Survey of Timber Land Approved.—Official plans of the survey of the south half of township 6 south, range 9 west, have been received by the local land office and the lands included in this tract will be thrown open to entry at 9 o'clock April 23. Sections 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29 and 30 of township 6 south, range 9 west, have also been surveyed and will be thrown open to settlement and will be applicable to entry on April 26. Much of this land is located in the Siuslaw forest reserve and much of it includes some of the most valuable timber land in the state. The sections have been held up for some time waiting for the approval of the government survey. "Scouters" have settled on much of the land and these settlers have 90 days from the time of opening in which to make their filings.

Body Not Identified.—Although the authorities at Vancouver, B. C., have been communicated with by the coroner, the body of the young man who committed suicide in the Saranac lodge house, 4712 North Sixth street, Friday night, by shooting himself through the head, has not yet been positively identified. Practically the only clue to identification found on his clothing was a tax receipt in the name of H. Gebelhoff. The customs in British Columbia is for a firm to pay the taxes of its employees, taking the sum out of their wages. The tax in this instance was paid by the Vancouver Lumber company. Gebelhoff, as his name is supposed to be, was well dressed and did not appear to have done manual labor at any time.
