NOT MALICIOUS, SAYS JOSSELYN

Railway President Doubts That Attempt Was Made to Wreck Special.

Officers of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company are unwilling to give credence to the theory that an obstruction was placed across the track on the Casadero line yesterday for the purpose of wrecking a special train.

"Such an idea is all hulloabaloo!" exclaimed Mr. Josselyn when asked for his opinion. "I was showing Mr. Mills over the system that he might the better comprehend the great extensions of streetcar lines that the growth of Portland has made necessary."

"A plank was put across the track on the Casadero line yesterday, but I was not even informed that an obstruction had been placed on the track."

"In spite of these views, others connected with the streetcar company are inclined to think that the placing of the plank across the track a short time before the president's private train was expected was more than a coincidence."

Late yesterday afternoon a stone was found wedged in a switch on the Mount Scott tracks so firmly that it was almost impossible to dislodge it. That it was believed to have been placed there with malicious intent was reported to Vice President Fuller this morning.

A rigid inquiry is being conducted with a view to determining whether the presence of the obstructions was malicious or accidental.

DIVIDEND ORDERED BY THE P. R., L. & P. CO.

A quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent on the preferred stock of the Portland Railway company was scheduled to be declared today at the Philadelphia office of the local corporation.

"A dividend has never been declared on the common stock of this company," said President Josselyn this morning. "The preferred stock was issued at the time of construction as a substitute for bonds. It has been the custom to return 5 per cent annually or 1 1/2 per cent quarterly on preferred stock. The exact amount of the dividend, however, is determined in the Portland offices of the company."
