**Recalls Boyhood Days**—At the Presbyterian ministerial meeting this morning Rev. John A. Townsend read a paper on "Home" which set in motion a train of reminiscence of the 34 ministers present. In the discussion which followed those who had been born and brought up among rural surroundings spoke with the greatest affection of the part these scenes and pleasures had in forming character and bringing happiness and those who had been brought up in a city or whose early recollection were of many moving, expressed themselves as regretting the loss of these memories and associations which made boyhood happy to the country raised boy.

**Portland Men Honored**—Portland's delegation to the convention of the O. B. B. held in Oakland last week reports that members of the order from this city received important elective and appointive positions for the coming year at the hands of the convention. Isaac Sweet was elected first grand vice president for the Fourth district, the Pacific coast, while I. L. White was chosen district deputy. When Magistrate Howell, the waitress served the liquor she was placed under arrest, charged with disposing of liquor on Sunday. J. C. McGowan, the acting manager, was also arrested on the same charge. The hearing in the police court was today postponed until tomorrow.

**Main Witness Is Missing**—Walter Pachensky, accused of assault upon Mike Tichinski, walked out of Judge Cleland's court a free man this morning just after a jury had been sworn to try him. The prosecuting witness could not be found and the validity of the service upon him was doubtful, so the court ordered the case dismissed and discharged the prisoner. Pachensky and three other Poles engaged in a row the day after Christmas and he had been in jail over two months.

**Taken to Penitentiary**—Three men sentenced to serve indeterminate sentences in the penitentiary were taken to Salem this morning by Sheriff Stevens. C. H. Deifs and Jack Horn will serve from 10 to 15 years each, the former on a charge of assault and the latter for his highwayman stunt in holding up men by pointing his finger at them, his victims believing that he was armed. Fred Miller, the third man under charge of the sheriff, will serve from two to 20 years for passing a forged bank check.

**HONOR DR. SAMUEL R. JOHNSTON'S MEMORY**

Several hundred friends of the late Dr. Samuel R. Johnston, associate principal of Portland Academy, gathered at the First Presbyterian church yesterday afternoon to honor the memory of the dead instructor. Dr. Johnston died to Florence, Italy, while on a leave of absence, February 27.

Dr. Johnston had been the principal of the Portland Academy, now one of the leading preparatory schools of the country, since 1889. He and Dr. J. H. Wilson were associated together in this work and it has been the work of these two men largely that has brought the school to its present state of efficiency.

Rev. R. K. Warren, Samuel Ely Eliot and Dr. W. H. Foulkes were the speakers at the service yesterday, while W. M. Ladd presided. The speakers were listened to with deep attention by numbers of former students of Portland Academy, many of whom had been helped through their school work by Dr. Johnston. A resolution was read by Mr. Eliot which had been passed by former academy students living at Eugene.
