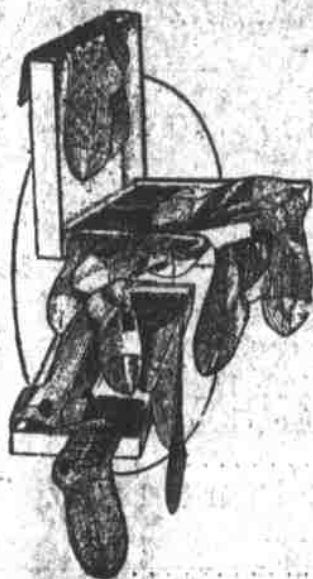

The Dalles, Or., March 11.—That the women of Woodlawn, who applied to City Recorder J. M. Fillion of this city to have their names sent to the bachelors' club at Trout Lake, hearing that he had agreed to marry the single men there free of charge if they would find affinites, are not compelled to look so far away from home as shown by a letter received yesterday. The missive contains the names of about 40 women of Woodlawn, who are greatly chagrined to know that the young women of that place are looking elsewhere for mates. The letter follows:

To date the would-be wives are far in excess of the bachelors, as besides the 16 men at Trout Lake, the recorder has only received one list, that of the 40 swains at Woodlawn.

It is not known how many black, blue, brown or gray eyed girls are waiting to find affinites, or what number of bachelors are looking for mates; but Recorder Fillion has evidence that there are a big number of each, and as he sends the names of the would-be wives to the bachelors and vice versa, it is thought that some of them, at least, may be made happy as the result of a little article that appeared in The Journal a few days ago.

KLAMATH RANCHERS PETITION FOR SILENCE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Klamath Falls, Or., March 11.—Klamath land owners have forwarded a petition to J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, asking that a silo be established near Klamath Falls for the purpose of making experiments in the preparation of ensilage from the timothy and marsh grasses of the Klamath basin.

F. H. McCormack, whose ranch borders the Upper Klamath lake, has asked that the silo be established on his place and states that if successful, he will have the outfit from the state at actual cost of installation.

The timothy and marsh grasses of the Klamath lakes and rivers are of a very rank growth and cover a considerable area, and the opinion here is that ensilage of a high grade can be made.

MONEY IS SAVED WORKING PEOPLE

First Monthly Report of the City's Free Employment Office Encouraging.

According to the first monthly report of Secretary Ryerson of the Municipal Free Employment bureau, the average cost of procuring jobs for the unemployed is less than 50 cents each. During the month there were 223 positions filled at a cost of \$114.24. If these positions had been filled through employment agencies the men and women who were benefited would have had to pay \$1.50 apiece, or \$331. Thus in one month

a saving of \$238 has been made to laboring people.

Secretary Ryerson's report in part is as follows:

"During the month of February the office was open for business a total of 18 days, commencing on the 8th, and although the rainy weather has greatly retarded all classes of work, I feel that the business of this office for the month fully justifies the claim that such an institution was greatly needed."

"I am well pleased with the assurances of the cooperation of a large number of contractors and other employers of labor, and have every reason to believe that the coming month will show a heavy increase in the number of positions filled. I ask that every employer in the city of Portland and the surrounding country send to this office for the help they need when they find it necessary to patronize an employment office."

There are registered at present something over 300 men and women. Representing almost every trade, and as only those who have trades and can be reached by telephone are registered, some idea can be gained of the applicants for work this office has had.

It has been found impractical to register common laborers, as they must almost every case be furnished immediately upon the receipt of the order, and so far there has always been a sufficient number in waiting at the office to supply the demands."

a clean hole through the wood. This shows conclusively that the discharge which ended Hiett's life was fired from a distance of over 20 feet.

As the paddle was barely finished Hiett was still in the position of chopping at it when shot drawn from a position by the porch of the cabin to the fresh shot marks in the brush, less than 40 feet away, passed over the spot where Hiett was evidently standing, chopping away at the paddle, when the charge of bird shot struck his neck and head.

A man, by walking rapidly from this supposed position by the porch, can reach the spot where Hiett was lying in two seconds, while it requires six seconds, even walking rapidly, to go from the top of the porch down the steps to the same place. As all doctors agree that Hiett could have used his limbs for only a few moments after the shot penetrated the brain, there would, according to some physicians, be time for Hiett, if it were he who fired upon the unsuspecting Hiett, to walk from the side of the porch to the wounded man.

Then, according to this theory, Hiett, in his dying struggles, swung the ax over his head with all the strength he could muster and brought it down upon the skull of the surprised Dale, who believed him helpless.
