EXTENDING THE TILLAMOOK

United Railways President Says Four Good Routes Have Been Found.

Traffic over the United Railways lines from Portland to Tillamook will be inaugurated with a thirty-minute service about the middle of March, said President Thomas Greenough last night. The line will be extending to Forest Grove, construction work beginning some time in March, and from there on to the Chinook country, which is the objective point, a choice of four routes, all equally good, being offered. Physically one is as good as another. "The distance from Portland to the coast over the proposed United Railways line is at no point less than 100 miles, more than 1 1/2 per cent," says Mr. Greenough, who was particularly enthusiastic over the fact. The greatest curve on the line is 4 per cent. Work on the Cornelius Gap tunnel is progressing in a very satisfactory way. The number of work boys from each side and Mr. Greenough feels sure that it will be completed by the time the line is laid to that point. The Cornelius Gap tunnel will be 3800 feet long.

With the exception of two small gaps where construction work remains yet to be done the road is completed to Holbrook. Mr. Greenough says the line will be handled as well as passengers.

SIXTEEN HUNDRED OF FEET MAJOR

Candidates for City Offices Already as Plentiful as Blackberries.

Aspirants for city office and municipal honor are springing into public view every day. Not less than 15 well known men of Portland are being talked of as possibilities for the mayoralty race. Politicians are arguing that there will be no appreciable contest for the office of city auditor, and that the office of city auditor will be held by the same man who will be elected mayor. The different candidates are beginning to shake hands with their neighbors and ask about the babies and the little ones, and are beginning to oil up the cogs preparatory to starting the machine. Everywhere the hum of political activity is heard. The city is beginning to fill the air and the primaries still nearly two months away. While the different candidates are pointing up their individual boasts the Union Republican club is preparing to hold a meeting tomorrow night and decide how to hold a Republican city convention for the purpose of fixing up a slate from the mayor down the line. Because of the prospective battle the members of the council who want to be mayor, or some of them at least, are finding it difficult to get on their feet. Some of the hopefuls. Among the list of candidates for mayor on the Republican ticket, who are either openly in the field or are being urged to become open candidates are: Mayor Lane, who is the favorite of the present collector of internal revenue; R. L. Stevens, sheriff of Multnomah county; E. B. Beach, a well known merchant who is being boomed for the job by the Union Republican club; C. W. Jackson, urged by the members of the Commercial club and various business men of the city; A. N. Willis, councilman, who is the muckraker of the list; Dan Kollaher, a well known senator, who wants to reform things generally and the corporations in general; A. C. Bailey, a well known merchant, who is being persuaded by his friends among the business men of the city; Charles E. McDonald, the choice of the militia boys; A. G. Runkhight, councilman, who is being urged to run by his friends among the manufacturers and some other business men's associations; Ben Selling, who is being urged to run by his friends among the business men of the city; George L. Baker, councilman, who contends that he also knows some things about what a businesslike administration should do; and John P. Kavanaugh, city attorney, who is the choice of the younger voters.

Mayor Lane as a Enigma. Mayor Lane is an enigma. He is still a great believer in his slogan, "sufficiency until the day is his evil thereof," and refuses to give to his close friends to say whether he will become a candidate for reelection. It is not believed that he will try to run for a third term. Even his political enemies admit that in this case he would be a formidable candidate and that his opponent whoever he might be, would have to do some sprinting to nose out at the polls.

Many friends of the ex-mayor are urging John M. Gearin to become a candidate, but he has steadfastly refused to consider the proposition and there is small probability that he would consent to make the race under any circumstances. R. D. Hman is also being talked of, but it is very doubtful if he will allow himself to become more than a verbal possibility.

It seems to be the consensus of opinion that A. L. Barbur will have no trouble in securing the nomination for reelection as city auditor, while the same thing holds true in the case of J. E. Werlein, city treasurer. It being the current assumption that there will be no contest for either of these positions.

Bennett to Have Rival. H. A. Bennett and J. S. Bennett, councilmen from the Eighth ward, will also be candidates for reelection, and will in all probability be opposed by several candidates, though these have not yet appeared.

The entrance of A. N. Willis, into the contest for councilman at large and will contest for councilman at large and will leave a place there for a scrap. No one has as yet appeared to claim the office.

Tomorrow night the Union Republican club will hold a meeting at which the question of having a city convention will be discussed. It is the desire of the managers of the club to hold such a convention. An appeal will probably be sent out to the business men, the union organizations and the public generally who vote the Republican ticket, to elect delegates to a convention. It is the plan for this convention to nominate a ticket back of which the Union Republican club will throw its support.

Within the next week the fight for the different nominations is expected to be in full swing with new candidates popping up to the right and the left and full fledged booms on every hand.

SCHOOL BOARD ASKS FOR BIDS

Bids on improvements for nine school buildings in the city of Portland were ordered advertised for by the school board yesterday afternoon. These improvements are in the nature of additions and will cost about \$100,000, that sum having been voted at the annual taxpayers' meeting recently. So rapidly is the school population increasing that even with the enlarged buildings Superintendent Rigler expects to see room lacking at the opening of the fall term.

Two new structures are to be built out of the fund provided for improvements. They are the Williams avenue Glencoe school houses. Plans for increasing the size of Oakley Green school by the addition of four rooms have been interfered with by the resolution of the council to extend Ainsworth avenue. If this street is extended it will cut through the proposed site of the building. It is thought that the council will be prevailed upon to rescind the proceedings.

The board authorized Miss Lillian Tingle, of the domestic science department, to purchase equipment for a dining room and kitchen at single will each high school make the fine art of serving all kinds of meals.

ADMIRAL EVANS IN NAVY HALF CENTURY

From the veterans of the Civil war down to the boys and girls in school who are reading for the first time stories of that tremendous conflict, all know of "Fighting Bob" Evans. Some can remember the capture of Fort Fisher, where he began his naval career, for his country, and can tell of his determination when both legs were shattered and he could hardly crawl, but could still shoot.

The date of his appointment to the navy was September 20, 1860, almost a half century ago. He started his career aboard "Old Ironsides." His first command was the yacht America, manned with two guns and 14 midshipmen. This followed the Powhatan, Santiago, Placataqua, Delaware, Colorado, Congress, Saratoga, Yorktown, New York, Indiana, Iowa, and finally the great fleet on the trip from Hampton Roads to San Francisco.

Life has served in every sea on the globe, has known service from midshipman to admiral and participated in the wars of '61 and '97.
