the dominant force in the Catholic university faculty since its organization. He is considered one of the most erudite members of the American church and while his associates rejoice in his promotion there is genuine regret to lose him from the ranks of teachers.

Dr. Shahan was born in Manchester, N. H., in 1837. He attended school in Millis, Mass., during his early boyhood and began his theological studies in Laval college, Montreal. His brilliant record of study caused him to be sent to the American college in Rome, where he took his degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1874. He pursued courses of history in the Berlin and Paris universities and also at the Sorbonne. He was ordained a priest in Rome in 1882. He was affiliated with the diocese of Hartford after his return from abroad, and was its chancellor for several years.

Since 1899 Dr. Shahan has been a member of the faculty of the Catholic university. He is much interested in the revival of Gaelic and took an active part in creating the endowment for the chair of Gaelic in the Catholic university. He is an active member of the Knights of Columbus and other officers of that organization to endow the chair of American history. Dr. Shahan was one of the promoters of the Catholic Encyclopedia and is a member of the editorial board.

## NEVADA HOUSE PASSES ANTI-GAMBLING BILL

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Carson, Nev., Feb. 25.—By a vote of 27 to 20 the house yesterday passed the anti-gambling bill.

The bill is entitled "An act prohibiting gambling, providing for the destruction of gambling property, and punishment for violation."

Section 1 provides that it shall be unlawful for any person to conduct, play, deal or carry on in any capacity any game of chance such as Faro, roulette, rondo, poker, klondike, or any percentage game or banking game carried on with cards, checks, dice or otherwise; also slot machines where money is involved.

Violation is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1000, or by imprisonment not to exceed one year, or both.

Section 2 prevents owners of houses from renting for the purposes of gambling, and affixes a fine. Any person who is declared a common gambler and cannot show any fixed residence, or any person who engages in gambling is subject to fine and imprisonment.

Section 4 gives the sheriff the right forcibly to enter places and arrest persons engaged in gambling, and provide for the destruction of gambling devices when found.

The bill now goes to the senate.
