Middle Eastern Apology.—A curious reversal of opinion has taken place in the mind and heart of Eli Huddle, who recently filed suit for \$10,000 damages against Rev. E. P. Pitts for alienating Mrs. Huddle's affections. He now feels that he has greatly wronged the preacher, and has withdrawn his suit, and also made a full retraction before Rev. D. M. Cathey, pastor of the East Side Free Methodist church and Rev. W. N. Coffey, presiding elder of the same church, saying that he greatly regrets his hasty action, that he was misinformed and that he has full confidence in his wife and in Mr. Pitts. Rev. Pitts is in charge of the Free Methodist church at Damascus.

Middle Eastern Apology.—The Riddell lectures which were to have been given this week at Centenary Methodist church, have been unavoidably postponed on account of Mr. Riddell's illness. The full course will be given as previously announced, beginning next Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock when the subject will be "New Thought, Christian Science, Theosophy and Spiritualism, and Their Relation to the Christian Religion." The remaining lectures of the course will be given each evening of next week except Saturday, beginning at 8 o'clock at the Centenary Methodist church, corner East Ninth and Pine streets.

Martin Baines Technically.—Attempts will be made by Attorney John A. Jeffrey to secure a new trial for Edward H. Martin, held for the murder of Nathan Wolff. If the attorney succeeds in getting a new trial, the charge will probably have to be manslaughter, as the law provides that a man may not be placed in jeopardy twice for the same crime. The question of whether or not a new trial will be granted will probably hinge upon the evidence of Charles J. Sweet, one of the jurors who tried Martin and who is said to have declared that he did not visit with the other jurors, the scene of the murder.

Form New Push Club.—The Seventh ward auxiliary is the name of the latest push club to be organized on the east side. It is composed of residents at Milard avenue on the Mount Scott line, and its object is to promote the securing of necessities to comfort in the neighborhood. An especial effort is to be made to secure a park. The regular meeting night is to be the third Thursday in each month. S. E. Chambers is the president.

Kwanowski Goes Free.—Tony Kwanowski, on trial for assault with a dangerous weapon on John Buckman, was acquitted by a jury in the circuit court yesterday. Tony, Buckman and others got into a fight at a surprise party given for Mrs. Mary Moss, who lives near St. Johns. The night after Christmas, Buckman was slashed across the face with a knife, and the state endeavored to prove that Kwanowski was his assailant.

Horse Thief Confesses.—Henry Hadler of Troutdale was arrested yesterday afternoon by Sheriff Stevens and Deputy Sheriffs Harry Bulker and Archie Leonard on a charge of stealing a valuable black mare from Charles Witter, a rancher living on the Sandy river. Hadler confessed, according to the sheriff, not only to the stealing of the case was charged, but others. Four months ago Hadler was in jail suspected of stealing a cow.

Rock Pile Strike Ends.—The Kelly Butte strike has ended. A bread and water diet had the desired effect upon the prisoners, and they returned to work yesterday. They had refused to work because, as they declared, the food furnished them by the Kelly Butte was not good. For some time they had been confined to the county jail, where they were not compelled to work, and were taken to the rock pile only recently.

Black Hand Mystery Solved.—The case against Rocco Caffro, charged with being an extortionist, led down last night in the police court this morning for Rocco Caffro, the complainant witness, was at last forced to admit that he owed Caffro \$25 or \$40. With this showing Judge Van Zante lost no time in dismissing the case against the alleged Black Hand member. Caffro's appearance and the rumors that he was in some way connected with a murder at First and Clay streets nearly a year ago, led the officers to

believe that Caffro would go before the grand jury on the charge of threatening to kill without delay, but Attorney Ferguson, who was appointed by the court, soon directed the questions aimed at Caffro so that he admitted a reason for Caffro's calls upon him and finally his demand for money.

Prospector Sues for Wages.—Marshall J. Kinney is named as the defendant in a suit brought by C. L. Gardner in the circuit court for the recovery of \$1171, which he alleges is due him for 129 days service in locating dam sites on Marble creek, Quatsino sound, Vancouver island, B. C. Gardner contends that he was to be paid \$5 a day and all his traveling expenses incurred by the defendant.

Hit by Streetcar.—Charles Kelly, rooming at Stanton and Commercial streets, was struck by a streetcar at Stanton and Williams avenue last evening, but although he was removed to a hospital at the time his injuries were found not to be of a serious nature.
