Many Colonists Are Coming—Special preparations are being made by the transcontinental roads terminating in Portland for the handling of the big tourist travel expected here beginning this week. The tourist tickets to Oregon go on sale March 1 and the U. S. G. will operate a special tourist sleeper from Denver to Portland daily and the Union Pacific will run another from Omaha. Thousands of tourists, descriptive of Portland and Oregon are being distributed by the Union Pacific advertising the advantages of coming to the A. V. P. fair by way of Portland. The front page photograph shows the interior of the forestry building at the Lewis & Clark fair grounds. The folders are designed to offset, in a measure, the disadvantages Portland suffers from the closed gateway.

Open Shop at Trades School—The newly established public trades school is to have an open shop next Friday, during which time the shops and classrooms of the institution will be thrown open to the public. The school is located at the corner of 10th and 11th streets. The hours will be from 9:30 till 2:30. The trade school is becoming more and more popular every day and has almost its full capacity enrolled. It is the only school of its kind west of Chicago and has attracted a great deal of interest since it was established last fall. There have been a large number of inquiries into the work of the school and to answer some of these it has been decided to hold open shop on Friday. The classes and shops will be open and running from 9:30 till 2:30.

Missionary Work in Philippines—Lectures on the missionary work of the Methodist Episcopal church in the Philippine Islands, the government and the customs of the natives, with an exhibition of curios will be given this evening in Woodmen's hall, by Irving Hart, manager of the Methodist publishing house in Manila. Mr. Hart has been in the island nine years, as a soldier, a civil government employee and as a worker in the mission cause. His publishing house is printing Bibles, tracts and the Christian Advocate in English and Spanish, putting out last year 8,000,000 folio pages.

MASS MEETING OF RESCUE WORKERS

The annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective society will be held March 3, at 10th and 11th streets. A mass meeting will be held that same evening at which time addresses will be made by Mrs. L. G. Baldwin, Dr. Leon Wulst Hyde and W. G. McLaren on the rescue work accomplished by the Portland Commons and allied subjects. At the recent meeting the constitution was ratified and the following open letter to the public is being distributed by the members of the board of directors:

"To the citizens of Portland: The home office of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective society, Portland Commons, Louise Home, Girls' Rescue and Mission: We the board of directors, responsible citizens of Portland, knowing we are doing a much needed work as an investigation of the Louise Home and the Portland Commons will disclose the work is being admirably prosecuted by our superintendent, W. G. McLaren, in whom as a board, we have every confidence and who we may say has demonstrated himself as a superior organizer and manager of such work, not only here, but elsewhere. His heart is in the work and this fact distinguishes him from a mere promoter. He has the endorsement of one of the clergies and the city of Portland and the surrounding country as well as his hearty cooperation. We assure the general public that he will not be guilty of parading in the press of the city added or impossible reports of the work done by the association. The P. C. R. and P. S. is manned by thoroughly Christian people and associated with one of the cleanest and most aggressive missions in the city and the moral good accruing to the patrons of the institution is at least commensurate with the temporal good proposed."
