

CALL ISSUED TO CONGRESS

PHILANTHROPIST-PHYSICIAN OF LABRADOR TO BE CITY'S GUEST

President Taft Issues Proclamation for Monday, March 15.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, March 6.—President Taft this afternoon issued a proclamation calling the sixty-first congress to hold a session to begin March 15 for consideration of the tariff. The proclamation reads:
"Whereas, The public interest requires the congress of the United States to convene on the 15th day of March, 1909, at 12 noon, March 15, 1909, to receive such communication as may be made by the executive;
Therefore, I, William Howard Taft, president of the United States of America, hereby proclaim and declare that an extraordinary session requires the congress of the United States to convene in extra session at the capitol in the city of Washington, March 15, 1909, at 12 noon, and of which all persons at that time entitled to act as members thereof are hereby required to take notice."

QUEST FOR BIG COMMISSION

Suit for \$15,000 commission on a land deal that dates back to 1903 is claimed in a suit brought in the circuit court by Dan R. Murphy against Prosper Smith. Murphy is suing as the assignee of Frank Hoberg. The complaint alleges that some time in January or February, 1903, Smith represented to Hoberg that he had the right to sell 16,000 acres of land in Coos county, and offered Hoberg 25 per cent commission if he would find a purchaser. It is asserted that Hoberg sent M. J. Kinney to Smith and that the deal was worth \$600,000 changing hands. The plaintiff says he knows little about the transaction beyond the fact that Kinney purchased the land in August, 1902. He is entitled to \$15,000 on Hoberg's claim, he alleges.

BISHOP BONNACUM WINS CHURCH FIGHT

Lincoln, Neb., March 6.—After a 10 years' bitter fight between Bishop Bonnacum of the Catholic diocese of Lincoln and Father William Murphy of the church for the possession of St. Vincent's church, the bishop in control through a decision of the state supreme court of Nebraska. The case has been before the district court six times and three times before the supreme court and twice before the state supreme court. The differences between the priest and the bishop arose in 1898 and the bishop ordered the transfer of Father Murphy. The priest's parishioners, however, refused to surrender the church property, standing loyally by Father Murphy. The court in its decision upheld the bishop and, in the opinion of the court, confirmed the excommunication pronounced against the priest by the bishop.

TRACKED BY DOGS; HELD FOR ASSAULT

Seattle, March 6.—Tracked to his home by bloodhounds, Elliott, who in jail here today after an all night search by officers for the assailant of Otto Roseburg, who last night was criminally assaulted near the town of Duwamish and left beside the car tracks in a critical condition. Elliott was captured in the home of his father, a rancher and a near neighbor of Mrs. Roseburg. He surrendered without resistance and was lodged in the jail here to await identification. Mrs. Roseburg, who is the wife of an employee of the Georgetown cannery, was attacked and assaulted by a man whom she met on the railway tracks near her home last evening. After she had sufficiently recovered she made her way home and gave the alarm. She is today in a precarious condition.

ILL AND DESPAIRING WOMAN ENDS LIFE

San Francisco, March 6.—Mrs. L. J. Jones, 40 years old, in a fit of despondency committed suicide today by gas asphyxiation in her room at the Alta apartments. When found by Dr. T. J. McConkey, who resides in the building, she was lying in bed with a gas tube in her mouth. The door was locked and the windows closed. Mrs. Jones left a note in which she said:
"I can't stand it any longer. I have been sick so long I must end it all. I am so sorry to end my life here in such a way, but I can't stand it any longer."

SHERIFF STEVENS TAKES AWAY ARISTOCRATIC LAND THIEF'S SPECIAL PRIVILEGES

No longer does Horace G. McKinley back in the sunshine in the courthouse yard, or stroll at his leisure through the corridors of the county jail. The mighty McKinley, who stole government land away and was sentenced to serve two years when he was returned to Portland from China, has lost a share of the luxuries which he has enjoyed as a favored prisoner for nearly a year.

His loss of privileges comes as the result of those sentenced to assault. He made on L. W. Humphreys, a newspaper man, in the corridor of the jail a few days ago. An article referring casually to his recent mail as the jail addressed to the "Hotel de Stevens" offended his dignity, and without warning he undertook to punish the reporter who had been so unkind as to mention the fact that McKinley, land grafter, was still in jail.

When United States Marshal Reed announced in an interview in The Journal that he had requested no special privileges for McKinley, and that he had no power to regulate the treatment of the prisoner, Sheriff Stevens sat up and took notice. He conferred with his attorneys, and was advised that he had power to lock McKinley up if he chose. Yesterday McKinley was locked up and informed that he would be subject to the same rules as other prisoners. He can receive visitors only two days a week, and his mail will be limited to 10 minutes. This applies to Mrs. Marie Ward McKinley, who has spent hours at a time in company with her husband in the days gone by.

Sheriff Stevens does not say how long the McKinley will remain in the jail, but he says that the privilege of the noted land stealer is for an indefinite period, and that he will be kept in the jail until he is able to pay the fine and costs of his case.

SIX CABINET MEN SWORN IN

Washington, March 6.—With scarcely any ceremony beyond the formal repetition of the oath to support the constitution of the United States, six new members of the cabinet of President Taft were sworn in today by Chief Justice Melville W. Fuller of the United States supreme court. Among those present were the members of the simple ceremony that made government officials of Secretary of State Philander C. Knox, Postmaster General Frank Hitchcock, Secretary of the Navy George Von Lengerke Meyer, Secretary of the Interior Richard A. Ballinger, secretary of Agriculture James L. Wilson and Secretary of Commerce and Labor Charles Nagel.

The president congratulated the new members and the old and pitched into the following words: "The cabinet is a body of shaking hands with a crowd of visitors. The secretary of State Huntington Wilson was sworn at the state department."

WESTON NORMAL FUND IS ALMOST COMPLETE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Pendleton, Or., March 6.—All but a small portion of the amount to be raised for the maintenance of the normal school at Weston for the remainder of the season has been raised. The subscription list has been obtained principally at Weston, Athena and Pendleton. Thirty-two hundred dollars was estimated as being necessary for the completion of the school, and \$2000 of this has been secured. The normal school graduates have worked hard in the subscription campaign.

The undersigned, believing that the educational interests of the state of Oregon, and particularly of the eastern section of the state, demand the continuance of the eastern Oregon state normal school, and that the students now enrolled should be given opportunity to complete their courses for the present year, and that the contracts made with the teaching force of the normal school should be fulfilled, pledge the following sum to our state for the maintenance of the normal school for the present semester ending in June, 1909.

For the remaining three months 41 subscriptions were obtained for \$10 per month, 24 at \$5 a month, 20 normal students subscribed \$157.25, donations amounting to \$315, were secured, including the donation of the Preston Parson Milling company of lights, and Weston of free water.

COMMUTERS PROTEST REMOVAL OF RATE

Salem, Or., March 6.—E. J. Goodman and H. G. Lake of Hillsboro have filed a complaint with the railroad commission, objecting because the Southern Pacific has taken off the commutation rates between that point and Portland since the advent of the Oregon Electric. The commuters rate between Hillsboro and Portland was \$8 per month, making a rate of 18 cents for a distance of 18 miles. W. W. Cotton, on behalf of the railroad company, informs the commission that the rate was not taken off because the Oregon Electric had built into Hillsboro and Forest Grove but because there were but four bona fide commuters living in Hillsboro who were taking advantage of the rate. They are named as Miss Eva Weathered, Miss Stella Boscow, H. G. Lake and E. J. Goodman.

COMPLAINT OF DELAY IN ANTI-JAP GAME

Sacramento, Cal., March 6.—The Democratic senators in the legislature are complaining that the leaders of the assembly are playing with the anti-Japanese resolution recently adopted in the senate and transferred to the lower house. It now looks, they say, as if the resolution will find its way to Washington to give official notification to congress and the Taft administration that California is opposed to all kinds of Asiatic immigration and wants the exclusion laws stiffened.

"Jack the Sinner" Caught.

Palo Alto, Cal., March 6.—Jack the Sinner, the famous "sinner" who has at least been apprehended. He is in the hands of officers but of doctors and is already in hospital in a sanitarium. Through the influence of the young man's family his name has been withheld. He has been the victim of epilepsy for several years and the case has been the cause of his peculiar actions.

SUGAR OCTOPUS PREPARES APPEAL

Hates to Lose That \$134,116—Scales Fixed With a Tiny Wire.

New York, March 6.—Following a verdict in favor of the government against the American Sugar Refining company, the attorneys for the sugar corporation today began the preparation of an appeal against the verdict, which means a loss of \$134,116 to the company. The sugar corporation was mulcted because of unpaid duties and evidence was presented to show that its subordinate officials misweighed sugar imports. The verdict was for the full amount of its weight. This was denied. Photographs and diagrams showing the manner in which the government alleged it was defrauded out of thousands of dollars through the use of "fixed" scales formed an interesting part of the government's case against the company.

One case was cited where the company had paid a preliminary duty of \$38,134.27 on a cargo of sugar and later had received a rebate of \$1197.37 because of the difference in weight and polarization after it had been weighed, checked and tested. It was not contended that there was anything wrong in this shipment or its weight. This was done to let the jury understand the method.

Tiny Wire Did the Business.
Thomas D. Hyatt, a United States weigher, who was a draughtsman before he was a weigher, and who was in charge of the weighers of the district in which the Havemeyer & Elder dock is situated, said that he had removed part of a sketch representing boards and showed the alleged fraudulent appliance, which caused the weight to be less. This was a wire lever upon the inner side of the scale balance.

Hyatt said the hole through which the wire ran that is said to have done this work, was so small as to be invisible without the aid of a light match. He said it was bored through the boards directly beneath a shelf which had been built in each scale house. The diameter, he estimated, was about three-sixteenths of an inch.

FROMAN WAS A HERO, THOUGH A CONVICT

San Quentin, Cal., March 6.—As a tribute to the bravery of L. J. Froman, a convict, who died yesterday from injuries sustained in fighting a fire that destroyed the jute warehouse of the prison, the penitentiary authorities today decided to permit burial at San Rafael instead of in the prison cemetery. Froman was convicted of forgery and sent to the prison from San Francisco. He was a model prisoner and looked upon as a particularly unfortunate man. After the fire started, several scores of prisoners, including Froman, were detailed to fight the flames. Froman was struck by a falling bale of jute and sustained internal injuries and a fracture of the leg.

HERE'S TWENTY THOU. FOR YOU, TOMMY

Bay City, Mich., March 6.—Thomas O'Connor, who has been sought for years by this city, was left \$20,000 by a will of Timothy O'Connor, filed today. Thomas O'Connor is the son of the decedent and is supposed to be somewhere on the Pacific coast. E. W. Porter of this city has charge of the estate.

Left alone with her brother at their home, the two children secured a revolver. The brother pulled the trigger and the bullet passed through the little girl's foot as she stood with one above the other. The child collapsed from loss of blood when she reached the neighbor's house.

Los Angeles, March 6.—Ere this, men have committed burglaries and been caught, but probably never before did a man purloin a real live boa constrictor and land in the toils of the law.

Sylvester White, a beardless young man, has been brought down from Visalia and locked up, charged with the theft.
